

1	Chair's Introduction. Apologies	Action	
	Pat Bambrick, Councillor Kevin Richards.		
2	Minutes of last meeting (to be agreed)		
	The minutes were agreed as a true record of the meeting.		
3	Safer Neighbourhoods Sergeant's overview / priorities update		
	PC Kev Cassidy reported that:		
	 Drugs were the agreed priority from the previous meeting and it had been a busy time for drug offences, which was reflected in the crime figures. High figures reflected good results. 		
	 A total of 13 warrants had been issues since the previous meeting and 12 of them had been positive. They ranged from cannabis for personal use to several pounds of heroin. 		
	There had been issues with something called County Lines, where drug dealers from bigger towns and cities came into the area and set up a base to sell drugs from a user's home. The situation was two such operations had been shut down by police in the Newhall area.		
	Two stolen vehicles had been recovered in Newhall, one from Staffordshire and one from the West Midlands area.		
	Two section 165 seizures for no insurance had taken place.		
	Operation Safe Drive had taken place with CREST. A variety of traffic offences had been identified and dealt with, including using a mobile phone		

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at the wheel, driving without a seatbelt, light defects and no insurance. One car also had a defective tyre.

 Regarding anti-social behaviour, it had been quiet for Newhall but in the town centre there were problems, especially around McDonald's and the Hepworth Retail Park. Community Protection Notices (CPN) and Community Protection Notice warnings (CPNw) had been issued.

Councillor Paul Dunn asked if letters issued to vandals who had caused damage at Midway Community Centre had been effective. Chris Smith replied that he'd had no more contact from residents living near the centre. It had been a lot quieter but the troublemakers may have moved on to cause issues in the town centre. PCSO Amanda Beer added that the warnings were in place wherever the youngsters went.

A resident asked if information regarding a vehicle reported as having no tax or MoT would get straight through to PC Cassidy. He confirmed that it wouldn't. It was best to ring 101 and the information would eventually be sent to the relevant officer.

4 Partnership update/ Funding/ New project Ideas

Mr Smith reported that:

- A Criminal Behaviour Order (CBO the modern form of an ASBO) had been put in place for street drinker Mark McVey for a period of five years. He had been causing a nuisance for shops and businesses in the town centre. He had already breached the order and was due back in court.
- Work was due to start on the new CCTV system for Swadlincote. The cameras would be replaced over the next few weeks.
- McDonald's was currently an issue. Police and the partnership were cracking down and identifying individuals causing issues there and using ASB tools and powers to deal with them.
- The Theatre in Education to tackle child sexual exploitation was going into every secondary school in South Derbyshire.
- The partnership had contributed £4,000 towards a new mobile ANPR (automatic number plate recognition) camera for a police vehicle at Swadlincote. PC Cassidy explained how the cameras worked and how helpful one would be in tackling issues such as cloned number plates. PCSO Beer added that it would also pick up vehicles registering no insurance.
- Quite a lot of Area 5's funding was left for 2017-18. Only one project had been funding so far during that period. Any crime and disorder or ASB project could be funded. More information was available from Mr Smith. Councillor Dunn asked if an application had been forthcoming from St John's Church. Mr Smith replied that an application form had been sent out but not returned.

5 Local Issues – open forum (20 minutes)

Councillor Dunn alerted those present to a scam being run online by someone posing as the Government Gateway, offering a tax rebate. There was a link to **ACTION:** click but he was aware that a phishing scam was involved. He urged anyone Chris getting the same email to not click the link and delete the email. Mr Smith Smith to confirmed there were a lot of phishing scams operating. He would bring relevant bring literature to the next meeting. phishing literature A resident of Hawthorn Rise complained about young people hanging around and to next causing a nuisance (swearing, litter, screaming obscenities) on their way to and meeting from school. It centred around an address in the street where a 'Jason' lived. They had phoned 101 but received no feedback. Before Christmas police had visited and allegedly arrested two of the troublemakers. PCSO Beer replied that she had never dealt with the problem in question. If kids were just hanging around, there wasn't a lot the police could do. Mr Smith asked for the resident to come and see him after the meeting for an ASB diary. Another resident said to try using schools to identify troublemakers. A member of the public raised the issue of cars with only one light working as a problem. It was dangerous and accidents could happen. Would police make it a priority? PC Cassidy replied that it wouldn't make it a priority. Action could be taken but police didn't have the time to drive around looking for such vehicles. Scott Clayton (DCC Thriving Communities Project) said he felt police would get better intelligence from local communities if they built a relationship with them. PC Cassidy replied that he would have a sit down with people – but often people would open up more to someone not in a uniform. 6 **Agreed priorities** PC Cassidy said drugs would remain the police priority in Area 5. PCSO Beer added that burglaries and shoplifting would also remain a focus. 7 Date of next meeting To be announced. Mr Smith added that there was currently a report being compiled into a possible merger of Safer Neighbourhoods Meetings and Area Forums.

