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THE ALLEGATIONS MADE AGAINST COUNCILLOR FORD

- 1. I have attached to this report as Schedule 1 a paginated bundle of documents and other evidence and the references in this report to page numbers are, unless otherwise indicated, references to the bundle pagination.
- 2. The details of the complaint against Councillor Ford are set out at Pages 1 to 10. In summary the complaint, made by Mr and Mrs Barke of Murrays Funeral Directors Limited which trades as Murrays Independent Funeral Directors ("Murrays") is as follows:
- 3. It is alleged:

That Councillor Ford has embarked on a crusade against Murrays, inciting local people to act against it with the sole aim of damaging the business and its reputation in the community.

That Councillor Ford has instigated, maintained and continued to pursue a wholly personal campaign against an established and respected local business (namely Murrays).

4. More specifically it is alleged:

That Councillor Ford has engaged in sustained activity against Murrays over a period of five months.

That Councillor Ford has knowingly given false information to his constituents in order to galvanize support for a campaign that was rooted in personal interest i.e. he was unable to prevent his local public house (The Wheel Inn, Findern), where he maintained he was a regular customer, from being closed by Punch Taverns and sold for another business purpose.

That Councillor Ford has repeated false information via social media causing severe distress to one of Murray's employees and her family.

- 5. Mr and Mrs Barke subsequently added some additional information to their complaint. This is to the effect that Councillor Ford's actions are in direct contravention of South Derbyshire District Council's ("the Council") Corporate Plan and the desired outcome of developing economic and employment opportunities within the district. It is alleged that Councillor Ford's behaviour does not in any way support Murrays business.
- 6. Mr and Mrs Barke further contend that Councillor Ford has breached the Council's Members Code of Conduct. Specifically that Councillor Ford has not complied with The General Principles of Public Life relating to Selflessness, Honesty and Integrity, Accountability, Openness and Leadership. Further, that Councillor Ford has breached the following:
 - Paragraph 3(1) which requires members to treat others with respect
 - Paragraph 3(2)(b) which prohibits members from bullying any person
 - Paragraph 5 which prohibits a member from conduct which could reasonably be regarded as bringing their office or authority into disrepute.
- 7. COUNCILLOR FORD was elected to the Council as a Councillor in May 2003. He was subsequently re-elected in May 2007 and May 2011. Councillor Ford was appointed Chairman of the Planning Committee (formerly known as Development Control Committee) on 21st May 2009.
- 8. **RELEVANT LEGISLATION AND RELATED MATERIAL** Duty to promote and maintain high standards of conduct.

- 9. Under Section 27 of the Localism Act 2011 ("the Act") the Council must promote and maintain high standards of conduct by members of the authority. In discharging this duty, the Council must, in particular, adopt a code dealing with the conduct that is expected of members of the authority when they are acting in that capacity (Section 27 (2))
- 10. Under Section 28(1) of the Act, the Council must secure that its code is consistent with the principles of selflessness, integrity, objectivity, accountability, openness, honesty and leadership.
- 11. The intention of the legislation is to ensure that the conduct of public life at the local government level does not fall below a minimum level which engenders public confidence in democracy as was recognised by Beatson J in R (Calver) v the Adjudication Panel for Wales [2012] EWHC 1172 (Admin) when he held that there was a clear public interest in maintaining confidence in local government whilst at the same time bearing in mind the importance of freedom of political expression or speech in the political sphere.
- 12. The Council's Members Code of Conduct (Pages 11 to 23) was adopted on 28th June 2012 and was effective from 1st July 2012.
- 13. Paragraph 1(1) of the Code provides that it "applies to **you** as a member of South Derbyshire District Council"
- 14. Paragraph 1(2) provides that the Code should be read "together with the general principles at page 2 (prescribed in Section 28 of the Localism Act)".
- 15. Paragraph 1(3) provides that "you must comply with the provisions of this code".
- 16. By paragraph 2(1) "You must comply with this Code whenever you act in your official capacity as a member of your authority. That is when you:
 - a) Conduct the business of your authority (which in this Code includes the business of the office to which you are elected or appointed); or
 - b) Act, claim to act or give the impression you are acting as a representative of your authority".
- 17. By paragraph 3(1) "You must treat others with respect".
- 18. By paragraph 3(2)(b) "You must not bully any person".
- 19. By paragraph 5 "You must not conduct yourself in a manner which could reasonably be regarded as bringing your office or authority into disrepute".
- 20. Article 10 of the European Convention for the Protection of Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms provides:
 - "1. Everyone has the right to freedom of expression. This right shall include freedom to hold opinions and to receive and impart information and ideas without interference by public authority and regardless of frontiers...

- 2. The exercise of these freedoms, since it carries with it duties and responsibilities, may be subject to such formalities, conditions, restrictions or penalties as are prescribed by law and are necessary in a democratic society, in the interests of The protection of the reputation or rights of others".
- 21. Convention rights including Article 10, are given direct effect in domestic law by the Human Rights Act 1998. Section 6 provides that it is unlawful for a public authority to act in a way which is incompatible with, amongst others, Article 10. Section 3 provides that domestic legislation, so far as possible, must be applied in a way which is compatible with Convention rights.

22. EVIDENCE GATHERED AND FINDINGS OF FACT

- 23. In the course of this investigation, I have interviewed the Complainants (Mr and Mrs Barke on behalf of Murrays Funeral Directors Limited "Murrays") and Councillor Martyn Ford. Their statements are included in the bundle in Schedule 1.
- 24. I have also reviewed a number of documents and other material which is contained in the bundle in Schedule 1.
- 25. I have also consulted with the Monitoring Officer who has provided me with documents and information relating to the Complaint.
- 26. The Complainants are the joint owners and directors of Murrays, which as its name suggests, is a funeral directors business based in Burton Upon Trent (Pages 43 to 48)

27. ITEM 1 IN THE COMPLAINT

- 28. The Complainants decided to expand the business into South Derbyshire and for this purpose to acquire additional premises.
- 29. In late September 2013 they became aware that The Wheel Inn, Findern had been closed and was on the market. An offer to purchase the building was made in December 2013 on behalf of Murrays. The offer to purchase the building was accepted in January 2014. Contracts were exchanged on the 2nd of April 2014 and the purchase completed on the 16th April 2014.
- 30. Murrays instructed Planning Consultants DPDS Consulting Group ("DPDS") to advise in relation to the conversion of the building from a pub into a funeral directors. DPDS advised that it was permissible to make this conversion without an application to South Derbyshire District Council as planning authority. This was because both uses were covered by permitted development rights. The pub was an "A4" use and a funeral directors was an "A1" and it was permitted to change between them in the way envisaged without the requirement to apply for planning permission for such a change of use. However, Murrays were advised that in order to be sure, it should submit an application to the local planning authority for confirmation that the proposed change of use was lawfully permitted. This was an application for a Lawful Development Certificate and was made on 27th March 2014.
- 31. The application was submitted in the name of DPDS as agent.

- 32. By email of 31st March 2014 (Page 50) Councillor Ford objected to Murrays planning application. He did so both as a local resident and as a local Councillor on behalf of local residents. Councillor Ford also posted a message on his own Facebook Page (Page 176) inviting "all Findern folk" to oppose the application. He also urged his readers to "help save the Wheel".
- 33. The Area Planning Officer replied to Councillor Ford on 31st March (Pages 49 to 50) informing him that the planning application could not be resisted.
- 34. On 8th May at 14:52 (Page 218) Councillor Ford posted on the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page a message saying that he needed to discuss with the planners "where we stand legally". Referring to the forthcoming meeting of the Planning Committee he says he hopes that the debate "will provide options".
- 35. On 13th May 2014 (the day of the Planning Committee meeting), Councillor Ford posted a message on the Save The Wheel Inn, Findern Facebook Page (Page 216) asking the objectors to attend early and to be in the Council Chamber by 6pm when the meeting was due to start.
- 36. The officer's report for the Planning Committee (Pages 65 to 70) explained that an application for planning permission was not required and recommended that a Certificate of Lawfulness be granted.
- 37. The minutes of the Planning Committee of 13th May 2014 in relation to this application (Pages 71 to 75) state as follows:

"Application for a lawful development certificate for a change of use from class A4 (Drinking Establishment) to class A1 (Funeral Directors) at The Wheel Inn, 25 Main Street, Findern 9/2014/0286/Z.

The Head of Planning Services explained to members the legal basis for this application. National planning law allowed for them to be converted from their current use as a public house to use as a funeral directors. This change did not require the agreement of the Planning Committee. The request before the Committee, therefore, was simply to confirm that this change was allowed under the law. As this was simply a statement of fact, the Committee would have no option but to agree to do this.

The consequences of not granting the certificate were discussed. Members were informed that such a decision would be subject to appeal (possibly though a judicial review) which the Council would be likely to lose on a matter of law and, potentially, could have costs awarded against it.

Resolved:-

That the application for a lawful development certificate for a change of use from Class A4 (drinking establishment) to Class A1 (funeral directors) be approved."

38. On 13th May 2014 Councillor Ford "liked" a comment on the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page which was to the effect that the Council had no option but to agree to the change of use and that residents were invited to the Planning Committee to have a chance to speak and hear the explanation of why the Council could not refuse the application (Page 215).

- 39. According to the complainants, Councillor Ford was aware from the outset that there were no planning grounds for refusing the application for a Certificate of Lawfulness. He told the Derby Telegraph on 14th May 2014 "There was no way the committee would turn it down" (Page 245). Nevertheless it is alleged that he misled his constituents into believing that if they objected to the application and made representations to the Planning Committee the application could have been refused. It is alleged that this was done in order to advance his personal interest in retaining the pub, to cause maximum distress to Mr and Mrs Barke and for the purposes of self-promotion.
- 40. Councillor Ford maintains that local residents had asked him, as their representative, to oppose the application on their behalf. A funeral directors was considered totally inappropriate in a village setting in such a prominent position. This was considered to be a feature building at the gateway to the village.
- 41. Councillor Ford had been copied into an email from the Campaigns Officer at the Campaign for Real Ale dated 8th April 2014 (Pages 61 to 64) which advised that the Council had power to issue an "Article 4 Direction" in relation to the pub. CAMRA advised that this would remove the permitted development rights currently enjoyed by the building and that any proposed Change of Use would require full planning permission. The advice was that it would be possible to object to such an application on the grounds of the loss of community value.
- 42. Councillor Ford maintains that when he said that hopefully the debate at Planning Committee will provide options, he was not referring to the merits of the application for a Lawful Development Certificate for the proposed Change of Use. Rather, he had in mind the possibility that the Committee might defer the application or that the Council might be prepared to pursue an Article 4 Direction. This statement (Councillor Ford maintains) was made in reply to an earlier one on the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Campaign Page at 14:49pm on 8th May 2014. The question posted on the Facebook Campaign Page was "is it too late for the Council to go down the Direction 4 route?" (Page 218).
- 43. Councillor Ford says that he was also aware that an application had been submitted to the Council on 7th April 2014 to list the Wheel Inn as an Asset of Community Value (Pages 51 to 59) If successful this would have enabled the Save The Wheel Inn Community Group to express an interest in purchasing the Wheel Inn and provide an opportunity for the Group to bid to purchase the pub. This application was eventually rejected by the Council but not until early June 2014.

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44. In reply to this allegation Councillor Ford says that at no time did he advise his constituents that the application for a Lawful Development Certificate could be prevented. The Planning Services Manager decided to take the application to the Planning Committee given the level of public interest. CAMRA had advised the representative of the Save The Wheel Inn Community Group on 8th April 2014 (Pages 61 to 64) that a Change of Use application was not, in fact, required for conversion to a funeral directors. CAMRA had also advised the Group to "rally the troops and make the Council (and Punch and the future developer) aware that the Community is not happy

about the decision". Councillor Ford says that not only did he not mislead his constituents but they had been advised by CAMRA of the planning position. In any event, CAMRA advised the group to lobby the Council. Given the advice from CAMRA he did not believe that the Campaign Group members who attended the Planning Committee meeting on 13th May 2014 would have been under any misapprehension as to the likely outcome of the Change of Use application. This, he maintains is further supported by, for example, the entry on the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page on 12th April 2014 at 03:17 (Page 223). The person who posted this entry is aware that the Council has limited power to maintain the existing use of the building. Councillor Ford posted an entry on 14 April 2014 (Page 221) indicating that these could be the very last days of The Wheel. See also Louise Holmes post of 11th May 2014 at 12:36 (Page 217) where she says that it appears that the outcome of the planning application is just a formality.

- 45. On balance, I do not uphold Item 1 of the complaint.
- 46. I do not consider there is any issue in principle with Councillor Ford objecting either on his own account (as a resident of Findern) or on behalf of his constituents to the application for a Lawful Development Certificate.
- 47. Further, there is no evidence that Councillor Ford has led his constituents to believe that there was a real possibility of the application being refused. He talked about "options" but only in response to a question posted on the Facebook Campaign Page. In the event, the Council decided not to pursue the Article 4 Direction option but there is no evidence that Councillor Ford was aware that this option would definitely not be pursued by the Council prior to the meeting of the Planning Committee.
- 48. CAMRA had suggested the possibility of an Article 4 Direction and Councillor Ford had asked the Planning Officers to consider it (Page 61).
- 49. The CAMRA advice regarding options had been sent to Julie Cowburn who was the lead contact for the Save The Wheel Inn Community Group. CAMRA had advised the Group to lobby the Council whilst pointing out that a Change of Use application was not required.
- 50. The decision to take the application to the Planning Committee was made by the Planning Services Manager and not by Councillor Ford.
- 51. The Facebook entries cited by Councillor Ford show that the individuals in question are aware that the application for a Lawful Development Certificate is likely to be granted.
- 52. On the balance of probabilities, I prefer Councillor Ford's explanation as opposed to the grounds of Item 1 of the complaint.

53. ITEM 2 IN THE COMPLAINT.

- 54. The Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Campaign Page dates from 4th April 2014. By the post on his own Facebook Page of 31st March 2014 (Page 176) Councillor Ford requested "all Findern folk" to "help save The Wheel".
- 55. Councillor Ford made a number of contributions to the Facebook Campaign Page in support of the campaign (Pages 181 to 224). For example:

- 56. On 5th April 2014 Councillor Ford "liked" a post requesting 21 people to support the establishment of a community group to apply to the Council to have The Wheel Inn listed as an Asset of Community Value (Page 224). Councillor Ford also became a member of the Save The Wheel Inn Community Group (Pages 58 and 60)
- 57. On 12th April at 15:31 (Page 222) he said that the pub "isn't going to die without a massive fight".
- 58. On 14th April (Page 221) he asks those reading the post to "keep spreading the message that we need to keep our village pub open".
- 59. On 13th May (Page 216) he posted a note reminding the campaign supporters to be in the Council Chamber for the Planning Committee meeting by 6pm.
- 60. On 13th May (Page 215) Councillor Ford "liked" a post saying that every option will be explored to persuade Murrays that Findern villagers "want casks not caskets".
- 61. On 14th May (Page 214) referring to the Asset of Community Value application he said "we fight on".
- 62. On 26th May at 14:03 (Page 208) Councillor Ford posted a message which confirmed that he was displaying a poster at his house supporting the campaign. Further, on 7th June at 05:29 (Page 205), referring to the removal of campaign posters, he advocates the displaying of replacement posters wherever they are removed.
- 63. On 21st June (Page 202) he is shown wearing a "Save The Wheel" T-shirt. This was the date of the Findern Fete where the Campaign Group had a stall. A post by Councillor Ford at 17:21 on 21st June (Page 201) confirms that he was present at the campaign stall on that day.
- 64. On 25th June at 14:33 (Page 199) Councillor Ford posted a message together with a campaign photograph (in which he appears). The message urged Murrays not to come to Findern.
- 65. On 1st August (Page 190) Councillor Ford posted the following message "I bet Murrays thought we had given in and weren't bothered anymore......WRONG!! The fight goes on today, tomorrow, next week, next month and next year until Murrays decide that they are not wanted in Findern and move on before they damage our community even more than they have done already! #casksnotcaskets".
- 66. On the 20th August (Page 185) Councillor Ford "liked" the following post "As the activity increases at The Wheel it's a good chance for any supporters to call round and let their feelings be known I'm sure there will be a warm welcome from caring Murrays perhaps they will be able to tell us why they turned down a chance to move away from where they are not wanted whilst pocketing a quick profit".

