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	<p>ASB 118 66</p> <p>Sgt Graham Summers reported that in most cases the figures were unalarming. The figures around dwelling burglaries, criminal damage and drug offences were not great, he said. However, when you saw drug offence figures going up it meant that offenders were being tackled and reflected improved detection. The general increase in crime was very small across Area 5. It was impossible to continue on a downward trajectory indefinitely. The spike in dwelling burglaries was something ongoing that the police were addressing.</p> <p>PC Kevin Cassidy said that burglaries and drugs were a priority and the two went hand in hand. Bar one, the burglaries were sneak-in type offences where a door had been left unlocked. Police were worried such offences would get worse in summer but the better weather had not arrived yet. They had a suspect in mind for the offences and there was a “good chance” it was him. He had been in prison for three weeks and in the time he was inside there had been no further burglaries in the area. All five drug offences recorded were in relation to warrants which had been executed in Area 5. The figure was positive as it reflected drugs which had been taken off the streets.</p> <p>PCSO Craig Thompson added that six drug warrants had been executed. One in Alma Road had unearthed a quantity of Class B drugs, with the occupier charged with possession. One on Fairfield Crescent revealed cocaine and cannabis. There had also been a cocaine bust in Alma Drive and a cannabis grow uncovered in Stoneydale Close. Large amounts of cash had also been discovered in another raid. Both high-visibility and plain clothes patrols were being used to combat the dealers.</p> <p>PCSO Thompson updated the meeting on a Section 59 warning which had been issued to a nuisance motorbike in the area and two Section 165s for vehicles being driven without insurance. A CPN warning had also been issued to a family on St John’s Drive. Further action was being looked at to prosecute them.</p> <p>A resident asked if the figures related to actual crimes or prosecutions. Sgt Summers replied that there was a huge variation between the two. With the majority of violent crime, the police knew who the suspect was. The figures presented to the meeting were offences which took place. Between 20% and 30% of these offences would be solved.</p> <p>Councillor Paul Dunn raised the issue of a 25% increase in assaults, despite the figures involved being fairly low. Sgt Summers replied that assaults could encompass serious attacks and low-level assaults. He was unsure what the extra numbers related to, but said the figures were not something to be concerned about.</p>	
4	Partnership Update/ Funding/ New Project Ideas	
	<p>Phil Marriott (Safer Neighbourhoods Officer) reported that there had been a lot of activity around security bike marking. PCSOs had also undertaken some Bikeability sessions in primary schools in the area. The Women’s Tour of Britain had also come through and the PCSOs were present to carry out bike marking for those watching the race.</p>	

	<p>Argos had promoted a domestic violence awareness campaign on the back of till receipts. The campaign was timed to coincide with Euro 2016, as domestic violence was known to rise during football tournaments, especially when England play.</p> <p>A consultation with police had been undertaken regarding a Public Space Protection Order to make Swadlincote town centre an alcohol-free zone. The order could also disperse groups of two or more people causing or likely to cause ASB.</p> <p>Talks had been delivered by Safer South Derbyshire manager Chris Smith and another member of the team on hate crime.</p> <p>Safer South Derbyshire was looking at piloting a project, along with the South Derbyshire CVS, to continue the Safer Homes Handyvan Scheme.</p> <p>A member of the public reported that a planning application was in for the Sir Nigel Gresley to extend its outside area. Sgt Summers replied that he was aware of the application and that it was not a huge number of extra tables. He added that the problem was not with Sir Nigel Gresley customers drinking outside. PC Cassidy said this particular PSPO would only cover the streets and not licensed premises.</p> <p>A resident asked if hate crime included East Europeans. Councillor Sean Bambrick replied that it did. Sgt Summers said there had not been a spike in hate crime in South Derbyshire following the European Referendum. If anyone was reported for giving racist abuse they would be dealt with robustly. Councillor Dunn added that some people who were on the winning side in the referendum seemed to think it was a mandate to go back to the 1960s in terms of racial abuse.</p> <p>Mr Marriott reported that Neighbourhood Watch had brought out a useful brochure on home security. On July 11, the new Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) was due to speak to Swadlincote Neighbourhood Watch and host a Q&A session.</p> <p>Derbyshire Alert, an email service to update Neighbourhood Watch groups on crimes in the county, had been suspended due to a lack of funding. However, the new PCC had reassured Neighbourhood Watch that he was looking to restart the service.</p> <p>Mr Marriott said no funding applications had been received from Area 5 and if the money was not used, it would end up being spent in other areas of South Derbyshire. Councillor Dunn asked if CCTV cameras at the new Midway Community Centre could be funded. Mr Marriott replied that such projects were commonly funded by Safer South Derbyshire.</p>	
5	Local Issues – open forum (20 minutes)	
	<p>Dennis Bateman (Neighbourhood Warden) reported that consultation on PSPOs for the district was entering its second phase. The criteria for a PSPO was behaviour that had a detrimental effect on life in the local community. The two problems in South Derbyshire were dog fouling and littering. Enforcement was also being considered against drivers who littered out of their car.</p> <p>A resident reported that motorcycles in Chestnut Avenue were using the road as a</p>	