The minutes were approved as an accurate record of the meeting.

NA/23 Report back on issues raised at the last meeting

Pedestrian crossing at Wideshaft

Councillor Paul Dunn said the report provided by DCC didn't address the issue of vehicles being able to go along the pavement around parked cars. A bollard would prevent this from happening. Councillor Mrs Linda Stuart added that she had brought the matter to the forum's attention. She said cars frequently drove along the section of pavement right in front of people's front doors – and it was getting more regular. A white van had done it while she was showing Councillor Kevin Richards the location. The problem would be serious if a resident walked out of their front door at the wrong moment. A resident asked if something like an A-board would help if a bollard wasn't forthcoming. Another resident suggested a petition to DCC with more than 10 signatures would lead to a report going to a cabinet member.

ACTION: Tom Sloan to again report location to Derbyshire County Council and request a bollard be installed

Pine Grove, Newhall

A resident said they'd brought up the issue of untidy land around the garages at the two previous meetings. The garages had still not been touched. Rubbish went all the way through to the Burrows and nothing had been done.

ACTION: Tom Sloan to again report issue and ask for the area to be cleaned

Derbyshire County Council development company

Councillor Dunn reported that DCC had pockets of land across the county which could be developed. Money earned wouldn't go into private hands and the taxpayer would receive the benefits. DCC was looking at other areas of land rather than the one in Plummer Road but he would keep mentioning it. A resident asked if it could be used as an allotment. Councillor Dunn replied that it was unlikely due to the value of the land.

Security lighting at Pine Grove, Newhall

A resident said that SDDC hadn't fixed the light in question and it still wasn't working.

ACTION: Tom Sloan to report issue to SDDC Housing

Councillor Gary Musson asked for the resident who requested a pedestrian crossing at Wideshaft to talk to him. Councillor Dunn pointed out that the street was in Swadlincote and was relevant to that forum and not Newhall. A resident added that the issue had been investigated in the past and there weren't adequate visibility splays to install a crossing.

NA/24 Public questions on issues raised by residents

A resident reported that grounds maintenance workers had caused damage to the grass in Newhall Park by the bowling green. There were tyre tracks left in the surface after workers had been to plant trees. Councillor Dunn agreed that it was an unacceptable situation.

ACTION: Tom Sloan to report issue to SDDC Depot

A resident asked how to obtain a grit bin from DCC. Councillor Dunn replied that they hadn't been issued by the county council for two years because of financial constraints. The only solution was people buying rock salt themselves. Councillor Musson added that some grit bins were bought by parish councils but there weren't any such organisations in Midway, Newhall and Stanton. He would ask DCC if anything could be done.

ACTION: Councillor Gary Musson to report back on grit bin availability

A resident asked where they could find a plan of a new development proposed adjacent to William Nadin Way. Chris Smith replied that one would be available on the Planning Portal. The resident asked if some of the recreation ground at Meadow View Road was being taken for a development. Councillor Dunn replied that it wasn't strictly the case. Football pitches were going to be enhanced and new changing facilities added. Kevin Stackhouse added that the football pitches were going to be moved but there would be no loss of facilities.

NA/25 County council issues

Councillor Musson detailed a planned road closure for High Street, Newhall on April 26.

NA/26 District council issues

Mr Stackhouse reported that SDDC was looking to set its budget and Council Tax for the next financial year, 2018-19. The financial position continued to be a good one in the short to medium term with a budget surplus in 2017-18. More money was being generated from the New Homes Bonus and from the extra Council Tax being levied from the additional

properties being built in the district. Extra services were having to be laid on, including a new refuse collection round, and work was being done to review grounds maintenance around South Derbyshire. With extra properties and associated facilities, there was more which needed maintaining. Extra revenue from new houses wasn't all being spent – some was being held in reserve to secure future services. There was the potential for a budget deficit in two-three years' time.

The proposal was to raise SDDC's precept by 1.95%, a very similar rise to the previous two years. There was the option to put it up by more than that but anything more than a 3% rise or an extra £5 on a Band D property would require a referendum.

A resident asked if a final decision on the Council Tax had been made. Mr Stackhouse replied that it would be made at Full Council on February 26.

Mr Stackhouse added that councillors had voted through an extra 2% funding for voluntary bodies and parish councils. A Community Partnership Scheme had also been proposed with additional funding of £250,000.