- 67. Councillor Ford has confirmed that he did make a number of contributions to the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page. However, he maintains that the campaign had a momentum of its own and did not rely solely on his contributions.
- 68. Whilst Councillor Ford admits he used his own Facebook Page to raise awareness in the community of the Change of Use Application, he denies initiating or driving the Save the Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Campaign. He does however accept that he supported the Campaign and does not dispute any of the social media entries attributed to him.
- 69. He maintains that the message he posted on 1st August 2014 was aimed primarily at the members of the Campaign Group and that the thrust of the Campaign was to persuade Murrays that they were not welcome in Findern and that they should move elsewhere. This message was simply reaffirming the key aim of the Campaign according to Councillor Ford.
- 70. As to the item on the Campaign Facebook Page that he "liked", Councillor Ford maintains this was merely a reference to what he considered to be a very fair offer made by Mark Gregory on 26th June 2014 (Page 271) to purchase the freehold of the former Wheel Inn from Murrays, which should have been given proper consideration by Murrays.
- 71. In my judgement, there is insufficient evidence to support the allegation that Councillor Ford initiated the Save The Wheel Inn Campaign or that his contributions to the Facebook Page alone maintained the Campaign. However, it does demonstrate that Councillor Ford played a major role in initiating and driving the campaign.
- 72. I do not accept Councillor Fords' assertion that his message of 1st August was for "internal" consumption only. He himself accepts that the message was aimed at persuading Murrays that it was not welcome in Findern. Further, the message was effectively in the public domain and was viewed by the Complainants. In my judgement, this was intended to intimidate the Complainants and I am satisfied that they did find it intimidating.
- 73. The entry of 20th August, which was endorsed by Councillor Ford, was quite reasonably perceived by the Complainants as an invitation to campaign supporters to go to The Wheel Inn to intimidate them. In my judgement this was the intention of this entry and I accept that the Complainants found it intimidating. There is a fundamental difference in the evidence given by the Complainants and Councillor Ford in relation to the suggestion in this entry that Murrays were given the opportunity to sell the site at a reasonable profit as a means of resolving the dispute between Murrays and the local residents.
- 74. In order to resolve this difference it would have been necessary for me to interview Mr Gregory and to review and scrutinise all of the financial information held by Murrays in relation to the acquisition of the Wheel Inn. I consider this action would have been disproportionate and in any event, unnecessary, to enable me to reach a decision in relation to the core elements of this complaint. I therefore, have put this issue on one side for the purposes of this report and make no finding on it. In my view, the key question in relation to this entry is whether or not it was intended and/or whether or not it did have the effect of intimidating the complainants and I have dealt with that issue above.

- 75. Councillor Ford also has a Twitter Account: Councillor Ford al
- 76. Councillor Ford has utilised his Twitter Account to support the Save The Wheel Inn Campaign and has posted a number of entries for that purpose (Pages 76 to 146).
- 77. According to the Complainants on the 8th July 2014, Councillor Ford retweeted a comment from a Twitter account called WheelEnders@WheelFindern (Page 98). This account was established "to fight against" the proposed change of use at The Wheel Inn (Pages 147 to 173).
- 78. Councillor Ford's tweet of 8th July refers to a photograph of the team at Murrays including Mr and Mrs Barke. The entry on the WheelEnders account refers to them as "money grabbing ghouls" and Councillor Ford refers to them as "smiling assassins! The face of the enemy".
- 79. Councillor Ford disputes that he commented to a campaign Twitter page (WheelEnders @WheelFindern) as alleged by Mr and Mrs Barke. He says he had posted this item on his own Twitter account and it was retweeted on the campaign Twitter page (See Page 98). He also maintains that the tweets and retweets on his own Twitter account are sent out on his own personal account and not as a Councillor. He says this is also the case in relation to all other social media messages posted by him. However, he does accept that comments made by him to the Burton Mail and the Derby Telegraph were made in his capacity as local District Councillor acting on behalf of the community.
- 80. On examination of the tweet on Councillor Ford's account (Page 98) it can be established that the tweet "smiling assassins! The face of the enemy" does originate from Councillor Ford directly. The retweet on the campaign Twitter account does refer to Murrays as "money grabbing ghouls."
- 81. The complainants say that the combined effect of these tweets is both offensive and intimidating. Councillor Ford maintains that they were not intended to be so.
- 82. In my judgement, it is reasonable for the Complainants to view them in this way. In my judgement they were intended to be both offensive and intimidating. Whilst I accept Councillor Ford's point that his tweet had been retweeted, I consider his comment alone to be offensive and designed to intimidate the Complainants. Again, the comment made on his account is effectively in the public domain and was viewed by the complainants.
- 83. Councillor Ford also maintains that comments posted on his Twitter account are sent on his own personal account and not as a Councillor. However, on the front page of the account Councillor Ford explains that he represents Willington and Findern on South Derbyshire District Council. He does not include any statement that his tweets are to be read as made only on his personal account. I therefore do not accept that his tweets are made only on his own personal account.

- 84. In my view, they represent his tweets as a member of South Derbyshire District Council.
- 85. Councillor Ford also maintains that, apart from comments made to the Burton Mail and the Derby Telegraph, all other social media comments / entries made by him are also on his own personal account and not as a member of South Derbyshire District Council.
- 86. Again, I do not accept Councillor Ford's position on this point.
- 87. Councillor Ford himself has made it clear in his statement that:
 - a. in relation to the campaign against the Change of Use Application, he was conveying the views of the community to Murrays as a representative of the community. In other words as its elected representative of the Council.
 - b. He also confirmed that he was conveying the anger and resentment felt in the community in relation to Murrays, to the Complainants as, the elected representative of that community.
- 88. On 18th August 2014, Councillor Ford sent an email to the complainants in the following terms "Dear Mr & Mrs Barke, As you know all too well you and your business are not wanted in Findern. We all know that contractors are working on the building, we all know how much money you have paid for the building, please can I ask that you think seriously about spending any more money when you have a very attractive offer to buy the building back at a substantial profit. The group aren't going away, so please do the right thing and sell the pub and leave Findern alone with its local pub back again. Regards, M Ford. Sent from my iPhone" (Page 272).
- 89. The complainants maintain that this is designed to be intimidating and is an abuse of Councillor Ford's public office.
- 90. Councillor Ford maintains that his email of 18th August was intended to help Murrays and not to intimidate or bully the Complainants. He says that as the elected member for the community he was aware of the strong opposition to the establishment of an undertakers. He believed it was in Murrays commercial interests to relocate elsewhere. He goes on to say that he saw it as his responsibility as local Councillor to convey the communities feelings of anger and resentment to Murrays.
- 91. Councillor Ford further maintains that Murrays secretive approach had also given rise to a robust campaign against the proposed Change of Use. He says he was conveying the views of the community to Murrays as its elected representative. This email and the other communications were, he argues, not intended to be threatening or intimidating and were neither inappropriate nor an abuse of his public office.
- 92. I do not accept Councillor Ford's explanation in relation to this email of 18th August. If it was intended to help Murrays it was certainly not phrased in such a way. It begins by saying that Mr and Mrs Barke "are not wanted in Findern". It concludes by saying that "the group (i.e. the Campaign Group) aren't going away, so please do the right thing and.... Leave Findern alone". Further, the very strong inference is that the offensive and intimidating communications will continue whilst the business is located in Findern. This is consistent with

Councillor Ford's entry of 1st August on the Campaign Facebook Page when he says that "the fight foes on today, tomorrow, next week, next month, next year and until Murrays decide that they are not wanted in Findern and move on".

93. In my view these communications are threatening and are intended to be intimidating and as such are inappropriate communications from an elected member.

94. ITEM 3 IN THE COMPLAINT

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- 95. The Complainants allege that Councillor Ford encouraged and supported a Boycott Murrays Funeral Directors Facebook Page which joined Facebook on 8th May 2014 (Pages 225 to 228). On that same day at 14:54 (Page 218) Councillor Ford posted on the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page a message saying "we need to get as many as possible to state that they will boycott Murrays and use the Co-Op or anybody but Murrays when the times comes I would hate to think they had sorted me out!" He also retweeted an open letter on 11th July 2014 asking campaign supporters and sympathisers not to use Murrays (Pages 86 to 87).
- 96. The Boycott Page says it is about boycotting Murrays: "Make sure nobody ever gives this company any future business whatsoever." An entry on 9th May (with typo) also asks readers to spread the word for everyone to boycott Murrays (Page 227) "This WILL have a negative impact on their business... and ultimately force them to reconsider taking away out village pub."
- 97. Councillor Ford has responded that he neither joined nor supported a Boycott Murrays Funeral Directors Facebook Campaign. Extracts from this campaign are shown at (Pages 225 to 228). Councillor Ford says he was not aware of this Facebook Campaign prior to receipt of the Complaint which has been made against him.
- 98. Councillor Ford accepts that his reference to a boycott was posted to the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page on 8th May at 14:54 (Page 218). However he maintains that this statement was not addressed to the world at large but to those readers of the Facebook Page who opposed the Change of Use Application. He says it was not intended to be a boycott campaign but was designed to affect Murrays prospective business in the immediate locality and persuade them to relocate elsewhere.
- 99. From an investigation of the Boycott Murrays Funeral Directors Facebook Page there is no evidence that Councillor Ford has posted any comments to, or "liked" any comments by any other contributors on this Facebook Account. Whether or not Councillor Ford was aware of the Boycott Campaign, there is evidence that he advocated a boycott of the business and he accepts that his actions were designed to affect Murrays prospective business in the locality and to persuade them to relocate elsewhere.
- 100. On 8th July at 11:41 (Page 195) Councillor Ford (in response to a question on the Save The Wheel Facebook Page asking who was removing campaign posters) commented "Murrays have probably offered them a deal on burial, more posters removed, more money off!"

- 101. Councillor Ford has responded that his comment should be read in the context of the other comments made on the Campaign Page on 8th July 2014 (Page 195). The initial comment refers to the need for the services of Inspector Morse to apprehend a phantom poster thief and his comment follows that. He maintains these are clearly facetious comments.
- 102. Whether or not this is a facetious comment, it is, in my judgement, disrespectful, as is Councillor Ford's comment on 11th June at 13:46 on the Save The Wheel Inn Facebook Page that "they put cash above community, pounds above people".
- 103. As to the text message sent by Councillor Ford to Jackie Alderson (of Optimum PR) (Page 270), I do not read this as an accusation that the Complainants are lying about the level of support they have received. Councillor Ford, in my judgement, is expressing scepticism about the actual level of support for the establishment of an undertakers business in the village.
- 104. On the balance of the evidence, I accept Councillor Ford's explanation of the comment he posted on the Campaign Facebook Page on 14th May at 08:00 (Page 213). In my judgement, on the evidence, this was a perception that it was open to Councillor Ford and those he represented to take. This should not be taken as implied criticism of how Murrays approached the acquisition of The Wheel Inn and the application for the Lawful Development Certificate. I am merely saying that whilst the language used was emotive I do not consider it unreasonable in light of the requirements of the Code of Conduct.

105. ITEM 4 IN THE COMPLAINT

- 106. The Complainants have alleged that Councillor Ford repeated false information via social media sites causing severe distress to an employee of Murrays and her family and that Councillor Ford subsequently wrote her a letter of apology (Page 273). Councillor Ford disputes this allegation.
- 107. When I interviewed Mr and Mrs Barke they informed me that I was not authorised to approach the employee in question because she did not wish to become involved with my investigation.
- 108. Mr and Mrs Barke informed me that the person in question had been Murrays office manager and had lived at the material time in Findern.
- 109. The complainants say in their statements that they had made their office manager aware of their plans in relation to The Wheel Inn and had requested her to treat the information as confidential.
- 110. The complainants also say that on 16th May they were approached by their office manager who informed them that she had seen various posts on Facebook which inferred that she was responsible for bringing Murrays to Findern. They also say they were informed by their employee that Councillor Ford had repeated this allegation on social media. They say she was distressed and concerned for her own safety and felt suicidal.
- 111. The complainants do not possess copies of any of these alleged social medial postings and I have not been able to trace any that appear to relate to the person in question. Councillor Ford informed me that he also not did not have

- copies of any of the alleged postings but that in early / mid May 2014 he had seen some social media posts alleging that "that woman from Murrays" had brought Murrays to Findern and that she was removing campaign posters. Councillor Ford assumed this was a reference to Murray's office manager.
- 112. Councillor Ford says that he has no recollection of posting, "liking" or retweeting any false information about the office manager.
- 113. It is agreed by all parties that a meeting took place on 21st May 2014 between Councillor Ford, the employee, Mr and Mrs Barke and their PR representative Jackie Alderson
- 114. Mr and Mrs Barke maintain that Councillor Ford apologised to their employee at the meeting, agreed to arrange for the offending postings to be removed and confirmed his apology in a letter. They maintain that Councillor Fords actions amount to an admission of the allegation against him.
- 115. Councillor Ford disputes the complainants interpretation of the events. He maintains that he attended the meeting to satisfy himself that the office manager was ok and to assure her that he was not behind the offending postings. He does accept that he apologised to her at the meeting.
- 116. Councillor Ford says that he requested his fellow campaign members to remove the postings associated with the office manager and handed her a letter later that day which is the letter at (Page 273). He also maintains that this was not a letter of apology on his own account and it does not amount to any admission of the allegation against him.
- 117. I have not interviewed the office manager nor have I seen any of the postings which are alleged to have caused her and her family such distress.
- 118. Councillor Ford did give the office manager a letter of apology but it makes no reference to any actions of Councillor Ford himself. However it does refer to the apparent need to restore friendship and trust between them.
- 119. It is not immediately apparent to me why Councillor Ford should offer an apology in relation to actions for which he maintains he had no responsibility. Further his denial of the allegations is couched in terms of having no recollection of the alleged actions.
- 120. However, on the balance of the evidence, I do not uphold this allegation against Councillor Ford. Some of the key information has (of necessity) been relayed to me second hand and none of the alleged offending postings appear to have survived.
- 121. Councillor Ford's letter does not contain an admission of personal responsibility and he has maintained that position when interviewed.
- 122. I accept that Mr and Mrs Barke have an entirely different perception and position on this point but, in the absence of any social media postings I do not uphold this allegation.
- 123. Mr and Mrs Barke have also alleged that Councillor Ford has retweeted false information about Murrays. On June 11th 2014 he retweeted the following: "*Spoiler Alert* Residents hear rumours of 'a builder' offering funeral folks 5x

- what they paid... £1.3m... Bob must be feeling rich!" The Complainants maintain that given that Mr Gregory's highest offer was £340,000, this is a gross distortion of the true position.
- 124. As regards the "Spoiler Alert" retweet of 11th June 2014 (Page 119) Councillor Ford has responded that this was intended as a light hearted comment. The reference to "Bob" in the tweet, he says, is to the childrens television character Bob the Builder. This he maintains is clearly a facetious comment and not intended to be taken literally, or seriously.
- 125. Given that the information in the retweet does appear to be wildly inaccurate and somewhat fanciful, I accept Councillor Ford's explanation in relation to this item.
- 126. Mr and Mrs Barke allege that Councillor Ford "liked" or endorsed a baseless accusation that they were stealing campaign posters displayed in the village. On 12th August 2014 Councillor Ford "liked" the following Facebook accusation: "Do you suppose Murrays are using all those poster boards they have stolen to build a coffin for the heart of our community that they have so cruelly ripped out?".
- 127. Councillor Ford has responded that the comment he "liked" on 12th August 2014 (Page 187) in relation to poster boards, should not necessarily be seen as an endorsement or approval of that comment because he considered this an amusing comment which was not intended to be taken literally.
- 128. This amounts to an allegation that Murrays is responsible for stealing or the unauthorised removal of a number of campaign poster boards. Councillor Ford has endorsed this allegation. The allegation is in my view, disrespectful as is the endorsement by Councillor Ford.

