- 2.1 To report details of performance for the quarter ending 30<sup>th</sup> June 2008, in relation to the current four key strands of the Council's Performance Management Framework

### 3.0 Detail

# Key Achievements during the last quarter (p.e. 30<sup>th</sup> June 2008)

- 3.1 The high level of performance and improvements detailed in this report has delivered a range of outcomes for local communities.
- 3.2 The key achievements during the first quarter for each of the key strands of the Council's Performance Management Framework are now itemised in turn, below:

## **Corporate Plan**

#### Theme 1: Safer and Healthier Communities

- √ A new Anti Social Behaviour protocol has been completed and approved by Committee.
- √ We are working with the Police and Trading Standards to enforce the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. A VAL group has commenced looking at problematic licensed premises. In addition, the Police have carried out 44 test purchase operations.
- $\sqrt{\phantom{a}}$  Domestic Abuse Action Plan has been produced. It is being progressed by the South Derbyshire Domestic Abuse Action team
- √ A debt counselling service in partnership with DHA is in place. 59% of people seeking advice have been able to remain in their current accommodation
- √ The 'Older Persons' survey is complete. New outputs are being identified to expand the Safer Homes Scheme
- √ £10,000 in funding has been secured to aid improvements at Newhall Park. A Multi-use Games Areas (MUGAs) at Salisbury Drive and Goseley are under construction.

### Theme 2: You at the Centre

- $\checkmark$  Older Persons Survey is complete. A series of focus groups have been programmed.
- √ A Cultural Events Group has been established. A District Events Guide has been published.

### Theme 4: Prosperity for All

- √ Work continues to take place in order to deliver the programme for ensuring that all Council homes are decent ahead of the Government's 2010 deadline
- √ Initial consultation exercises have been carried out in order to develop 'move-on' protocol for people in temporary supported accommodation
- √ Contracts have been signed for the introduction of customer choice into social housing allocations via Choice -Based Lettings. The first implementation workshop has been arranged for 31 July 2008
- √ There are 30 less 'vulnerable' households that are experiencing fuel poverty and poor housing standards in Rural Areas
- √ Heat savers, British Gas and Warmfront are working in the district in order to deliver energy conservation measures. As a result, 250 new energy conservation measures have been installed in new homes

### Theme 5: Rural South Derbyshire

√ Work to encourage and support local communities in preparing Community/
Parish Plans is progressing well. 9 Parish Plans are currently being supported

### **Community Strategy Action Plan**

#### Theme 2: Vibrant Communities

- √ A 'greenway' from Swadlincote to Moira is underway. A Walking Festival pilot was completed in May 2008.
- √ Disability Access Audits have been commissioned for Maurice Lea Park, Eureka Park, Newhall Park & Swadlincote Woodlands. The 'Green Flag' accreditation has been retained at Rosliston Forestry Centre. Maurice Lea Park has been awarded a 'Green Flag'
- $\sqrt{\ }$  A Cultural Events Group has been established. A District Events Guide has been published.

#### Theme 3: Safer Communities

- √ The Media Officer is in the process of writing articles on three Safer
  Neighbourhood Projects that involve Young People including the U Magz project,
  and the Hilton TAG group. An article has also been written on the Repton School
  girl who will be representing the GB Hockey team in the Olympics.
- Binge Drinking Campaign using publicity material produced by the Home Office is underway. The posters have been distributed to various locations, warning drinkers to drink sensibly
- √ £10,000 of funding has been secured to improve facilities at Newhall Park
- √ Contact has been made with Derbyshire DAAT to identify the current level of Alcohol Support services with a view to improving the service provision within the District

### **Theme 4: Healthier Communities**

- √ The CSC is setting up a number of opportunities to establish outreach physical activity initiatives in identified areas of deprivation and/or vulnerable groups across the district.
- √ The Young People Dance Programme is to be expanded during the summer months
- √ Work is in progress and on target to reduce the number of vulnerable people and families living in non-decent homes

# Performance to 30th June 2008

3.3 Summary details of actual/ out turn performance against targets set in relation to the current four components of the Council's Performance Framework will now be provided.

# **Corporate Plan**

3.4 This Committee has responsibility for 33 of the 58 Corporate Plan targets / actions. The quarterly performance is shown in Table 1 below.

- 3.7 The Council has responsibility or joint responsibility for 37 of the 71 actions within the Community Strategy Action Plan, which is divided into four themes. This Committee has responsibility or joint responsibility for 25 actions
- 3.8 Table 3 below shows that all the 25 actions (100.0%) have been 'achieved' and /or 'on target.'

#### National Indicator Set - Performance Indicators

- 3.9 In April 2008, the existing Best Value Performance Indicators were replaced by a set of 198 National Performance indicators. Approximately, 64 PIs will reported at the district level, of which 29 PIs will be collected by the Council from it's own data sources (others will come from other external data sources, such as Defra, ONS etc.) In addition a further 20 'Place survey' indicators will be collected every 2 years and these will measure residents satisfaction with the Council, community, their health and with anti-social behaviour.
- 3.10 Details regarding collection and reporting arrangements for the majority of these new performance indicators have not yet been clarified. Therefore, it is not possible to make any informed assessment at this stage.

### **Local Performance Indicators**

- 3.11 This Committee is responsible for a total of 81 Local Performance Indicators (LPIs) of which 11 are ex-Best Value Performance Indicators (BVPI's). Although these BVPIs no longer have to be reported to the Audit Commission, they have been retained as LPIs for service delivery purposes.
- 3.12 Table 4 below shows a summary of this Committee's performance against targets within each of the Corporate Plan themes. 81(92.0%) targets have been achieved or 'on target'.
