





### EA/17. APOLOGIES

Apologies for absence from the Meeting were received from District Councillor Lemmon, G. Wale, Mr. Mathews and B. Payton.

### EA/18. CHAIRMAN'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Chairman read a note advising those present how they could apply for a new travel 'Gold Card' before their current card expired. Further information was available from the District and County Councils' websites or by ringing the District Council's Customer Services Team on 01283 595795. A comment was made that whilst renewal of the card was easy, problems had been experienced by some new applicants, as their addresses were not listed on the system. It was agreed that this matter would be referred back to both authorities for attention.

### EA/19. DISTRICT COUNCIL ISSUES

The Chairman proposed to alter the Agenda order and she invited Martin Buckley, the Council's Tree Officer to give a presentation about ash dieback disease. He referred to the recent media coverage of this serious issue and guidance received from the Forestry Commission about levels of infection in what was the Country's second most populated tree. It was explained that imported seedlings carried the infection and the Government had now prohibited further imports. The disease could kill a semi mature tree within 12 months and mature trees within 4 to 5 years. It was hoped that some ash trees would show signs of resistance. Mr. Buckley displayed Forestry Commission information sheets and these were circulated.

Plant health orders would be imposed in areas where the disease was identified, with a strict regime for burning infected trees and the use of disinfectants before entering or leaving an infected site. Mr. Buckley also referred to the liabilities for both private landowners and the Council. As an example, the Swadlincote Woodlands site included an estimated 5-6,000 ash trees.

A description was given of the symptoms of the ash dieback disease. A resident was concerned about the ongoing imports of other plants from abroad and the officer explained the measures that agencies took to prevent infected plants from coming into the Country. Residents were urged to read the factsheets and look at the Forestry Commission website for further information. Mr. Buckley was thanked for the presentation.

Frank McArdle, the Council's Chief Executive then addressed those present on the budget proposals for 2013/14. Information had been circulated. Whilst the Council had a healthy financial position currently, Government cuts meant that further savings of £300,000 per year would need to be achieved to balance budgets. The Council budgeted over a 5 year period and corrective action would be taken to cut costs, but not services. Mr. McArdle spoke about the growth of the District, the fourth fastest in the Country outside London and the South East. He explained the positive effects of additional development and also the additional services that needed to be provided. The Council was considering a freeze on Council Tax for the third year in a row. Reference was also made to the Council Tax Support Scheme, which included protection for pensioners and disabled people, but some working age claimants would need to pay up to 10% more.

The Chief Executive responded to residents' questions regarding the Council's bad debt position and growth in inward investment. A resident had a specific enquiry regarding benefit levels and was asked to contact the clerk after the Meeting. Mr. McArdle was thanked for the presentation.

### EA/20. MINUTES

The Minutes of the Etwall Area Forum held 10th October 2012 were noted.

### EA/21. REPORT BACK ON ISSUES RAISED AT THE LAST MEETING

The Chairman referred those present to the report circulated with the Agenda. She highlighted the issues raised at the last Meeting and the progress made.

### EA/22. PUBLIC QUESTIONS ON ISSUES RAISED BY RESIDENTS

A resident referred to the recent announcement regarding the HS2 train line, its potential impact for the Egginton Common development, and the surrounding area. It was confirmed that the District Council had received no further information ahead of the announcement.

It was stated that another council had recently introduced a specific charge for emptying the brown compost bin, but was confirmed that South Derbyshire District Council had no intention to impose such a charge. A brief update was given on the new recycling contract, which would improve the dry recyclable collection arrangements.

It was questioned when road and footway repairs would take place in Egginton. The Forum Liaison Officer explained that the maintenance team had been inundated with requests since the recent bad weather. However, repair works were programmed in Egginton and it was agreed that a direct response be provided to the Parish Council to update on this. It was stated that the repairs to potholes did not last very long and repeat repairs were then required. This point was acknowledged by the Officer, who explained how the County Council had changed its approach and would prioritise such repairs, ensuring that a better quality of repair took place.

There was discussion about the recent flooding problems affecting both the Egginton and Scropton areas. In Scropton, tapes had been placed across the road to prevent access to flooded areas. Details were given of the some of the problems experienced. It was noted that flood levels changed rapidly and was questioned whether the authorities could be responsive enough to impose restrictions and then remove them after the flooding subsided. The role of flood wardens and a shortage of 'road closed' signs were other issues raised. The Forum Liaison Officer agreed to refer the points raised back to colleagues at the County Council.

There was discussion about the Lower Dove Flood Alleviation Scheme. The Chairman gave a detailed report on this scheme to alleviate flooding problems for areas such as Scropton and Egginton. The works were due to start on site in February and be completed by the summer. She also spoke about joint work with the Environment Agency and Severn Trent Water to deal with surface water flooding issues. There was also recognition of the private sector support for the Flood Alleviation Scheme.

The development of Egginton Common was raised, particularly the planning process and the potential for surface water run-off impacting on Egginton and its surrounding area. It was explained that this planning process would not be dealt with by the District Council, but it would be a statutory consultee. A preapplication process would be undertaken and residents were urged to engage with this, to register their concerns. The need for careful modelling and use of

balancing ponds were further aspects discussed. Finally, there was a discussion about flooding more generally.

The date and venue of the next Etwall Area Forum would be confirmed in due course.