129. ADDITIONAL ITEM OF COMPLAINT

- 130. The Complainants have also made reference to the Council's Corporate Plan.
- 131. Under "Sustainable Growth and Opportunity, Long Term Outcomes" they refer to "Go1. Developing economic and employment opportunities within the district." The Complainants maintain that they do not consider Councillor Ford's behaviour as an elected member to be in any way supportive of their business. Further, that Councillor Ford's actions are directly opposed to the following statement from the Leader of the Council (Councillor Bob Wheeler): "It's vitally important to recognise the pivotal role that local companies play. We're proud to offer a vibrant, sustainable environment in which firms can flourish and thrive. Through innovation and expertise, South Derbyshire is bucking the trend and prides itself on being 'open for business.""
- 132. In response, Councillor Ford says that he endorses the comments made in the Corporate Plan but feels that the loss of a well used community facility to be replaced by a funeral directors is a very poor use of this building, doing nothing for local employment or community cohesion and causing much anxiety around the village and is totally at odds with the intent of the Plan.
- 133. It may be that the Complainants are referring to an earlier version of the Corporate Plan which has subsequently been updated, but the exact words quoted by the Complainants do not appear in the current version of the

- Corporate Plan 2009-2014 which has been provided to me by the Council (Pages 278 to 293)
- 134. Nevertheless, the Plan does contain a section entitled "Sustainable Growth and Opportunity" underpinned by Priorities and Outcomes.
- 135. One key Priority is "to attract further investment and maximise the survival and growth prospects of local businesses".
- 136. The Outcomes to be delivered include the growth of businesses, the attraction of investment and the creation of employment for the local community.
- 137. Whilst I am inclined to agree with the Complainants that the actions of Councillor Ford, as identified in this report, do not appear to support the delivery of sustainable economic outcomes, ultimately there is room for more than one interpretation of how best to maximise the sustainability of economic growth and the communities that depend on such growth.
- 138. Whilst, on balance, I prefer the complainants views on this point to Councillor Fords, I do not consider this point, on its own, to be one that amounts to a possible breach of the Council's Code.
- 139. CONSIDERATION AS TO WHETHER OR NOT THERE HAS BEEN A FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH THE COUNCIL'S CODE OF CONDUCT
- 140. Did the Code apply to the actions of Councillor Ford, which are the subject of this complaint?
- 141. Paragraph 1(1) of the Code applies to members of the Council.
- 142. Paragraph 1(3) provides that such members must comply with the provisions of the Code.
- 143. Paragraph 2(1) requires members to comply with the Code whenever acting in their official capacity as members. This means:
 - (a) Conducting the business of the Council (including the business of the members office); or
 - (b) Acting, claiming to act or giving the impression of acting as a representative of the Council.
- 144. According to Collins J in Livingstone v The Adjudication Panel for England [2006] EWHC 2533 (Admin). "official capacity will include anything done in dealing with staff, when representing the Council, in dealing with constituents problems and so on".
- 145. According to Charles J in R (Mullaney) v Adjudication Panel for England [2009] EWHC 72 (Admin) the use of a personal email address is not determinative in terms of establishing whether a member is acting in their official capacity.
- 146. Charles J also held that these and the other words and phrases in the code (which are to be applied in this report) are ordinary descriptive English words

- and their meaning and application will depend upon the context and the relevant facts.
- 147. Councillor Ford has said that he was acting both as a representative of his constituents and as a local resident on his own behalf. He has also sought to distinguish his public comments and postings between those made to the Press and the others that appear in his name on social media. He says that the former were made in his official capacity but the latter were not.
- 148. In my view, Councillor Ford was at all material times, acting in his official capacity.
- 149. By his own admission he was acting as the representative of his constituents in the Campaign to Save The Wheel Inn. He also said that he had a personal interest in the outcome of this campaign but he did not seek to distinguish between the two roles at any time. In any event, in my view, the two roles are indistinguishable on the facts and cannot be separated. Councillor Ford was, in my view, both conducting the business of his office as member of the Council and acting, claiming to act and giving the impression he was acting as a representative of the Council.
- 150. I believe Councillor Ford also recognised this position in terms of how he dealt with his position of Chairman of the Planning Committee at its meeting on 13th May 2014.
- 151. However, I would point out that having submitted an objection against the application for a Lawful Development Certificate, he attended the Committee meeting as its Chairman and, as Chairman, explained his strong opposition to the application. Having done so, he vacated the Chair and left the chamber when the item was then discussed (Page 71).
- 152. I make no criticism of Councillor Ford for his actions at the Planning Committee. However, it does demonstrate the intermingling of his roles in this matter and confirms my view that for the purposes of this investigation, they are virtually indistinguishable.
- 153. There are also more clear cut examples of Councillor Ford acting in his official capacity. Councillor Ford's Twitter Account "describes him as, amongst others, the representative of Willington and Findern on the Council (Page 77).
- 154. The Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page was established to oppose the proposed change of use of the pub to that of a funeral directors. Councillor Ford has confirmed that he acted as a representative of his constituents in this campaign and his contributions to this Facebook Page should, in my view, be read as being made in that capacity.

155. DID COUNCILLOR FORD FAIL TO COMPLY WITH THE COUNCIL'S CODE?

156. The Complainants have alleged that Councillor Ford failed to comply with the Council's Code and some of The General Principles of Public Life. As I read the Code, the substantive obligations in the Code are contained in the particular paragraphs I refer to below. I have, therefore, based my finding's on those paragraphs and not The General Principles.

- 157. By paragraph 3(1) members are required to treat others with respect. The Sanders v Kingston [2005] EWHC 1145 (Admin) Wilkie J held that respect "is a concept particularly where it describes the conduct of an official to others which is perfectly capable of being applied by a reasonable person considering a course of conduct so as to enable that person to know whether what they are doing, or are about to do, would, or would not comply with the code in that way".
- 158. On 8th July Councillor Ford tweeted on his own Twitter Account the words "smiling assassins! The face of the enemy" accompanied by a photograph of the team at Murrays including Mr and Mrs Barke.
- 159. In my judgement, this is an offensive and disrespectful comment and a breach of paragraph 3(1) of the Code.
- 160. On 8th July at 11:41 Councillor Ford commented that Murrays had probably offered those removing Campaign posters "a deal on burial, more posters removed, more money off". This and his comment on 11th June at 13:46 on the Save The Wheel Facebook Page that "they put cash above community, pounds above people" are both, in my judgement disrespectful, particularly given the nature of Murrays business and are a breach of Paragraph 3(1) of the Code.
- 161. On 12th August Councillor Ford "liked" (or endorsed) a Facebook accusation that Murrays were responsible for stealing or the unauthorised removal of a number of campaign poster boards. Both the allegation and its endorsement by Councillor Ford, are, in my judgement, disrespectful and a breach of paragraph 3(1) of the Code.
- 162. By paragraph 3(2)(b) of the Code members must not bully any person.
- 163. For the reasons set out in para 72 of this report, Councillor Fords posting of 1st August to the Campaign Facebook Page was intended to intimidate the complainants and as such, in my judgement, amounts to bullying and a breach of paragraph 3(2)(b) of the Code.
- 164. For the reasons set out in para 73 of this report I also find that the post of 20th August endorsed by Councillor Ford amounts to a breach of paragraph 3(2)(b). The residents campaign against Murrays was designed, at least in part, to intimidate them and to coerce them to relocate elsewhere. The entry of 20th August was, an example of such intimidation and was endorsed by Councillor Ford.
- 165. For the reasons stated in para 82 of this report I find that Councillor Fords tweet of 8th July on his own Twitter Account is in breach of paragraph 3(2)(b) of the Code.
- 166. For the reasons stated in paras 92 and 93 of this report I also find that Councillor Ford's email of 18th August amounts to bullying in breach of paragraph 3(2)(b) of the Code.
- 167. Councillor Ford also advocated a boycott of Murrays (Page 218). On 8th May he posted a message on the Facebook Campaign Page to that effect which he confirms in his own statement (paragraph 28) was designed to persuade

- them to relocate elsewhere. Again, in my judgement this amounts to bullying in breach of paragraph 3(2)(b) of the Code.
- 168. Alternatively, if a cumulative view is taken of the postings and their endorsement of a wider campaign of intimidation, they amount to a breach of paragraph 3(2)(b) of the Code.
- 169. By paragraph 5 of the Code, members must not conduct themselves in a manner which could reasonably be regarded as bringing their office or authority into disrepute.
- 170. In Livingstone v The Adjudication Panel for England [2006] EWHC 2533 (Admin), Collins J held that misuse of office "can obviously bring disrepute on the office".
- 171. In Sanders v Kingston, Wilkie J held that paragraph 5 (or its equivalent in the predecessor Model Code of Conduct) "adopts a concept which is well known in a number of different contexts as a method of identifying a level of conduct which is expected of persons holding certain positions, or being members of certain bodies. Once again it describes clearly the consequence of conduct which is prohibited in such a way as to enable a reasonable person to predict whether or not his actions or proposed action would or would not be in breach of the provision".
- 172. In my judgement, Councillor Ford is also in breach of paragraph 5 of the Code.
- 173. Given the nature and circumstances of the breaches of paragraphs 3(1) and 3(2)(b) Councillor Ford has in my judgement, conducted himself in a manner which could be reasonably be regarded as bringing his office of member and his authority (namely the Council) into disrepute.

174. EUROPEAN CONVENTION ON HUMAN RIGHTS

- 175. Can Councillor Ford rely on the Human Rights Act and Article 10 of the European Convention on Human Rights as a defence to the above findings? In other words, does Councillor Ford's right to freedom of expression override my findings that he has breached the Council's Code?
- 176. In Livingstone v The Adjudication Panel for England, Collins J said:
- 177. "There can be no doubt that restraints imposed by a code of conduct designed to uphold proper standards in public life are in principle likely to be within Article 10(2). But it is important that the restraints should not extend beyond what is necessary to maintain those standards."
- 178. Further, in my judgement, the provisions of the Code are prescribed by law. The Localism Act requires the Council to promote and maintain high standards of conduct by its members by adopting a Code of Conduct for the members.
- 179. In Sanders v Kingston, Wilkie J set out the three questions to be answered by a court in determining whether a finding that a member has breached a code of conduct had contravened Article 10. I paraphrase these as follows:

- 1. Was the Case Tribunal (or Hearing Sub Committee in this case) entitled as a matter of fact to conclude (if indeed it does) that Councillor Ford's conduct in this case was in breach of the Code of Conduct?
- 2. If so, was the finding in itself prima facie a breach of Article 10?
- 3. If so, was the restriction involved one which was justified by reason of the requirements of Article 10(2)?
- 180. These questions must also be addressed in this report in my role as appointed investigator, but it is for the Hearing Sub Committee to decide whether or not it upholds the complaint.
- 181. When considering justification under Article 10(2), it is plain from Sanders that "political expression" or "the expression of a political view" attract a higher degree of protection whilst expressions in personal or abusive terms do not attract the same higher level of protection. It is well-established that the limits of what is acceptable is wider where the subjects of the speech are politicians acting in their public capacity since politicians "lay themselves open to close scrutiny of their words and deeds and are expected to possess a thicker skin and greater tolerance than ordinary members of the public".

182. CONCLUSIONS

- 183. Applying those questions outlined above to the facts of this case I conclude that:
 - 1. As a matter of fact, based on my findings in this report, Councillor Ford has breached paragraphs 3(1), 3(2)(b) and 5 of the Council's Code for the reasons previously stated.
 - 2. On the face of it, my findings do potentially constitute a breach of Article 10 of the European Convention on Human Rights in relation to Councillor Ford.
 - 3. My findings however are justified under Article 10(2) and represent a proportionate interference with Councillor Ford's right to freedom of expression. Councillor Ford's comments and actions were not the expression of a political view, but an unjustified attack on Murrays and Mr and Mrs Barke. The subjects of these comments and actions were not politicians but ordinary members of the public (and their company Murrays) and, as such, the comments and actions did not attract the higher level of protection applicable to political expressions and the comments and actions would have undermined confidence in local government, the preservation of which (along with the imposition of minimum standards of behaviour) is a recognised aim of the Code.
 - Councillor Ford has breached those Code provisions I have identified above for the reasons I have given. My finding that Councillor Ford has breached the Code does not infringe his right to freedom of expression under Article 10.

184. COUNCILLOR FORD'S RESPONSE TO MY DRAFT REPORT

185. I sent my report in draft form to Councillor Ford for comment. In response he sent me the email dated 26 February 2015 (Page 296) in which he offers his apologies.

SCHEDULE 1

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Dear Councillor Ford,

In advance of our meeting on 29th October I set out below the details of the complaint against you.

It is alleged as follows:

That you have embarked on a crusade against Murrays Funeral Directors, inciting local people to act against it with the sole aim of damaging the business and its reputation in the community.

That you have instigated, maintained and continued to pursue a wholly personal campaign against an established and respected local business (namely Murrays Funeral Directors).

More specifically it is alleged:

That you have engaged in sustained activity against Murray's Independent Funeral Directors over a period of five months.

You have knowingly given false information to your constituents in order to galvanize support for a campaign that was rooted in personal interest i.e. you were unable to prevent your local public house, where you maintain you were a regular customer, from being closed by Punch Taverns and sold for another business purpose.

Item 1.

That you exchanged emails with a South Derbyshire District Council planning officer regarding a Lawful Change of Use Certificate for the Wheel Inn, Findern. The officer advised you that the application could not be resisted and that in the alternative it may be possible to seek a community asset order. However, the officer advised you that it was probably too late in the process to be successful.

It is alleged that you then proceeded to mislead your constituents into believing that the Lawful Change of Use Order could be prevented. You then wrote on the Save The Wheel Inn Facebook campaign page:

"I need to discuss with the planners where we stand legally. Hopefully the debate on Tuesday will provide options."

Copies of the email and Facebook entry are attached.

Item 2.

That you have on many occasions contributed to the Campaign Facebook Page, Save The Wheel Inn, Findern, in such a way as to keep the campaign active. On 1st August you wrote:

"I bet Murrays thought we had given in and weren't bothered anymore....... WRONG!! The fight goes on today, tomorrow, next week, next month, next year and until Murrays decide that they are not wanted in Findern and move on before they damage our community even more than they have done already! #casksnotcaskets"

That you contributed to a campaign twitter page (Wheelenders@wheelfindern) by retweeting on July 8th.

"@WheelFindern smiling assassins! The face of the enemy #casksnotcaskets #heinekennothearses #bassnotbodies"

That on August 18th 2014 you sent the following email:

"Dear Mr & Mrs Barke,

As you know all too well you and your business are not wanted in Findern. We all know that contractors are working on the building, we all know how much money you have paid for the building, please can I ask that you think seriously about spending any more money when you have a very attractive offer to buy the building back at a substantial profit. The group aren't going away, so please do the right thing and sell the pub and leave Findern alone with it's local pub back again.

Regards,

M Ford."

It is contended this type of contact as well as the content is entirely inappropriate, unwelcome and designed to be intimidating, and is an abuse of your public office.