A resident asked for information on Business Rates. Mr Stackhouse replied that local authorities currently kept 50% of the Business Rates levied. However, there was soon to be a Government pilot in Derbyshire to allow local authorities to keep 100% of their Business Rates. It would result in a net gain to South Derbyshire. Other funding streams could also be reduced, however. Councillor Dunn added that he was concerned about the potential for Toyota uprooting after Brexit and income from their Business Rates going elsewhere. Mr Stackhouse confirmed that Toyota was one of the biggest Business Rate payers in Derbyshire.

A resident asked for clarity on the revaluation of business properties for Council Tax purposes. Mr Stackhouse replied that extra support from Central Government would be offered over the next four years for affected properties.

Councillor Dunn reported that DCC was proposing to raise Council Tax by 2.99% in 2018-19, with an extra precept of 2% on top for Adult Social Care. There would be another similar rise the following year. However, there would be a freeze for two years from 2020-21 – ahead of the next election.

Mr Smith updated on Midway Community Centre. A two-pronged attack was needed to increase community engagement and usage of the centre. SDDC's Sport & Health department was doing a project at the centre, as was People Express. Anti-social behaviour (ASB) seemed to be under control. Cathy Miles said that a long-term sustainable approach to the centre was needed. Consultation had taken place at the one-year

anniversary event. The overwhelming thing that came out of the event was that a lot needed to be done. ASB needing tackling first. A good group of people had come together to form a committee. A resident said that they'd questioned why the centre was never open while it could be used for so much. Councillor Dunn said the concern was shared among councillors at the lack of use of a £750,000 facility, but since Mrs Miles had got involved the centre had moved on a great deal. Councillor Musson said he would take some details from Mrs Miles to see if DCC's Youth Services would get involved.

Scott Clayton reported that ideas from DCC's Thriving Communities project were starting to form into a bigger plan. Among them were Club Newhall, where local residents would run a club and Our Newhall, to make it easier to find volunteers and support their work in the community. There were also plans to make Newhall Day Centre more of a community venue. Councillor Dunn added that there seemed to be very positive things coming out of Midway Community Centre and the Thriving Communities project.

REPORT BACK ON ISSUES RAISED AT THE LAST MEETING

At the last Newhall Area Forum held on January 30, 2018, at Newhall Old Post Centre, the following issues were raised and a progress report is provided.

Derbyshire County Council issues:

1. Bollard outside cottages in Orchard Street

Councillor Paul Dunn said the report provided by DCC didn't address the issue of vehicles being able to go along the pavement around parked cars.

ACTION: Tom Sloan to ask for a further report back from DCC

Further to your response to my Colleague Tom Sloan, can I please clarify that the issue at Orchard Street is not one of parking of the pavement but of vehicles actually driving on the pavement to undertake waiting traffic. I know this sounds unbelievable but it has been reported that this has happened on a number of occasions. As you will see from the attached photo this poses a very serious danger to the residents living in the properties. Could a bollard not be located in the proximity of where I have crudely drawn it on the attached photo? This would not impede pedestrians but would make the pathway too narrow for a vehicle to pass through. I would be grateful if you could please reconsider given this additional information.

I am sorry that you do not agree with our position in respect of this matter, but I would wish to make the following comments:

The decision taken by what I am sure is a small minority of drivers to place others and themselves at risk by undertaking what is a reckless and dangerous manoeuvre should be dealt with effectively by the Police and via the local SNT as its classed as a moving traffic offence, aside from the dangerous aspect of the situation.

If the residents wish to see such items as a planter in this location they would need to apply via the Parish or Town Council for an objects in the highway licence from our Highways Hub highways.hub@derbyshire.gov.uk. This would be subject to approval from DCC as its consulted upon from a number of departments, and it would be such issues as its type, size and intended location and remaining widths which would be considered and if its granted would still require the planter and its associated plants to be the responsibility of the PC or TC to purchase and maintain.

The area in question was reported to Derbyshire County Council for a Community Payback team to undertake the work. This included cleaning up the public land running from Pine Grove to the Burrows and cleaning up graffiti in Rose Valley. A team from DCC visited to clean up the graffiti but found it had already been removed and the rest of the clean-up was still pending when this report back was written on June 18th. The work was initially requested in February but due to a long waiting list has taken several months to enact.

ACTION: Tom Sloan to report issue to SDDC Housing

A streetlight adjacent to garages in Pine Grove has been repaired. The other lights which were faulty were reported to SDDC Housing. The floodlights on the right as you enter the car park opposite the garages were repaired on February 23rd.