	<p>race track. PCSO Thompson replied that he had found one moped rider and advised him of the law.</p> <p>Councillor Dunn advised that he had almost had an accident with a careless young pedestrian on the A6. He added that if such incidents were happening elsewhere, it was almost certain similar problems existed in South Derbyshire. PCSO Thompson said he would raise the issue at William Allitt when he visited the school to give a presentation.</p> <p>A resident asked how many of the 29 police riders involved in the Women's Tour of Britain were from Derbyshire. PCSO Thompson replied that it was none of them.</p> <p>A member of the public complained about motorbikes using Oversetts Road between 9.30pm and 11pm, with three children per bike. There was also a troublesome quad bike ridden by a man with a child on board. He reported it to the police. PCSO Thompson replied that a Section 59 order had been issued against the quad bike rider.</p> <p>A resident reported parking problems at Springfield Road's junction with Lime Tree Avenue. A BMW 4X4 and a white van park on the pavement and blocked it. The resident claimed the driver said he would park there for as long he wanted and would pay any fine which was forthcoming. He also reported three vehicles in Maple Road parked completely on the pavement and asked if at school time someone could visit to see the situation, with pedestrians having to walk along the road at peak times. PCSO Thompson said the police tried to have a presence where they could and give out friendly advice where possible. The resident replied that someone was eventually going to get seriously hurt. Sgt Summers added that total obstruction of a highway was an offence but if cars could get by no offence was being committed. He admitted the situation was a massive headache, with the police unable to fine drivers. A female driver in Hatton had been tackled with the threat of a Community Protection Notice but such a step was not taken lightly. Councillor Dunn said he would consult with DCC to see if there was a bylaw which could be used. Mr Bateman said a CPN needed it to be one individual involved.</p>

Chairman's announcements

Councillor Sean Bambrick informed the meeting that Part One of the South Derbyshire Local Plan had been adopted. Part Two was now being consulted upon.

Thriving Communities

Rob Lowe, who worked in the Chief Executive's Policy Unit at DCC, introduced himself to the meeting and explained how the Thriving Communities programme aimed to provide more flexible work at a community level, and to narrow gaps between providers and the communities they served. It would last three years and Newhall had been the community selected in South Derbyshire for the programme. It would allow DCC to better understand how services impacted upon local people. Evidence would be gathered and time spent with local people to better understand the "lived experience" in Newhall. That would allow services to be better tailored to people's needs. Around 12 families would be involved in a Day in the Life, where researchers would spend a day seeing what they did, earning the family £100 in gift vouchers. Councillor John Wilkins asked that if gaps were found in district services would the information be passed on? Mr Lowe replied that the project was about improving the community.

NA/4 The minutes of the meeting held on February 3, 2016

The minutes were approved as a true and correct record. A member of the public queried whether under NA/27 the minutes should have read "SDDC would have to find savings of £1.5m a year by 2018-19" and not "in 2018-19". Kevin Stackhouse said from would have been a better description.

NA/5 Report back on issues raised at the last meeting

Rusty signs in St John's Drive and Tideswell Green

An additional report back from Jayne Arnold (SDDC Street Scene Officer) was added to that provided by Steve Sheppard (SDDC Street Scene Manager). She reported that the nameplates in the two locations were in a good, readable condition. However, the uprights were rusty so she had arranged for them to be sanded and painted. An uprooted nameplate in Tennyson Avenue had been reported so she investigated and found them to all be in good condition. A resident added that the street signs were periodically uprooted and were in a rusty state.

ACTION: Tom Sloan to report signs in Tennyson Avenue to the Street Scene team

NA/6 Public questions on issues raised by residents

A resident raised the issue of new homes built at the top of Wellwood Road, Midway, stating traffic levels and the amount of cars double parked in the area made it unacceptable. They asked if more spaces could be stipulated for a development? Councillor Bambrick replied that the application would have been dealt with under current planning regulations.

A member of the public reported that on Sunday, July 3, the new memorial would open at Newhall Park. The event would be attended by South Derbyshire MP Heather Wheeler, district councillors and the Lord Lieutenant of Derbyshire. Wreathes would be laid to those who lost their lives from the area. The resident also reported that Newhall Skate Park was in full operation and had proven a success, providing a great example of a community coming together. Councillor Bambrick said officers involved should be thanked for the work they put in.

A resident asked where £2.3m of Derbyshire County Council money allocated to members' projects in deprived areas was going to go. Councillor Bambrick replied that he and his fellow members wanted ideas from the community, such as "Super Kitchens" and projects which would bring people together. Councillor Paul Dunn added that the money – £7,000 in his case – would go towards initiatives that would bring people together, especially those who were isolated. However, anything set up would have to become self-funding in time. That was why volunteers were being sought to help run the projects. A resident said they could not believe that in 2016 there were soup kitchens and food banks in operation. Another member of the public asked if people would stay away from such projects because of pride. A resident said there was an opportunity to show people how to cook properly rather than just get the cheapest items from the supermarket.

NA/7 **County council issues**

A resident reported that on the footpath at the corner of Bretby Road and Rose Tree Lane tactile tiles had been run over and damaged. Councillor Bambrick added that he believed delivery lorries were responsible for running over the kerb and damaging the path.

Rose Tree Lane junction, Bretby Road, Newhall: damaged tactile paving