On the 20th August 2014 you 'liked' a post on the campaign's Facebook page:

"Save the Wheel Inn Findern

4 Hours ago

As the activity increases at the Wheel it's a good chance for any supporters to call round and let their feelings be known — I'm sure there will be a warm welcome from caring Murrays — perhaps they will be able to tell us why they turned down the chance to move away from where they are not wanted whilst pocketing a quick profit Liked by M Ford"

Copies of the above communications are attached.

Item 3.

That you have repeatedly made personal comments about the directors of Murrays and about their business. It is alleged that you joined and supported a Boycott Murray's Facebook campaign, which was intended to persuade people not to use the business and cause the company financial difficulty. For example you wrote:

"We need to get as many as possible to state that they will boycott Murrays and use the Co Op or anybody but Murrays when the time comes, I would hate to think they sorted me out!"

You contributed as follows to the Campaign Facebook page in relation to the alleged removal of campaign posters on behalf of Murrays:

"Murrays have probably offered them a deal on burial, more posters removed, more money off."

It is contended that this type of campaigning is not only irresponsible for an elected member but, could amount to harassment.

That when you were approached by the complainants representative and asked what options there were in terms of engaging with the local community, you replied in the form of a text "Murrays selling up and moving on. They aren't wanted in Findern, despite David Barke and his letters of support, love to see how many of those there are."

You also added a comment on the Facebook page:

"I've yet to meet anybody who shows anything but contempt for horrific proposal. Of course Mr Barke can say they have received support from some people, possibly not villagers and possibly not much, we'll never know will we. For a company that prides itself on being caring and compassionate, what have they shown the village of Findern......nothing!"

Copies of these communications are attached, except for the text message, a copy of which I have requested.

Item 4.

It is alleged that you have repeated false information via social media sites causing severe distress to one of Murray's employees and her family. You subsequently wrote her a letter of apology.

That you have re-tweeted false information about Murray's as set out below:

"*Spoiler Alert* Residents hear rumours of 'a builder' offering funeral folks 5x what they paid...
£1.3m... Bob must be feeling rich!"

I feel the only way in which the pub could be saved would be to look at the 'Community Right to Bid' through the Localism Act 2011. In brief:

"The Community Right to Bid gives communities the power to nominate assets (buildings or land). If the local authority agrees that the asset is of community value they will put it on a published list. If any of these assets are put up for sale, a six week window of opportunity is triggered, during which any local community group may express an interest to purchase the asset. If they do express an interest, a further four and a half months window of opportunity is given so that the group may have time to find funding and put together a bid to purchase the asset on the open market".

SOUTH DERBYSHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL MEMBERS' CODE OF CONDUCT

Adopted on 28th June 2012 Effective from 1st July 2012

The General Principles of Public Life

You should behave in a way consistent with the following principles—

Selflessness	You should serve only the public interest and should never improperly confer an advantage or disadvantage on any person.	
Honesty and Integrity	You should not place yourself in situations where your honesty and integrity may be questioned, should not behave improperly and should on all occasions avoid the appearance of such behaviour.	
Objectivity	You should make decisions on merit, including when making appointments, awarding contracts, or recommending individuals for rewards or benefits.	
Accountability		
Openness	You should be as open as possible about your actions and those of your authority, and should be prepared to give reasons for those actions.	
Leadership	You should promote and support these principles by leadership, and by example, and should act in a way that secures or preserves public confidence.	

MEMBERS' CODE OF CONDUCT

Adopted on 28th June 2012 Effective from 1st July 2012

Under the Localism Act 2011 the Council must promote and maintain high standards of conduct by its members and adopt a Code of Conduct.

Part 1 General provisions

Introduction and Interpretation

- 1.—(1) This Code applies to you as a member of South Derbyshire District Council.
- (2) You should read this Code together with the general principles at page 2 (prescribed in Section 28 of the Localism Act).
- (3) You must comply with the provisions of this Code.
- (4) In this Code-

"interest" means a pecuniary or other interest required to be notified under this Code.

"meeting" means any meeting of-

- (a) the authority;
- (b) any of the authority's committees, sub-committees, joint committees, joint sub-committees, or area committees.

"member" includes a co-opted member and an appointed member.

"partner" means spouse or civil partner, a person with whom you are living as husband or wife, or a person with whom you are living as if you are civil partners.

"Register of Interests" means the Council's register of members' interests maintained under section 29(1) of the Localism Act 2011.

"sensitive interest" means an interest whose disclosure to the public could lead to you, or a person connected with you, being subjected to violence or intimidation.

Scope

2.—(1) You must comply with this Code whenever you act in your official capacity as a member of your authority. That is when you—

- (a) conduct the business of your authority (which, in this Code, Includes the business of the office to which you are elected or appointed); or
- (b) act, claim to act or give the impression you are acting as a representative of your authority.
- (2) Where you act as a representative of your authority—
 - (a) on another relevant authority, you must, when acting for that other authority, comply with that other authority's code of conduct; or
 - (b) on any other body, you must, when acting for that other body, comply with your authority's code of conduct, except and insofar as it conflicts with any other lawful obligations to which that other body may be subject.

General obligations

- 3.—(1) You must treat others with respect.
- (2) You must not—
 - (a) do anything which may cause your authority to breach any equality laws;
 - (b) bully any person;
 - (c) Intimidate or attempt to intimidate any person who is or is likely to be-
 - (i) a complainant,
 - (ii) a witness, or
 - (iii) involved in the administration of any investigation or proceedings.

in relation to an allegation that a member (including yourself) has failed to comply with his or her authority's code of conduct; or

(d) do anything which compromises or is likely to compromise the impartiality of those who work for, or on behalf of, your authority.

4. You must not-

- (a) disclose information given to you in confidence by anyone, or information acquired by you which you believe, or ought reasonably to be aware, is of a confidential nature, except where—
 - (i) you have the consent of a person authorised to give it:
 - (ii) you are required by law to do so;

- (iii) the disclosure is made to a third party for the purpose of obtaining professional advice provided that the third party agrees not to disclose the information to any other person; or
- (iv) the disclosure is-
 - (aa) reasonable and in the public interest; and
 - (bb) made in good faith and in compliance with the reasonable requirements of the authority; or
- (b) prevent another person from gaining access to information to which that person is entitled by law.
- 5. You must not conduct yourself in a manner which could reasonably be regarded as bringing your office or authority into disrepute.

6. You-

- (a) must not use or attempt to use your position as a member improperly to confer on or secure for yourself or any other person, an advantage or disadvantage;
- (b) must, when using or authorising the use by others of the resources of your authority—
 - act in accordance with your authority's reasonable requirements;
 - (ii) ensure that such resources are not used improperly for political purposes (including party political purposes); and
 - (iii) have regard to any applicable Code of Recommended Practice on Local Authority Publicity made under the Local Government Act 1986.
- 7.—(1) When reaching decisions on any matter you must have regard to any relevant advice provided to you by—
 - (a) your authority's Chief Finance Officer; or
 - (b) your authority's Monitoring Officer,

where that officer is acting pursuant to his or her statutory duties.

(2) You must give reasons for all decisions in accordance with any statutory requirements and any reasonable additional requirements imposed by your authority.

Part 2 Disclosable Pecuniary Interests

8. Notification of disclosable pecuniary interests

Within 28 days of becoming a member or co-opted member, you must notify the Monitoring Officer of any disclosable pecuniary interests. A disclosable pecuniary interest is an interest of yourself or your partner (which means spouse or civil partner, a person with whom you are living as husband or wife, or a person with whom you are living as if you are civil partners) within the descriptions in the schedule attached to this Code.

9. Non-participation where you have a disclosable pecuniary interest

- (1) If you are present at a meeting and have a disclosable pecuniary interest in any matter to be considered or being considered at the meeting—
 - (a) You must not participate in any discussion of the matter at the meeting.
 - (b) You must not participate in any vote taken on the matter at the meeting.
 - (c) If the interest is not registered, you must disclose the interest to the meeting.
 - (d) If the interest is not registered and is not the subject of a pending notification, you must notify the Monitoring Officer of the interest within 28 days.

10. Dispensations

The Council may grant you a dispensation, but only in specified circumstances, to enable you to participate and vote on a matter in which you have a disclosable pecuniary interest.

11. Offences

- (1) It is a criminal offence to—
 - (a) Fail to notify the Monltoring Officer of any disclosable pecuniary interest within 28 days of election.
 - (b) Fail to disclose a disclosable pecuniary interest at a meeting if it is not on the register.
 - (c) Fail to notify the Monitoring Officer within 28 days of a disclosable pecuniary interest that is not on the register that you have disclosed to a meeting.
 - (d) Participate in any discussion or vote on a matter in which you have a disclosable pecuniary interest.
 - (e) As an executive member discharging a function acting alone, and having a disclosable pecuniary interest in such a matter, fail to notify the Monitoring Officer within 28 days of the interest.

- (f) Knowingly or recklessly provide information that is false or misleading in notifying the Monitoring Officer of a disclosable pecuniary Interest or in disclosing such interest to a meeting.
- (2) The criminal penalties available to a court are to impose a fine not exceeding level 5 on the standard scale¹ and disqualification from being a councillor for up to 5 years.

Part 3 Other Interests

12. Notification of interests

- (1) Subject to paragraph 17 (sensitive interests) you must, within 28 days of—
 - (a) this Code being adopted by or applied to your authority; or
 - (b) your election or appointment to office (where that is later), notify the Monitoring Officer in writing of the details of your other personal interests, where they fall within the following categories, for inclusion in the register of interests.
- (2) You have a personal interest in any business of your authority where either it relates to or is likely to affect—
 - (a) any body of which you are a member or in a position of general control or management and to which you are appointed or nominated by your authority;
 - (b) any body-
 - (i) exercising functions of a public nature;
 - (li) directed to charitable purposes; or
 - (ill) one of whose principal purposes includes the influence of public opinion or policy (including any political party or trade union), of which you are a member or in a position of general control or management;
 - (c) any easement, servitude, interest or right in or over land which does not carry with it a right for you (alone or jointly with another) to occupy the land or to receive income;
- (3) Subject to paragraph 17 (sensitive interests) you must, within 28 days of becoming aware of any new interest or change to any interest registered under paragraph (1), notify the Monitoring Officer of the details of that new interest or change.

¹ Currently £5000.

13. Disclosure of interests

- (1) Subject to sub-paragraphs (2) to (5), where you have a personal interest described in paragraph 12 above or in paragraph (2) below in any business of your authority, and where you are aware or ought reasonably to be aware of the existence of the personal interest, and you attend a meeting of your authority at which the business is considered, you must disclose to that meeting the existence and nature of that interest at the commencement of that consideration, or when the interest becomes apparent.
- (2) (a) You have a personal interest in any business of your authority—
 - (i) where a decision in relation to that business might reasonably be regarded as affecting your well-being or financial position or the well-being or financial position of a *relevant person* to a greater extent than the majority of other council tax payers, ratepayers or inhabitants of the electoral division or ward, as the case may be, affected by the decision; or
 - (ii) it relates to or Is likely to affect any of the interests you have registered as a disclosable pecuniary interest.
- (b) In sub-paragraph (2)(a)(i), a relevant person is-
 - (i) a member of your family or any person with whom you have a close association; or
 - (ii) any person or body who employs or has appointed such persons, any firm in which they are a partner, or any company of which they are directors;
 - (iii) any person or body in whom such persons have a beneficial interest in a class of securities exceeding the nominal value of £25,000; or
 - (iv) any body of a type described in paragraph 12(2)(a) or (b).
- (3) Where you have a personal interest in any business of your authority which relates to or is likely to affect a person described in paragraph 12(2)(a) or 12(2)(b)(i), you need only disclose to the meeting the existence and nature of that interest when you address the meeting on that business.
- (4) Where you have a personal interest but, by virtue of paragraph 17, sensitive Information relating to it is not registered in your authority's register of members' interests, you must indicate to the meeting that you have a personal interest, but need not disclose the sensitive information to the meeting.
- (5) Where you have a personal interest in any business of your authority and you have made an executive decision in relation to that business, you must ensure that any written statement of that decision records the existence and nature of that interest.

14. Non-participation where you have a pecuniary interest

- (1) Where you have a personal interest in any business of your authority, you also have a pecuniary interest in that business where the interest is one which a member of the public with knowledge of the relevant facts would reasonably regard as so significant that it is likely to prejudice your judgement of the public Interest and where that business—
 - (a) affects your financial position or the financial position of a person or body described in paragraphs 12(2) or 13(2); or
 - (b) relates to the determining of any approval, consent, licence, permission or registration in relation to you or any person or body described in paragraphs 12(2) or 13(2).
- (2) Subject to paragraphs (3) and (4), if you are present at a meeting and have a pecuniary interest in any matter to be considered or being considered at the meeting—
 - (a) You must not participate in any discussion of the matter at the meeting.
 - (b) You must not participate in any vote taken on the matter at the meeting.
 - (c) If the interest is not registered, you must disclose the interest to the meeting.
 - (d) If the interest is not registered and is not the subject of a pending notification, you must notify the Monitoring Officer of the interest within 28 days.
- (3) Where you have a pecuniary interest in any business of your authority, you may attend a meeting but only for the purpose of making representations, answering questions or giving evidence relating to the business, provided that the public are also allowed to attend the meeting for the same purpose, whether under a statutory right or otherwise and you leave the room where the meeting is held immediately after making representations, answering questions or giving evidence.
- (4) Subject to you disclosing the interest at the meeting, you may attend a meeting and vote on a matter where you have a pecuniary interest that relates to the functions of your authority in respect of—
 - (i) housing, where you are a tenant of your authority provided that those functions do not relate particularly to your tenancy or lease;
 - (ii) school meals or school transport and travelling expenses, where you are a parent or guardian of a child in full time education, or are a parent governor of a school, unless it relates particularly to the school which the child attends;
 - (iii) statutory sick pay under Part XI of the Social Security Contributions and Benefits Act 1992, where you are in receipt of, or are entitled to the receipt of, such pay;
 - (iv) an allowance, payment or indemnity given to members;

- (v) any ceremonial honour given to members; and
- (vi) setting council tax or a precept under the Local Government Finance Act 1992.
- (5) Where, as an executive member, you may discharge a function alone, and you become aware of a pecuniary interest in a matter being dealt with, or to be dealt with by you, you must notify the Monitoring Officer of the interest and must not take any steps or further steps in the matter, or seek improperly to influence a decision about the matter.

15. Interests arising in relation to overview and scrutiny committees

- (1) In any business before an overview and scrutiny committee of your authority (or of a sub-committee of such a committee) where—
 - (a) that business relates to a decision made (whether implemented or not) or action taken by the executive or another of your authority's committees, sub-committees, joint committees or joint sub-committees; and
 - (b) at the time the decision was made or action was taken, you were a member of the executive, committee, sub-committee, joint committee or joint sub-committee mentioned in paragraph (a) and you were present when that decision was made or action was taken,

you may only attend a meeting of the overview and scrutiny committee for the purpose of answering questions or giving evidence relating to the business, and you must leave the room where the meeting is held Immediately after making representations, answering questions or giving evidence.

Part 4 Registration of Members' Interests

16. Registering your interests

- (1) You must notify the Monltoring Officer of any interest you have within 28 days of-
 - (a) becoming a member.
 - (b) disclosing an interest in any matter being considered at a meeting (if that interest is not already on the Register of Interests).
 - (c) if you are an executive member, becoming aware of an interest in any matter to be dealt with, or being dealt with,
- (2) Any interests notified to the Monitoring Officer will be included in the register of interests.
- (3) A copy of the register will be available for public inspection and will be published on the authority's website.

(4) Subject to paragraph 17, you must, within 28 days of becoming aware of any new interest or change to any interest registered under paragraph (1), register details of that new interest or change by providing written notification to the Monitoring Officer.