### REPORT BACK ON ISSUES RAISED AT THE LAST MEETING

At the last Etwall Area Forum held on 30th January 2013 at the Egginton Memorial Hall, the following issues were raised and a progress report is provided:-

### **Derbyshire County Council Issues**

### 1. GOLD CARD RENEWALS

A resident reported difficulties when trying to reapply for a Gold Card online. Some addresses were missing from the drop-down box which meant that some residents were unable to complete the process via DCC's website.

The actual postcode 'look up' is provided to us by Royal Mail – they get their information from Ordnance Survey data. The most common reason that a property does not appear is if it is new. It is believed that Royal Mail gets updates around every three months.

### 2. EGGINTON: FOOTWAY & CARRIAGEWAY DAMAGE FOLLOWING FLOODING

Several concerns were raised in regard to damage caused to the carriageways and footways throughout Egginton, following the recent floods. Severe potholes had appeared in some areas and there were specific concerns regarding Duck Street, Ash Grove Lane and Fishpond Lane in particular.

The forum liaison officer responded that the highways had taken a real battering over the last few months due to prolonged bad weather. We suffered heavy rain and flooding during the latter stages of last year, which have been followed with snow and ice at the beginning of this year, followed by more heavy rainfall. DCC have enlisted staff to inspect our precautionary network for defects — that's around 1500 miles of the County's roads. Programmes of repair will be issued but this is of course a massive job. I believe that our sub-area Maintenance Team are aware of the damage caused to the highways in Egginton and have plans to mark out areas for patching once the inclement weather abates.

It was asked that Egginton Parish Council be provided with details of when and where patching works are to be carried out. The local Highways Inspector is well aware of the damage caused in Egginton and patching repair works are due to be carried out. Unfortunately, precise details of when the repairs will be undertaken cannot be provided. However, they should be completed by our contractors within 3 months of the works being issued. Until then, the Inspector will ensure that the highways are maintained to a safe condition.

### 3. FLOOD BOARDS

A discussion took place regarding the placing out of flood boards in the highway and the following issues were raised:

- a) Even when flood boards are put out, there are always occasions when drivers will ignore the signs. It was stated by a resident of Scropton that, during recent floods on Leathersley Lane, DCC officers not only put flood boards up but physically 'taped off' the road. This had the desired effect and the resident felt that this was a good idea. Is the practice of 'taping off' flooded roads going to be rolled-out County-wide? Another resident countered that this may be problematic as it is difficult for officers to remove flood boards from every road as soon as they become accessible again. We may find that roads are still taped off once flood water has subsided and they are accessible again. The forum liaison officer responded that DCC didn't have the resources to remove all flood boards the moment a road became accessible again. It was assumed that the 'taping off' of Leathersley Lane was done as officers considered that it was necessary to do so. Rather than roll this practice out County-wide, it was perhaps more appropriate to continue to assess the need to do so on a case-by-case basis.
- b) A resident referred to a Flood Forum that had taken place at SDDC last year, at which DCC representatives reported that they didn't have enough flood boards. Have more boards now been purchased? There was also mention at this meeting about plans to set up 'Flood Wardens' in the community to assist locally. Has there been any progress on this?

The Chair requested that any feedback be sent to both the resident and Scropton & Foston Parish Council.

After the 2012 floods across the County, DCC is re-appraising its resources in relation to flood risk management, including road closure signs. The Director of Environmental Services is chairing a small group of officers from his department and Emergency Planning. The first meeting held on 16 January identified that local arrangements with parish councils or "flood wardens" acting on their behalf could be a potential avenue of assistance. This may include the positioning and removal of road closed signs (during flooding) for safety reasons. We would expect DCC to be informed in these cases. The next meeting of this group will be held on 7 March 2013 to make further progress.

A separate meeting was held with Foston and Scropton Parish Council and with the public on 28 January 2013 to discuss their particular flooding problems around Leathersley Lane and Watery Lane. As a result of that meeting we are also looking into having permanent "drop down" signage in Hatton to divert A50 bound traffic away from the Village during flooding. Again it may be appropriate for this to be operated by the Parish Council, but again with the consent of DCC. The Authority has been invited by the Parish Council to attend their next local liaison meeting with Cranberry Foods to discuss HGV traffic from their site - an appropriate officer will be nominated.

We currently have no plans to introduce a policy of "taping off" a road; this will continue to be done on a case-by-case basis at the discretion of the local highway inspectors.

### 4. FISHPOND LANE, EGGINTON: SEWERAGE

A resident reported that Severn Trent Water (STW) sewers have overflowed and discharged into roadside ditches/stream on Fishpond Lane. They were beginning to smell and the resident felt that it had become a health hazard. STW had been contacted, but had informed that it is not their responsibility? Can you clarify who is responsible for cleaning out the ditches?

The area's Maintenance Manager is aware of a problem here with the public surface water drains being blocked, but no feedback has been received from STW.

The Manager is not aware of any contamination of the ditches at this location, but this would be an issue for STW to resolve, if it is foul contamination.

### 5. MAIN STREET, EGGINTON: FLOOD BOARD LEFT OUT

A flood board has been left out and needs removing. It is lying flat and is situated in the nearside verge, just after the bridge as you travel south into Egginton village. The flood board has now been collected by maintenance officers.