17. Sensitive interests

- (1) Where you consider that you have a sensitive interest, and the Monitoring Officer agrees-
 - (a) if the interest is entered on the Register of Interests, any copy of the Register of Interests made available for inspection and any published version of the register will exclude details of the interest, but may state that you have an interest, the details of which are withheld.
 - (b) if the interest is not entered on the Register of Interests, at any relevant meeting you must disclose the fact that you have a disclosable interest, but not the nature of the interest.
- (2) You should, within 28 days of becoming aware of any change of circumstances which means that your interest is no longer sensitive, notify the Monitoring Officer.

18. Gifts and Hospitality

- (1) You must, within 28 days of receipt, notify the Monitoring Officer In writing of any gift, benefit or hospitality with a value in excess of £100 which you have accepted as a member from any person or body other than the authority.
- (2) The Monitoring Officer will place your notification on a public register of gifts and hospitality.
- (3) The duty to notify the Monitoring Officer does not apply where the gift, benefit or hospitality comes within any description approved by the authority for this purpose.

Schedule

Disclosable Pecuniary Interests

The dutles to register, disclose and not to participate in respect of any matter in which a member has a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest are set out in Chapter 7 of the Localism Act 2011.

Disclosable Pecuniary Interests are defined in The Relevant Authorities (Disclosable Pecuniary Interests) Regulations 2012 as follows:—

Subject	Prescribed description
Employment, office, trade, profession or vacation	Any employment, office, trade, profession or vocation carried on for profit or gain.
Sponsorship	Any payment or provision of any other financial benefit (other than from the relevant authority) made or provided within the relevant period in respect of any expenses incurred by M in carrying out duties as a member, or towards the election expenses of M. This includes any payment or financial benefit from a trade union within the meaning of the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation) Act 1992).
Contracts	Any contract which is made between the relevant person (or a body in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest) and the relevant authority— (a) under which goods or services are to be provided or works are to be executed; and (b) which has not been fully discharged.
Land	Any beneficial interest in land which is within the area of the relevant authority.
Licences	Any licence (alone or jointly with others) to occupy land in the area of the relevant authority for a month or longer.
Corporate tenancies	Any tenancy where (to M's knowledge)— (a) the landlord is the relevant authority; and (b) the tenant is a body in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest.

Securities

Any beneficial interest in securities of a body where—

- (a) that body (to M's knowledge) has a place of business or land in the area of the relevant authority; and
- (b) either-
- (i) the total nominal value of the securities exceeds £25,000 or one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that body; or
- (ii) if the share capital of that body is of more than one class, the total nominal value of the shares of any one class in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest exceeds one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that class.

For this purpose -

"the Act" means the Localism Act 2011:

"body in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest" means a firm in which the relevant person is a partner or a body corporate of which the relevant person is a director, or in the securities of which the relevant person has a beneficial interest;

"director" includes a member of the committee of management of an industrial and provident society;

"land" excludes an easement, servitude, interest or right in or over land which does not carry with it a right for the relevant person (alone or jointly with another) to occupy the land or to receive Income;

"M" means a member of a relevant authority;

"member" includes a co-opted member;

"relevant authority" means the authority of which M is a member;

"relevant period" means the period of 12 months ending with the day on which M gives a notification for the purposes of section 30(1) or 31(7), as the case may be, of the Act;

"relevant person" means M or any other person referred to in section 30(3)(b) of the Act;

"securities" means shares, debentures, debenture stock, loan stock, bonds, units of a collective investment scheme within the meaning of the Financial Services and Markets Act 2000 and other securities of any description, other than money deposited with a building society.

Witness Statement of David Anthony Barke



- I, David Anthony Barke, of 23 York Street, Burton upon Trent DE14 2LX, state as follows:
 - 1. I will refer in this statement to Schedule 1 which is a paginated bundle of relevant documentation and the references in this statement to page numbers are, unless otherwise indicated, references to the bundle pagination.
 - 2. Both myself and my wife Susan Barke, are the joint owners and directors of Murrays Funeral Directors Limited which trades as Murrays Independent Funeral Directors ("Murrays").
 - 3. The business is based in Burton upon Trent. It is a small enterprise currently employing eight members of staff.
 - 4. Mrs Barke and I had decided a number of years ago that we would seek to expand our business into South Derbyshire and for this purpose would acquire additional premises. We had viewed a number of buildings over that period but their location had not fitted our purposes.
 - 5. In late September 2013 we became aware that The Wheel Inn Findern had been closed and was on the market. It was our understanding that as a pub it had struggled for support and custom for many years and had been for sale since June 2013.
 - 6. An offer to purchase the building was made in December 2013 on behalf of Murrays. The owners Punch Taverns were advised that the building would be used for a funeral directors and not a public house.
 - 7. The pub did reopen temporarily in December 2013. I visited the pub on three occasions in this period with Mrs Barke and found that we were the only customers.
 - The offer to purchase the building was accepted in January 2014. Contracts were exchanged on 2nd April 2014 and the purchase completed on 16th April 2014.
 - 9. The business provides an invaluable service to people at a particularly vulnerable moment in their lives. The new site at Findern will enable Murrays to offer local people an alternative to having to travel to Burton, Derby or Swadlincote to look after their loved ones and have the added reassurance that their relatives are close by.
 - 10. Murrays instructed Planning Consultants DPDS Consulting Group ("DPDS") to advise in relation to the conversion of the building from a pub into a funeral directors. DPDS advised that it was permissible to make this conversion without an application to South Derbyshire District Council as planning authority. This was because both uses fell within the same permitted category of uses. The pub was an "A4" use and a funeral directors was an "A1" and it was permitted to change between them in the way envisaged without the requirement to apply for planning permission for such a change of use. However, we were advised that in order to be sure we should submit an application to the local planning authority for confirmation that the proposed change of use was lawfully permitted. This was an application for a Lawful Development Certificate and was made on 27th March 2014.

- 11. We decided that in the interests of commercial confidentiality, the planning application would be submitted in the name of DPDS as agent. The local market for funeral directors services is highly competitive and we did not wish to make known our plans until it was absolutely necessary.
- 12. By email of 31st March 2014 (Page 50) Councillor Ford objected to Murrays planning application. Councillor Ford also posted a message on his own Facebook Page (Page 176) inviting "all Findern folk" to oppose the application. He also urges his readers to "help save the Wheel".
- 13. The Area Planning Officer replied to Councillor Ford on 31st March (Pages 49 to 50) informing him that the planning application could not be resisted.
- 14. On 8th May at 14:52 (Page 218) Councillor Ford posted on the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page a message saying that he needed to discuss with the planners "where we stand legally". Referring to the forthcoming meeting of the Planning Committee he says he hopes that the debate "will provide options".
- 15. On 13th May 2014 (the day of the Planning Committee meeting), Councillor Ford posted a message on the Save The Wheel Inn Facebook Page (Page 216) asking the objectors to attend early and to be in the Council Chamber by 6pm when the meeting was due to start.
- 16. The officer's report for the Planning Committee (Pages 65 to 70) explained that an application for planning permission was not required and recommended that a Certificate of Lawfulness be granted.
- 17. The minutes of the Planning Committee of 13th May 2014 in relation to this application (**Pages 71 to 75**) state as follows:

"Application for a lawful development certificate for a change of use from class A4 (Drinking Establishment) to class A1 (Funeral Directors) at The Wheel Inn, 25 Main Street, Findern 9/2014/0286/Z.

The Head of Planning Services explained to members the legal basis for this application. National planning law allowed for them to be converted from their current use as a public house to use as a funeral directors. This change did not require the agreement of the Planning Committee. The request before the Committee, therefore, was simply to confirm that this change was allowed under the law. As this was simply a statement of fact, the Committee would have no option but agree to do this.

The consequences of not granting the certificate were discussed. Members were informed that such a decision would be subject to appeal (possibly through a judicial review) which the Council would be likely to lose on a matter of law and, potentially, could have costs awarded against it.

Resolved:-

That the application for a lawful development certificate for a change of use from Class A4 (drinking establishment) to Class A1 (funeral directors) be approved."

- 18. On 13th May 2014 Councillor Ford "liked" a comment on the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page which was to the effect that the Council had no option but to agree to the change of use and that residents were invited to the Planning Committee to have a chance to speak and hear the explanation of why the Council could not refuse the application (Page 215).
- 19. Councillor Ford was aware from the outset that there were no planning grounds for refusing the application for a Certificate of Lawfulness. He told the Derby Telegraph on 14th May 2014 "There was no way the committee would turn it down" (Page 245). Nevertheless he misled his constituents into believing that if they objected to the application and made representations to the Planning Committee the application could have been refused. This was done in order to advance his personal interest in retaining the pub, to cause maximum distress to myself and Mrs Barke and for the purposes of self-promotion.
- 20. The Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Campaign Page dates from 4th April 2014. By the post on his own Facebook Page of 31st March 2014 (Page 176) Councillor Ford effectively initiated this campaign by asking "all Findern folk" to "help save The Wheel".
- 21. Councillor Ford's post of 31st March (above) also gave rise to some further posts including that by an post of 31st March 2014 at 15:22 (Page 177) when he said "I'll burn the funeral directors down". This was a comment that my wife and I found very distressing because it appeared to suggest that we were personally in danger as a result of the campaign.
- 22. I believe that six is an alias used by six is, I believe to be married to Councillor Ford's six also believe that the Campaign Facebook Page is administered by who is the post shown on 6th May at 02:30 shown at (Page 219) which appears to show that six the point of contact for items to be posted on the Campaign Page. This places Councillor Ford at the heart of the opposition and the campaign against Murrays.
- 23. Apart from initiating the campaign against Murrays, Councillor Ford has also made numerous contributions to the Facebook Campaign Page (Pages 181 to 224) and has helped to sustain the campaign and keep it active. Some examples are set out below.
- 24. On 5th April 2014 Councillor Ford "liked" a post requesting 21 people to support the establishment of a community group to apply to the Council to have The Wheel Inn listed as an asset of Community Value (**Page 224**).
- 25. On 12th April at 15:31 (Page 222) he said that the pub "isn't going to die without a massive fight".
- 26. On 14th April (**Page 221**) he asks those reading the post to "keep spreading the message that we need to keep our village pub open".
- 27. On 13th May (Page 216) he posted a note reminding the campaign supporters to be in the Council Chamber for the Planning Committee meeting by 6pm. This is clear evidence that he is coordinating the opposition to the planning application.

- 28. Also on 13th May (Page 215) Councillor Ford "liked" a post saying that every option will be explored to persuade Murrays that Findern villagers "want casks not caskets", a comment that my wife and I found offensive.
- 29. On 14th May (**Page 214**) referring to the Asset of Community Value application he said "we fight on".
- 30. On 26th May at 14:03 (**Page 208**) Councillor Ford posted a message which confirmed that he was displaying a poster at his house supporting the campaign. Further on 7th June at 05:29 (**Page 205**), referring to the removal of campaign posters, he advocates the displaying of replacement posters wherever they are removed.
- 31. On 21st June (**Page 202**) he is shown wearing a "Save The Wheel" Tshirt. This was the date of the Findern Fete where the Campaign Group had a stall. A post by Councillor Ford at 17:21 on 21st June (**Page 201**) confirms that he was present at the campaign stall on that day.
- 32. On 25th June at 14:33 (**Page 199**) Councillor Ford posted a message together with a campaign photograph (in which he appears). The message urged us not to come to Findern
- 33. On 1st August (Page 190) Councillor Ford posted the following message: "I bet Murrays thought we had given in and weren't bothered anymoreWRONG!! The fight goes on today, tomorrow, next week, next month, next year and until Murrays decide that they are not wanted in Findern and move on before they damage our community even more than they have done already! #casksnotcaskets".
- 34. On the 20th August (**Page 185**) Councillor Ford "liked" the following post "As the activity increases at The Wheel it's a good chance for any supporters to call round and let their feelings be known I'm sure there will be a warm welcome from caring Murrays perhaps they will be able to tell us why they turned down the chance to move away from where they are not wanted whilst pocketing a quick profit".
- 35. At this point I should explain the allegation in the above post that Murrays "turned down the chance to move away whilst pocketing a quick profit". Shortly before the purchase of the pub was completed, DPDS informed us that Councillor Ford had put forward a local resident and builder (Mark Gregory) who was interested in buying The Wheel Inn. On 28th April 2014 Mr Gregory made an offer to buy The Wheel Inn through our PR representatives Optimum PR. The offer was less than Murrays total outlay for the building and was rejected. In any event, we had purchased the property for the purposes of expanding the business and not as an investment. Mr Gregory made a further increased offer on 28th May 2014 which was also rejected. On 17th June 2014, Mr Gregory told the Derby Telegraph (Pages 243 to 244) "I will do anything legal I can to stop it from going ahead including trying to stop the people working on the site. I want to use disruptive tactics to make life difficult for them". On 26th June 2014 Mr Gregory made a further offer by letter (Page 271) which was also rejected.
- 36. The above post, of 20th August, which Councillor Ford endorsed, misrepresented the position of Murrays in two ways. Firstly, that we may be

prepared to sell the property for investment purposes. Secondly, that the offers we had received represented a significant profit in relation to our outlay, which was not the case. This post also encouraged the campaign supporters to "call round and let their feelings be known", in other words to intimidate us. Intimidation was a key objective of the campaign as evidenced by Mr Gregory's threat, on behalf of the campaign, to use disruptive tactics.

- 37. Councillor Ford also has a Twitter Account Management on South Derbyshire District Council" (Page 77).
- 38. Councillor Ford has also utilised his Twitter Account to support the Save The Wheel Inn Campaign and has posted a number of entries for that purpose (Pages 76 to 146).
- 39. On 8th July 2014 he retweeted a comment from a Twitter account called WheelEnders @WheelFindern (Page 98). This account was established "to fight against" the proposed change of use at The Wheel Inn (Pages 147 to 173).
- 40. Councillor Ford's Tweet of 8th July refers to a photograph of the team at Murrays including myself and Mrs Barke. The Entry on the WheelEnders account refers to us as "money grabbing ghouls" and Councillor Ford refers to us as "smiling assassins! The face of the enemy". I consider this to be offensive and intimidating.
- 41. On 18th August 2014 Councillor Ford sent an email to us in the following terms "Dear Mr & Mrs Barke, As you know all too well you and your business are not wanted in Findern. We all know that contractors are working on the building, we all know how much money you have paid for the building, please can I ask that you think seriously about spending any more money when you have a very attractive offer to buy the building back at a substantial profit. The group aren't going away, so please do the right thing and sell the pub and leave Findern alone with its local pub back again. Regards, M Ford. Sent from my iPhone" (Page 272)
- 42. I consider that this type of contact as well as the content is entirely inappropriate for a Councillor. It is designed to be intimidating and is an abuse of Councillor Ford's public office.
- 43. Councillor Ford encouraged and supported a Boycott Murrays Funeral Directors Facebook Page which joined Facebook on 8th May 2014 (Pages 225 to 228). On that same day at 14:54 (Page 218) he posted on the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page a message saying "we need to get as many as possible to state that they will boycott Murrays and use the Co-Op or anybody but Murrays when the times comes I would hate to think they had sorted me out!" He also retweeted an open letter on 11th July 2014 asking campaign supporters and sympathisers not to use Murrays (Pages 86 to 87).
- 44. The Boycott Page says it is about boycotting Murrays "Make sure nobody ever gives this company any future business whatsoever." "I wouldn't be seen dead at Murrays." An entry on 9th May (with typo) also asks readers to spread the word for everyone to boycott Murrays (Page 227) "This WILL have a negative impact on their business... and ultimately force them to reconsider taking away out village pub.".

- 45. The Boycott Campaign was intended to cause Murrays financial loss and detriment and was fully supported by Councillor Ford.
- 46. Councillor Ford also made unwarranted and insulting remarks about myself and Mrs Barke and our business. On 8th July at 11:41 (Page 195) Councillor Ford (in response to a question on the Save The Wheel Facebook Page asking who was removing campaign posters) commented "Murrays have probably offered them a deal on burial, more posters removed, more money off!".
- 47. On 14th May at 08:00 he made the following comment on the Save The Wheel Inn Facebook Page: "I've yet to meet anybody who shows anything but contempt for horrific proposal. Of course Mr Barke can say they have received support from some people, possibly not villagers and possibly not much, we'll never know will we. For a company that prides itself on being caring and compassionate, what have they shown the village of Findern.....nothing!" (Page 213). And on 11th June at 13:46 (with typo) "Murrays really need to understand how much the pub meant to us, it's a real shame they didn't come into our community and see how much The Wheel meant to so many of us, really shows how they feel about us, for them it's how much they put cash above community, pounds above people, profit above pride, do do what they are doing to us they cannot be proud..... but then again!" (Page 204).
- 48. We contacted Councillor Ford on 17th April 2014 via our PR representative to seek his help in opening dialogue with the local community. A meeting was arranged for 23rd April 2014. However, the meeting ultimately did not take place. We offered to meet him with the community and reassure them about how our business would operate and answer any questions or concerns they may have. We were informed that Councillor Ford and his constituents were only prepared to meet us to discuss other options including us disposing of The Wheel Inn and relocating our business away from Findern.
- 49. On 29th May 2014 Councillor Ford was again approached by our PR representative who asked about options for engaging with the community. Councillor Ford replied by text saying: "Murrays selling and moving on. They aren't wanted in Findern despite David Barke and his letters of support, love to see how many of those they are." (Page 270).
- 50. The reference to letters of support was to a comment I had made to the Derby Telegraph on 14th May 2014 (Page 246), when I referred to "many messages of support sent to us privately from Findern residents". We had received a number of such messages but Councillor Ford was effectively accusing me of lying about the support we had received.
- 51. Councillor Ford has also caused severe distress to one of our employees.
- 52. Our office manager lives in the village of Findern. I had made her aware of our plans in relation to The Wheel Inn prior to 10th May 2014. I had requested her to keep this information confidential on grounds of commercial confidentiality. She told me that she had been asked by local residents if she knew which undertakers were planning to acquire the pub but she had replied that she did not.

- 53. On 16th May 2014 my office manager informed me that she had seen various posts on Facebook which inferred she was responsible for bringing Murrays to Findern. She also informed me that Councillor Ford had repeated this allegation on social media. She was distressed and had become concerned for her own safety.
- 54. On 16th May 2014 my office manager informed me that further social media comments had been directed at her and that she felt like a prisoner in her own home
- 55. My office manager became very agitated and had been in tears at work. She said that she and her husband felt suicidal. Mrs Barke and I decided we must help her and requested a meeting with Councillor Ford. The meeting took place on 21st May 2014. Councillor Ford apologised to my office manager and agreed to arrange for the offending social media postings to be removed which I understand he duly did. He also gave my colleague a letter of apology (Page 273). As a result of the harassment and intimidation suffered by my colleague she has made arrangements to sell her home and move away from the area. She has also resigned from her position with Murrays which represents a significant operational loss to the business.
- 56. Councillor Ford has also retweeted false information about Murrays. On June 11th 2014 he retweeted the following: "*Spoiler Alert* Residents hear rumours of 'a builder' offering funeral folks 5x what they paid... £1.3m ... Bob must be feeling rich!" (Page 119). Given that Mr Gregory's highest offer was £340,000, this is a gross distortion of the true position.
- 57. Councillor Ford also "liked" or endorsed a baseless accusation that Mrs Barke and I were stealing campaign posters displayed in the village. On 12th August 2014 he "liked" the following Facebook accusation: "Do you suppose Murrays are using all those poster boards they have stolen to build a coffin for the heart of our community that they have so cruelly ripped out?" (Page 187). I emphatically deny that we have taken any posters at all nor have we requested anyone else to do so.
- 58. In conclusion, I contend for the reasons stated above that we have not been treated with respect by Councillor Ford. Further he has sought to bully, intimidate and harass us. As a result of his actions he has brought his office and his authority into disrepute.
- 59. In considering all aspects of our complaint, we have also examined the South Derbyshire District Council Corporate Plan. Under "Sustainable Growth and Opportunity, Long term outcomes, we note Go1. Developing economic and employment opportunities within the district". We do not consider Councillor Ford's behaviour as an elected member to be in any way supportive of our business. Indeed, it is worth noting that Councillor Ford's actions are directly opposed to the following statement from the leader of South Derbyshire District Council (Councillor Bob Wheeler): "It's vitally important to recognise the pivotal role that local companies play. We're proud to offer a vibrant, sustainable environment in which firms can flourish and thrive. Through innovation and expertise, South Derbyshire is bucking the trend and prides itself on being 'open for business."

WITNESS STATEMENT OF COUNCILLOR MARTYN FORD



- I, Martyn Ford, of 18 Mill Close, Findern, Derby, DE65 6AP, state as follows:
 - 1. I refer in this statement to Schedule 1 which is a paginated bundle of relevant documentation and the references in this statement to page numbers are unless otherwise indicated, references to the bundle pagination.
 - I make this statement in response to the complaint made by David and Susan Barke as Directors of and on behalf of Murrays Funeral Directors Limited which trades as Murrays Independent Funeral Directors ("Murrays") (Pages 1 -to 10). In this statement I will address each of the allegations set out in the complaint in turn.
 - 3. By way of background I confirm that I have lived in the village of Findern for 56 years and have been visiting the Wheel Inn public house since the early 1970's. I was elected to South Derbyshire District Council as Ward Councillor for Willington and Findern in 2003 and have held the position of Chairman of the Planning Committee since the 2008/2009 Municipal Year.
 - 4. I will now deal with the details of the complaint against me point by point as set out in the complaint.
 - 5. I deny that I have embarked on a crusade against Murrays Funeral Directors, nor have I incited local people to act against it with the sole aim of damaging the business and its reputation.
 - 6. I deny that I have instigated, maintained and continued to pursue a personal campaign against Murrays Funeral Directors.
 - 7. More specifically I deny:
 - (i) That I have engaged in sustained activity against Murrays Funeral Directors over a period of five months
 - (ii) That I have knowingly given false information to my constituents in order to galvanize support for a campaign based on personal interest, i.e. to prevent the closure of the Wheel Inn.

8. Item 1 in the Complaint

When I exchanged emails with the Area Planning Officer on 31st March 2014 I was advised that it would not be possible to resist the application to convert the Wheel Inn public house to a funeral directors (Pages 49 to 50).

- 9. This advice followed me registering my very strong objection to the application. Whilst I and some of my constituents were aware that the pub was being marketed for sale, we were under the impression that the owner (Punch Taverns) had imposed a condition of sale that the building had to remain as a pub.
- 10. I am very passionate about my local community, both as the local councillor and as a longstanding local resident. I was objecting to the planning application both as a local resident and as local councillor on behalf of local residents. I had attended a meeting in the pub shortly after the planning application had come to my attention and at least 100 objectors had attended.

They had asked me, as their representative, to oppose the application on their behalf.

- 11. Both myself and my constituents were shocked by this application and its potential consequences for the village of Findern. A funeral directors was considered totally inappropriate in a village setting in such a prominent position. This is a feature building at the gateway to the village.
- 12. I had been copied into an email from the Campaigns Officer at The Campaign for Real Ale dated 8th April 2014 (Pages 61 to 64) which advised that the Council had power to issue an "Article 4 Direction" in relation to the pub. CAMRA advised that this would remove the permitted development rights currently enjoyed by the building and that any proposed Change of Use would require full planning permission. The advice was that it would be possible to object to such an application on the grounds of the loss of community value.
- 13. When I said that, hopefully the debate at Planning Committee will provide options, I was not referring to the merits of the application for a Lawful Development Certificate for the proposed Change of Use. I had in mind the possibility that the Committee might defer the application or that the Council might be prepared to pursue an Article 4 Direction. This statement by me was made in reply to an earlier one on the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Campaign Page at 14:52 pm on 8th May 2014. The question posted on the Facebook Campaign Page was "is it too late for the Council to go down the direction 4 route?" (Page 218).
- 14. I was also aware that an application had been submitted to the Council on 7th April 2014 to list the Wheel Inn as an Asset of Community Value (Pages 51 to 59). If successful this would have enabled the Save the Wheel Inn Community Group to express an interest in purchasing the Wheel Inn and provide an opportunity for the Group to bid to purchase the pub. This application was eventually rejected by the Council but not until early June 2014.
- 15. At no time did I advise my constituents that the Change of Use application could be prevented. The Planning Services Manager decided to take the application to the Planning Committee given the level of public interest. CAMRA had advised the representative of the Save The Wheel Inn Community Group on 8th April 2014 (Pages 61 to 64) that a Change of Use application was not, in fact, required for conversion to a funeral directors. CAMRA had also advised the Group to "rally the troops and make the Council (and Punch and the future developer) aware that the community is not happy about the decision". Not only did I not mislead my constituents but they had been advised by CAMRA of the planning position. In any event CAMRA had advised the group to lobby the Council. Given the advice from CAMRA I do not believe that the Campaign Group members who attended the Planning Committee meeting on 13th May 2014 would have been under any misapprehension as to the likely outcome of the Change of Use Application. This is further supported by, for example, the entry on the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page on 12th April 2014 at 03:17 (Page 223). The person who posted this entry is aware that the Council has limited power to maintain the existing use of the building. I posted an entry on 14 April 2014 (Page 221) indicating that these could be the very last days of The Wheel. See also Louise Holmes post of 11th May 2014 at 12:36 (Page 217) where

she says that it appears that the outcome of the planning application is just a formality.

16. Item 2 in the Complaint

I did make a number of contributions to the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page. However the campaign had a momentum of its own and did not rely solely on my contributions. There are a significant number of other contributors (See Pages 181 to 224)

- 17. Whilst I used my own Facebook Page (Martyn Ford) (Pages 174 to 180) to raise awareness in the community of the Change of Use Application, I did not initiate nor drive the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook campaign. I supported the campaign both as a local resident and local councillor representing my constituents with the goal of keeping a public house in Findern.
- 18. I actually advised restraint in the use of the Campaign Facebook Page. See, for example, my post of 14th May 2014 at 13:44 advising against posts that show the group in a bad light (Page 212).
- 19. The message that I posted on 1st August 2014 was aimed primarily at the members of the Campaign Group. The thrust of the Campaign was to persuade Murrays that they were not welcome in Findern and that they should move elsewhere. This message was simply reaffirming the key aim of the Campaign.
- 20. It is not the case that I commented to a campaign Twitter page (WheelEnders @ Wheel Findern) as alleged by Mr and Mrs Barke. I had posted this item on my own Twitter account and it was retweeted on the campaign Twitter page (See Page 98). This is not something I can control nor am I responsible for it. In any event, the tweets and retweets on my own Twitter account are sent on my own personal account and not as a Councillor. Extracts from my own Twitter Account are at Pages 76 to 146. This is also the case in relation to all other social media messages posted by me. However, I do accept that comments made by me to the Burton Mail (Pages 251 to 269) and the Derby Telegraph (Pages 229 to 250) were made in my capacity as local District Councillor acting on behalf of the community.
- 21. My email of 18th August 2014 was intended to help Murrays and not to intimidate or bully them. As the elected member for the community I was fully aware of the strong opposition to the establishment of an undertakers business. I believed it was in their commercial interests to locate elsewhere because they would always face resentment from the local community.
- 22. Murrays had elected at the outset not to engage with the local community but to work anonymously through planning agent DPDS Consulting Group. Given that they were proposing to convert a feature building at the gateway to the village, it would have been reasonable to expect that they would at least consult Findern Parish Council in order to ascertain local opinion. Nor did they contact the local district councillors. Mr and Mrs Barke did not reveal their identity until 8th May 2014 via the Burton Mail (See Pages 262 to 263).
- 23. Coupled with the shock on discovering that the pub was to be converted to a funeral directors, this apparently secretive approach gave the impression that

Murrays were not concerned about the wellbeing of the village community at Findern. This had given rise to anger and resentment within the community and I saw it as my responsibility as local Councillor to convey those feelings to Murrays.

- 24. Apart from the email of 18th August 2014 the other communications referred to in this section of the complaint were not sent directly to Murrays. In order to read these communications it would be necessary for Mr and Mrs Barke to seek them out.
- 25. Murrays secretive approach had given rise to anger and resentment in the community and a robust campaign against the proposed Change of Use. I was conveying the views of the community to Murrays as a representative of that community. These communications were not intended to be threatening or intimidating. In that sense they were neither inappropriate nor an abuse of my public office.
- 26. As to the item on the Campaign Facebook Page that I "liked", this was merely a reference to what I considered to be a very fair offer made by Mark Gregory on 26th June 2014 (Page 271) to purchase the freehold of the former Wheel Inn from Murrays which should have been given proper consideration by Murrays. By way of clarification, I would wish to point out that I was not a proposed investor in The Wheel.

27. Item 3 in the Complaint

I neither joined nor supported a Boycott Murrays Funeral Directors Facebook Campaign. Extracts from this campaign are shown at (Pages 225 to 228). I was not aware of this Facebook Campaign prior to receipt of the complaint which has been made against me.

- 28. My reference to a boycott was posted to the Save The Wheel Inn Findern Facebook Page on 8th May at 14:54 (Page 218). This statement was not addressed to the world at large but to those readers of the Facebook Page who opposed the Change of Use Application. It reiterated the views of the local residents. It was not intended to be a boycott campaign but was designed to affect Murrays prospective business in the immediate locality and persuade them to relocate elsewhere.
- 29. As regards the removal of Campaign posters the comment by me on the Campaign Facebook Page was made "tongue in cheek". A number of posters supporting the campaign had been displayed around the village. Some of the posters had been removed by unidentified people and some of those had been taken down within a very short period of time of being displayed. My comment should be read in the context of the other comments made on the Campaign Page on 8th July 2014 (Page 195). The initial comment refers to the need for the services of Inspector Morse to apprehend a phantom poster thief and my comment follows that. These are clearly facetious comments. I make a similar comment on 12th August 2014 at 00:49 (Page 188).
- 30. I do not accept that these comments are irresponsible or amount to harassment.
- 31. As regards the text message referred to in the complaint, the full text is as follows: "Murrays selling and moving on. They aren't wanted in Findern,

despite David Barke and his letters of support, love to see how many of those they are. Anyway, let's see what happens and if the group are happy to be lecture to." There is a typo here because I meant to say "lectured". (Page 270)

- 32. As regards this text message, I had met with Jackie Alderson, (of Optimum PR) a PR representative retained by Murrays to deal with the publicity generated by their application to convert the Wheel Inn into a funeral directors. Ms Alderson had suggested a meeting between Mr and Mrs Barke and the Campaign / Community Group on 23rd April 2014. However, this meeting did not take place. The purpose of the meeting from the perspective of Mr and Mrs Barke was to explain to the Group how the business would operate in Findern. The Group was only prepared to meet if Mr and Mrs Barke were prepared to discuss the possibility of their business being relocated elsewhere and the site being sold by Murrays. My text reconfirmed the position taken by the Group in relation to the establishment of a funeral directors business in Findern. When I consulted the Group I was informed that it was not prepared to meet on the basis suggested by Mr and Mrs Barke. The reference to letters of support in the text is to a comment from Mr Barke in the Derby Telegraph of 14th May 2014 when he referred to "many messages of support sent to us privately from Findern residents". (Page 246).
- 33. The comment I posted on the Campaign Facebook Page on 14th May at 08:00 (Page 213) was not a general comment about the Murrays undertaking business nor was it intended to be a slur on the business itself. I was merely making the point that they had shown no care or compassion in relation to Findern and its residents. The decision to acquire the Wheel Inn and apply for a Change of Use had been made without reference to or consultation with the local community and its elected representatives. This apparently secretive approach appeared designed to present the village residents with a set of circumstances over which they would have little or no control. In that sense, their actions appeared to be without care or compassion.

34. Item 4 in the Complaint

I dispute the allegation that I have repeated false information via social media and thereby caused distress to one of Murrays employees and her family.

- 35. I had first met the employee in question in 2014 following the death of my father. I employed the Coop Funeral Directors to deal with his funeral and at that time was an employee with the Coop Funeral Directors.

 Was living in Repton at this time. I know this because she approached me as a Councillor for assistance in relation to a matter which affected her property. At some time afterwards she moved to Findern and became an employee of Murrays Funeral Directors.
- 36. I believe it was reasonably well known in the village of Findern that was employed by Murrays. On 8th May 2014 the Burton Mail published an article in which Mrs Barke confirmed that Murrays had purchased the Wheel Inn and were intending to convert it into a funeral directors. Until this point the identity of the purchaser had not been made public.
- 37. I believe that some of the village residents came to the conclusion that had been responsible in some way for bringing Murrays into Findern. When I asked what she knew about Murrays intentions, she told me that she

knew nothing of Murrays intentions until the day they completed the purchase of the Wheel Inn. It was at this point Mr and Mrs Barke informed her of their intentions, she said the company had not forewarned her and she had played no part in the decision to extend the business into Findern.

- 38. At about this time I saw some social medial posts referring to "that woman from Murrays" and alleging that she (presumably had brought Murrays to the village and that she was removing the campaign posters, I was aware that she had been challenged in the street that she would be running the "Wheel office" of Murrays.
- 39. I was approached on 21st May 2014 via a telephone call from on behalf of Murrays and asked to attend a meeting with and and The meeting took place on that day with Mr and Mrs Barke also present.
- 40. I had the impression that was suicidal and felt let down by Murrays and by the local community that had turned against her.
- 41. As to the complaint against me, I do not recall posting, "liking" or retweeting any false information about
- 42. I understand that has sold her house in Findern and will be moving away from the village.
- 43. I felt sad that had been put in such a position and wanted to confirm to her that I was not behind what was being said about her. I went to the meeting to make sure was ok and not suicidal. I could see at the meeting that she was obviously distressed and was still distressed when I took the letter referred to in the complaint to her that day.
- 44. I asked my fellow members of the Campaign / Community Group to remove any postings associated to I also asked to contact me if she subsequently saw anything that offended her. She has not contacted me about this since and I assume the offending material was removed and nothing further of that nature was posted.
- 45. This was not a letter of apology on my own account. As I have pointed out I did not knowingly post, "like" or retweet anything that I believe would have been offensive to
- 46. As regards the "Spoiler Alert" retweet of 11th June 2014 (Page 119), this was intended as a light hearted comment. The reference to "Bob" in the tweet is to the childrens television character Bob the Builder. This is clearly a facetious comment and not intended to be taken literally, or seriously.
- 47. As to the comment I "liked" on 12th August 2014 (Page 187) in relation to poster boards, this should not necessarily be seen as an endorsement or approval of that comment. Again, I considered this an amusing comment which was not intended to be taken literally.
- 48. I have also been asked to comment upon the following additional allegation made by Mr and Mrs Barke

"In considering all aspects of our complaint, we have also examined the South Derbyshire District Council Corporate Plan. Under "Sustainable Growth and Opportunity, Long term outcomes", we note Go1. "Developing economic and employment opportunities within the district". We do not consider Councillor Ford's behaviour as an elected member to be in any way supportive of our business. Indeed, it is worth nothing that Councillor Ford's actions are directly opposed to the following statement from the leader of South Derbyshire District Council (Councillor Bob Wheeler): "It's vitally important to recognise the pivotal role that local companies play. We're proud to offer a vibrant, sustainable environment in which firms can flourish and thrive. Through innovation and expertise, South Derbyshire is bucking the trend and prides itself on being "open for business.""

Regarding the Barkes additional comments; I absolutely endorse the comments made in the Corporate Plan, but I also feel that the loss of a well used community facility to be replaced by a funeral directors is a very poor use of this building, doing nothing for local employment or community cohesion and causing much anxiety around the village, totally at odds with the intent of the Plan.

- 49. For the reasons set out above in this statement I contend that I am not in breach of the Councils Members Code of Conduct. My overriding aim was to represent and protect the interests of the village of Findern and its community in relation to a proposal which I believe will damage the village.
- 50. I have subsequently reviewed a draft investigation report prepared by Owen Willcox on behalf of the Council. In response I sent Owen Willcox an email dated 26 February 2015 (Page 296) in which I offered my apologies.

I feel the only way in which the pub could be saved would be to look at the 'Community Right to Bid' through the Localism Act 2011. In brief:

"The Community Right to Bid gives communities the power to nominate assets (buildings or land). If the local authority agrees that the asset is of community value they will put it on a published list. If any of these assets are put up for sale, a six week window of opportunity is triggered, during which any local community group may express an interest to purchase the asset. If they do express an interest, a further four and a half months window of opportunity is given so that the group may have time to find funding and put together a bid to purchase the asset on the open market".

The Wheel Inn is the only public house in our village of approx 1700 people. We have few community resources in the village – one local shop/P.O, 2 hairdressers and a village hall and parish rooms.

There is an indian restaurant within the village boundaries but three quarters of a mile from the village centre. This is not a public house but does have a bar. It is out of walking distance for many of our community and the owners do not have much community involvement.

Community pubs represent the very essence of a community asset, providing a meeting place where social networks are strengthened and extended and where people can mix with others from different backgrounds to their own. Pubs host a wide variety of community-oriented events and activities that add considerably to local civic life.

As well as injecting an average of £80,000 into their local economy each year, pubs play a key role in raising money for local charities – it is estimated that the average pub raises around £3000 a year for charity.

The Institute of Public Policy Research (IPPR) has used 'Social Return on investment' methodology to quantify the wider social value which pubs generate for their communities, which cannot be captured in financial terms. These wider community benefits range from the amount of money the pub raises for charity to the reduced risk of social isolation through opportunities for pub-goers to make new friends and strengthen community ties. The

IPPR's research found that each pub generates between £20,000 and £120,000 of wider social value to their communities¹.

- The Wheel Inn has been a well used public house for decades and is part of the heritage of our village.
- We are a medium sized village with few community facilities. The Wheel Inn is our only public house and is a valuable community meeting place. The pub is a good size with adequate parking and facilities and has plenty of scope to extend the services currently offered.
- The resource has been allowed to fall into disrepair by the current owners and is due to close its doors on 14 April 2014 despite the fact that sales have recently increased. Although there are new kitchen facilities these are not being utilised and a valuable income stream is being missed.
- This business used to be a thriving public house serving meals and engaging in community activities e.g. hosting charity events and joining in on community events such as fete day.
- The Wheel Inn is generally the venue for resident's milestone celebrations – such as birthdays, weddings, christenings and wakes and is of great sentiment to village residents as a venue. Without The Wheel the only alternative for family and community events would be the village hall which is expensive and Impersonal –There is a great deal of the sentiment and history linked with generations of Findem residents and The Wheel Inn.
- The pub has hosted a weekly quiz for many years which has always been well attended and is a great social event. Historically there have been sporting groups linked with the pub. Social events and outings and many live acts. The loss of such an opportunity to socialise will be of great detriment.
- With little investment and good management the business could be used to engage greater community participation such as serving tea/coffees during daytime hours to engage the large proportion of retired/elderly residents in our village, many of whom are restricted in their activities by the poor transport links to our village.
- There is no other community venue within our village which allows the residents to socialise or eat out. At times that the pub offered food it has always proved very popular.
- The pub has great recreational value within the community: Local sports teams meet in this pub

The pub has a beer garden which is used by local people

The pub provides a children's play area for local families

The pub has televisions screening sporting events enjoyed by patrons

The pub hosts pub quizzes which brings the community together

The pub offers a free wireless computer network

The pub has entertainment machines/pool table/board games

If the pub closes all of these facilities will be lost to the village – there is no nearby alternative venue for residents.

- Findern and the surrounding area now attracts a number of visitors, tourists and walkers and the loss of the village pub means that our village will not benefit financially from the attracting visitors to stay and spend money in our village.
- Over 200 local people have expressed their support to keep the pub

Hi Julie.

Thank you for your email and campaign to save your local pub.

Current planning law means that you do not need to put in a Change of Use application when converting a pub to an A1,2&3 Use Class, this covers supermarkets, restaurants, betting shops and as you know undertakers/funeral directors.

This means you can't object to this application on the grounds of loss of community value. It is a key campaign at CAMRA to change this legislation.

It is likely that there will need to be a planning application for the addition of external features (sign, atm machine) or an extension for a car park or access road for deliveries at a supermarket etc. You can object

to these planning applications but it needs to be on technical grounds i.e an increase of traffic, air pollution etc. This is fairly easy to do with a new supermarket but I imagine harder with a funeral home.

The council does have the power to issue an Article 4 Direction on the pub. This removes the permitted development rights and means that any Change of Use will require full planning permission and you can object to this on its community value grounds. Many Councils do not know this can be applied to a single building such as a pub and may be hesitant to use it because of compensation claims. Please see below the list of Councils who have used A4Ds to save a pub, you will need these case studies to convince your Council to do the same. Also the DCLG Minister Brandon Lewis has stated that a compensation claim is yet to be made regarding A4Ds.

You haven't mentioned the name of the pub, but you refer to it as a community asset - does this mean you have listed it as an Asset of Community Value? If not then you may want to consider doing so to show the council support for the pub. Also once listed and the pub goes back on the market the community has to be told (no sale can take place behind closed doors) and then the group can trigger a moratorium period of 6 months. During this time the pub can only be sold to the community or a private buy who intends to keep the pub as a pub. Unless you know of a buyer or the community group is interested then ACV listing alone is not going to save the pub but it is another tool which can help. More information:

Finally despite there currently being no need for a change of use planning application you should still rally the troops and make the council (and Punch and the future developer) aware that the community is not happy about the decision - get a story in the papers, petition, stage a rally, try and get your MP involved and as many Councillors as possible. Reason for committee determination

The item is presented to committee at the discretion of the Planning Services Manager, given the level of public interest.

Site Description


The site lies to the southern end of Findern village, on Main Street as it turns into the village from the south and towards The Green. The public house is a two-storey rendered building of traditional appearance which frames the highway edge, with the vehicular access lying to the east serving a considerable car park with beer garden to the south. The site is generally surrounded by residential properties of varying ages and status (19 Main Street to the eastern boundary is Grade II listed).

Proposal

It is proposed to change the use from a public house to a funeral directors. No operational development is proposed.

Applicants' supporting information

A covering letter is provided. This outlines the nature of the application and its differing nature to a conventional planning application. It asserts the current lawful use. It also outlines a rapid and continual turnover of tenants in the last 5 years, and that since it



was first marketed in July 2013 there have been 167 requests for sales particulars, 7 viewings and 3 offers, it is considered the only offer that has met the vendor's requirements is that from a prospective user as a funeral directors.

Planning History

9/2013/0592: Display of illuminated and non-illuminated signage and lighting -

Approved September 2013

9/2007/0881: Gazebo, replacement canopy and insertion of doors and a window -

Approved September 2007.

Responses to Publicity

No consultation is required on applications for a Certificate of Lawfulness (also known as a Lawful Development Certificate ("LDC")). However it is understood Findern residents have undertaken a leaflet drop creating 199 representations of which only 2 are in support. The objections raise the following concerns:

- (a) it is the only pub in the village, and allowing the change would leave residents having to travel elsewhere;
- (b) the pub forms a meeting place for the community and a focus of the village;
- (c) the pub has room to expand and could diversify as a hub for other community events in addition:
- (d) that without a pub the village will suffer socially and economically;
- (e) a funeral directors is inappropriate for this location and not required in the village;
- (f) young children will be passing this proposal every day;(g) the pub has not been run/managed in ways which optimise its potential, nor has there been the promised investment which would have encouraged tenants or potential purchasers;
- (h) there has been no selling board erected;
- (i) the change of use would contravene the Council's own stated policies on retention of vital community facilities and be contrary to national guidelines;
- an extended period of active marketing as a public house should be pursued before consideration for change of use;
- (k) the access to the car park has restricted visibility in both directions and slow moving large cars would compound this issue;
- additional and slow moving cars would cause further congestion and disrupt the local bus service;
- (m) the proposed business would be in a residential area;
- (n) potential noise from constant use of refrigeration units and coming and going of vehicles in night hours;
- (o) potential aromas from any cool storage facilities;
- (p) its location in a small village will demonstrably change the character of the village for the worse;
- (q) the siting of alternative recycling facilities when moved from the car park;
- (r) the impact on the value of dwellings within the village;
- (s) the land has a covenant requiring a pub to remain;
- an application has been made to register the pub as an Asset of Community Value and any change of use should not be permitted until that application has been considered; and

(u) that this is just a step towards changing the status of the site before progressing towards development of housing.

Findern Parish Council objects on the following grounds:

- i) road safety and highway issues of large slow moving vehicles entering/exiting the highway on a busy blind bend;
- ii) danger for the school children walking past the entrance/exit going to and from school;
- iii) The Wheel is the only pub within the centre of the village which is easily accessible to all including disabled people; and
- iv) it is a good community asset.

Councillor Ford registers very strong objection to the application, noting The Wheel is the only public house in the village and as such should be given protection as a community asset. Whilst the pub has had a chequered past, it now appears to be rising steadily again, and a funeral directors is totally inappropriate in a village setting in such a prominent position.

Councillor Hood and her Consort strongly object to the application, commented that Punch Taverns have neglected Findern over the last few years.

Relevant legislation

- Section 192 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (as amended) ("the 1990 Act");
- The Town and Country Planning General Permitted Development Order 1995 (as amended) ("the GDPO"); and
- The Town and Country Planning Use Classes Order 1987 (as amended) ("the UCO").

Procedure and relevance of Planning Policy

Section 192(2) of the 1990 Act provides that if the Council are supplied with information satisfying them that the use would be lawful, if instituted or begun at the time of the application, they shall issue a certificate to that effect; and, in any other case, they shall refuse the application. In making a decision it is therefore appropriate to ask "if this proposed change of use had occurred on the application date, would it have been lawful in planning terms?" In doing so consideration is given to whether the proposal is "development" for the purposes of the 1990 Act, but also whether it would fall outside the provisions of the GPDO and UCO or involve a breach of any existing planning condition or limitation which constrains what can be done on the land.

Consequently an application for an LDC is not an application for planning permission. The Issue of an LDC depends entirely on factual evidence about the history and planning status of the building or other land and the interpretation of any relevant planning law or judicial authority. Planning policy and the planning merits of the use, operation or activity in the application, as well as covenants, are therefore not relevant.

Planning Considerations

The main issues central to the determination of this application are:

- Whether the existing use falls within Use Class A4 of the UCO;
- Whether the proposed use falls within Use Class A1 of the UCO; and
- Whether permitted development rights are intact and allow for the change of use under the GPDO.

Planning Assessment

This application seeks a formal confirmation that the intended development already benefits from planning permission for a change of use, granted by way of the GPDO. If so, an application seeking planning permission for the development in question is not required and the development may proceed without further reference to the Local Planning Authority.

Existing use

The Wheel is long established as a public house and previous planning applications and local representations and knowledge substantiate this. Whilst regard has been given to the periods of closure in the last few years, these are not sufficient to constitute "abandonment" of the use resulting in a "nil use" at the present time. Hence when having regard to the UCO, the use falls firmly under Use Class A4.

Proposed use

The UCO specifically lists "the direction of funerals" as falling under Use Class A1. Notwithstanding this regard has been given to appeals which have established that a chapel of rest or embalming premises on its own would be a sui-generis use or B1 industrial use respectively. The applicant has provided clarification that the proposal is to use the premises for the administration and direction of funerals, and any chapel or embalming would be ancillary to that primary function. Consequently the use class falls under Use Class A1.

The change of use

Part 3 to Schedule 2 of the GPDO allows "development consisting of a change of use of a building to a use falling within Class A1... from a use falling within Class A4...". Prima facie the proposed development is allowed for by the GPDO. As there is no Direction or condition on a previously implemented planning permission which restricts such a change of use, the proposal would be lawful if commenced on the date of application. The LDC should therefore be granted.

It should also be noted that conditions cannot be attached to LDCs, although the content of the Certificate should be precise. The site shall be specified by way of the site plan submitted whilst the particular use within the Use Class concerned (i.e. a funeral directors within Use Class A1) shall also be stated. This would ensure that only a use of this character would be allowed under the certificate.

Conclusion

The applicant has demonstrated, on the balance of probability, that the proposed change of use of the building and associated land from a public house (use class A4) to a funeral directors (use class A1 where embalming of bodies and a chapel of rest are

ancillary to the overall primary use of the premises for the undertaking of funerals) would be permitted by Class A Part 3 of Schedule 2 to the Town and Country Planning (General Permitted Development) Order 1995 (as amended) if commenced on the date of the application.

Recommendation

GRANT of a Certificate of Lawfulness for the reason set out in the conclusion above.

Councillor Richards explained to the Committee that although he did not intend to declare an interest, he did live in close proximity to the proposed development at Midway (item 1.2 on the agenda). The Chairman of the Committee, Councillor Ford, explained that he was strongly opposed to the change of use of the Wheel Inn public House in Findern. Having set out the reasons for his opposition, he made it clear that he would vacate the chair and leave the chamber when this item was discussed.

MATTERS DELEGATED TO COMMITTEE

PL/107 <u>REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF COMMUNITY AND PLANNING SERVICES</u>

The Director of Community and Planning Services then submitted reports for consideration and determination by the Committee. The Head of Planning Services suggested that the Committee consider first the change of use of the Wheel Inn public house in Findern. Members agreed to this suggestion. At this point the Chairman vacated the chair, which was then taken by the Vice Chairman, Councillor Mrs Brown.

PL/108 APPLICATION FOR A LAWFUL DEVELOPMENT CERTIFICATE FOR A CHANGE OF USE FROM CLASS A4 (DRINKING ESTABLISHMENT) TO CLASS A1 (FUNERAL DIRECTORS) AT THE WHEEL INN, 25 MAIN STREET, FINDERN 9/2014/0286/Z.

The Head of Planning Services explained to members the legal basis for this application. National planning law allowed for them to be converted from their current use as a public house to use as a funeral directors. This change did not require the agreement of the Planning Committee. The request before the Committee, therefore, was simply to confirm that this change was allowed

under the law. As this was simply a statement of fact, the Committee would have no option but agree to do this.

The consequences of not granting the certificate were discussed. Members were informed that such a decision would be subject to appeal (possibly through a judicial review) which the Council would be likely to lose on a matter of law and, potentially, could have costs awarded against it.

RESOLVED:-

That the application for a lawful development certificate for a change of use from Class A4 (drinking establishment) to Class A1 (funeral directors)be approved.

PL/109 THE ERECTION OF AN EXTENSION AND ATLERATION AT NO. 5 MERE BECK, AMBASTON 9/2014/0150/FH

The Committee was informed that following discussions, the applicant had agreed to change the proposals and to accept certain conditions on the scheme.

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


Save The Wheel Inn Findern

Many people go for a tea or a coffee, something to eat and somewhere to take the kids on a warm weekday evening or a sunny weekend but they mainly go to meet friends and family to chat, socialise and enjoy others company. 


I've sent an email to the land registry to try to find out more about the '15 year covenant' - if it exists and what it says. Unfortunately, land registry doesn't open again until Monday.





"We don't see them at all now unless we bump into them at restaurants and pubs in the surrounding villages."



Punch Tavems closed the pub in April. Mr Gregory said anger in the village has not died down.

South Derbyshire MP Heather Wheeler is backing the residents' campaign and proudly wore a Save the Wheel Inn T-shirt at the Findern village fete last weekend.

Mrs Wheeler said she would be campalgning against planning rules, which meant a pub can remain if it is the last in the village, unless there is permission for a funeral parlour. She said: "The legislation needs to be replaced and that is my focus in Parliament by taiking to ministers."

Steve Johnson, managing director of Archway Motors, is also backing the campaign and sees the benefits of a village pub. He said: "Regardless of whom the potential buyers may be, we believe that, for the long-term benefit of the community, The Wheel Inn must remain as a pub, which is why we are backing this campaign.

"Archway Motors is the longest-established business in the village and generations of my family have frequented The Wheel over the years.

"We need businesses like The Wheel to maintain community cohesion – and it would be a great shame if we were to lose such an asset, which, with the right level of investment, has the potential to be a great community pub once again."

David Barke, from Murray's Funeral Directors, said: "Contrary to the many false rumours circulated by the Save the Wheel group, we have received only one unsolicited expression of interest, but as they didn't give an address or even cover the true costs of purchasing the site, we decided not to take it any further.

"We are continuing with our plans to refurbish our new premises. There is much to be done as the building was left in a poor state of repair. Once the renovations are completed, we look forward to playing an active role in the community for many years to come."



Speaking to the Derby Telegraph after the residents' meeting, the Conservative MP said: "Planning guidance calls upon authorities to make sure the last pub in a village is saved from developers, or that six months be given to find a new pub landlord or owner.

"But the commercial people who have been looking after the sale appear to have found a loophole which would allow the applicant to change the building's use.

"If the committee feels it cannot turn the application down, they could at least defer making a decision until more is known about what would happen with the surrounding highways.

"If it becomes a funeral parlour, they will regularly have to close the road. It's an incredibly busy road and busy junction."

THERE is a "tsunami of unhappiness" in a Derbyshire village over the loss of a pub, according to a councillor.

People in Findern are demanding to know who is behind a mystery planning application to turn the Wheel Inn into a funeral director's.

An application to change its use has been submitted to South Derbyshire District Council by agent DPDS Consulting Group.

The representatives for the group refused to tell the Derby Telegraph who was behind it.

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Martyn Ford, who represents Findern on the council, said: "I'd like to know what the secret is.

"In 99% of planning applications the person applying is named. So why not tell us?

"There is a tremendous amount of resentment in the village towards them, whoever they are. What is their motive?"

Protests to save the pub failed last Wednesday, as its owner, Punch Taverns, closed it down, leaving landlord Victor Watkins homeless.

Mr Ford said anger in the village was still high.

He said: "There is a tsunami of unhappiness.

"It would be for the benefit of the people behind this application to come forward because they can't see the emotion we have.

"Findern will just become a little sleepy village."

Julie Cowburn, of Longlands Lane, is also angry.

She said: "The rest of the village were aghast that the venue was being sold and there was an application for a funeral director's.

"It's very disconcerting and frustrating. We want to make our voices heard but can't contact the people behind it.

"It's a miserable situation. We're devastated."

She said the village would never be the same again.

She added. "It will just be a series of roads. Most of the relationships in the village have been formed at the Wheel Inn

"I feel like this is the end of community life."

Kate Horton, of Hawthorn Crescent, Findern, has leafleted residents and got councillors involved.

She said the fight would not stop. The 41-year-old said: "We are devastated but we are not giving up hope.

"To drive past the pub and see it closed will be heartbreaking."

A spokesman for DPDS said: "Punch Taverns put the property up for sale on July 15, 2013

"It was then extensively advertised by a specialist agent, which resulted in 167 requests for sales particulars.

"However, after months of advertising, there was only one offer that could be taken forward to a sale.

*There are still technical matters to be addressed through the planning process and these are commercially sensitive at this time.

"We would hope to be in a position to confirm the new owners in due course."

He said: "There needs to be a change of legislation because there needs to be consideration for community backing before a pub can be shut down.

"I have colossal resentment for the decision. Words can't describe how much I disagree with it."

A spokesman for Punch Taverns said: "We have extensively marketed the Wheel to fet, with a £150,000-proposed refurbishment, since December 2012. Due to very little interest in running the site, we also marketed the pub for sale as a freehold from July 2013. We have attempted to keep the pub trading over that period but it is no longer sustainable for us.

"The sale is a decision we did not make lightly but, unfortunately, we had very little interest and, since July, we have had only one offer for the freehold. We have now exchanged contracts with the purchaser so are legally bound to sell the property.

"We take concerns from the local community very seriously and met with Councillor Martyn Ford and representatives from the community group to discuss the matter, with them making suggestions of potential options. The pub has been sold with a licence and in an operational state having run it up to completion. The purchaser will now decide how they want to deal with the pub."

The Derby Telegraph approached DPDS Consultancy Group for a comment but did not receive one.





Background information

South Derbyshire is a rural district in central England covering an area of over 100 square miles. Its population is growing and currently stands at 91,200. It adjoins and is heavily influenced by the City of Derby to the north and Burton-upon-Trent to the west. The town of Swadlincote, in the south of the District, is the main urban centre with a population of around 33,000. The percentage population growth of South Derbyshire is expected to be twice that of Derbyshire and England over the next 20 years. This will have a major effect on Council services.

Evidence base

We have compiled an 'evidence base' for the District of South Derbyshire. This brings together a whole range of information about the economy, the area and feedback from residents and businesses. You can find a full copy of this on our website:

Some facts about the District:

Economic

- The economic slowdown has affected South Derbyshire but this is comparable with similar sized councils.
 - The proportion of people who are employed is still higher in South Derbyshire than regional or national levels.

Environmental

- We have 3,772 buildings at medium flood risk including 2,705 at high flood risk.
- Residents have been highly satisfied with improvements in recycling and waste minimisation.

Housing

- Housing needs in South Derbyshire are influenced by:
- The central Swadlincote urban area, which has links to Burton-upon-Trent for commuting and migrations.
- o Derby on the northern edge, including suburbs on the edge of the principal urban area and villages linked to the city.
 - Rural areas, which are to a considerable extent free standing, with residents travelling to work in many diverse locations.
- Home ownership, at nearly 80%, is the highest in Derbyshire and well above the regional and national averages.

Crime and community safety

- Crime levels are significantly lower than the regional and national average and have reduced over recent years; with the exception of vehicle crime.
 - Around half of the people within South Derbyshire are very or fairly worried about crime.

Leisure

- Only half of adults undertake any form of exercise.
- The proportion of adults with a long-standing illness, disability or infirmity who have not taken part in any sport or recreational activity in the last four weeks is higher when compared with the County.

Health

- The proportion of overweight and obese children is not significantly different from national levels but is still a concern.
- Teenage pregnancy rates in South Derbyshire are significantly lower than the national average.

Consultation process and outcomes

During 2008 and early 2009, we have consulted key stakeholders on priorities for the District. We did this with Derbyshire County Council, South Derbyshire CVS and South Derbyshire 50plus Forum and used the following methods:

- A local priorities questionnaire sent to South Derbyshire's Citizens'
 Panel of 1,000 local residents, that are broadly representative of the
 make-up of South Derbyshire.
 - A local priorities questionnaire sent to residents through the South Derbyshire Safer Neighbourhood Meetings of approximately 160 residents.
- An online local priorities questionnaire on our website.
- A local priorities questionnaire sent to partners through the Local Strategic Partnership.
- The Place Survey sent out to 4,000 randomly selected residents in South Derbyshire.
- Joint consultation at the Area Forums in October and November with Derbyshire County Council on local priorities for the residents of South Derbyshire.
- A local priorities questionnaire sent to all Parish Councils.
- Workshops held with Chatterbox, the South Derbyshire Youth Forum, voluntary and community sector organisations, representatives of the business community, council housing tenants and the Values and Attitudes Group made up of interest groups who represent the needs of individuals from communities of interest.
- Feedback to Area Forums in February 2009 on the outcomes from consultation so far and the current budget position.
 - Fit for the Future Event held at Toyota on 4 February 2009 that attracted over 200 attendees from across the District.
- Over 2,000 responses from our tenants through the STATUS survey.

From this consultation the following top five priorities were identified: 1. Reduce crime, anti-social behaviour and fear of crime

- 2. Activities for children and young people
 - . Clean streets
- 4. Highways, roads and transport
- Decent and affordable housing

Achievements during 2008

Last year's Corporate Plan included a range of planned activities to achieve the priorities and key outcomes set out in 2008. Here are some of the achievements:

Theme 1: Safer and healthier communities

- Nine new Safer Neighbourhood projects funded to date, including fencing at Rosliston, support for Neighbourhood Watch in Aston-upon-Trent and five new Neighbourhood Watch groups set up in Regent Street, Church Gresley; South Street, Woodville; Oakwood Close, Hatton; Brook Close, Findern and Ashby Road, Ticknall to promote community safety.
- An increase in the number of home visits to vulnerable people by Customer Services staff. Visiting Officers have provided awareness of benefits and services. In addition, a number of referrals have been received from Community Wardens. 80% of customers surveyed rated the service as 'excellent'.
- Debt counselling services consolidated with Derbyshire Housing Aid. 90 consultations have been undertaken in 2007-2008. In 2008-2009 there has been 61% increase (145 consultations). 60% of people seeking homelessness advice have been able to remain in their current accommodation due to Housing

Theme 2: You at the centre

- Older Persons' Survey is complete. We have compiled a number of actions through focus groups. These include an expanded Safer Homes Scheme to include 'fire checks' and installing personal safety equipment and security measures.
- We have established a Cultural Events Group and published a cultural calendar for the District.
- We have implemented an integrated waste collection service across the District, resulting in a combined recycling and composting rate of 45% to date.

Theme 3: Higher quality services

- We have identified assets "surplus to requirements" in accordance with our Disposals Policy. This will generate resources for capital investment. £303,000 has been generated so far, to re-invest in Council priorities.
- We are implementing measures to minimise Council Tax increases by improved commissioning of services, streamlining processes and restructuring. As at 31 March 2009 we achieved efficiency savings of £677,000.

- Currently we are dealing with 71% of our customers at the first point of contact. The Customer Services Team has received Benefits and Council Tax training, which will enable them to deal with more calls at the 'first point of contact', thus increasing customer satisfaction.
- We also introduced choice-based lettings system in partnership with ten Registered Social Landlords allowing customers choice when applying for housing.

Theme 4: Prosperity for all

- We opened two new forest lodges and a community arena at Rosliston Forestry Centre. The provision of ten overnight stays and an open-air performance venue provides a further boost to the tourism economy.
- We have established a voluntary leasing scheme to promote the availability of affordable and decent homes in the private sector, including rented property. A pilot project is now underway.
- We have set up a Rural Landlord Scheme to reduce fuel poverty and improve home energy efficiency measures.

Theme 5: Rural South Derbyshire

- Work to encourage and support local communities in preparing Community and Parish Plans is progressing well. Currently, we are supporting nine Parish Plans in order to identify local priorities that in turn are informing the District's priorities.
- We are continuing to involve communities in the development of our key plans and strategies. We are undertaking appropriate consultation in line with revised Local Development Framework.
- A study is being undertaken in the north west parishes to look at rural transport issues. We will make recommendations later in the year about the future options for the area.

Theme 6: Stronger in the region

- In November, the Environmental and Development Services Committee considered a response to the consultation about modifications to the Regional Spatial

Punch Taverns have also strengthened their internal processes, giving time for more widespread consultation, consultation that was sadly lacking in our instance.

It is widely recognised by all who embrace living in rural communities, and in wider Planning circles, a pub is at the heart of any community, and when, for whatever reason the pub is taken away, the social and economic fabric of that community begins to wither and deteriorate, we are now witnessing this desperately sad deterioration in Findern, and once this starts it is very difficult to pull back from.
