## **Summary of the Public Consultation Responses**

## **Key Findings**

- 1. 86% of respondents said they were either fairly aware or very aware of the waste issues identified in the questionnaire and supplementary information.
- 2. 94% of respondents claimed they were either fairly concerned or very concerned about the impact their rubbish is having on the environment.
- 3. Respondents' actions directly appear to reflect their concerns since 94% of respondents expressed concern about the impact their waste had on the environment and 92% of respondents said they separated their rubbish for recycling or composting.
- 4. Our results told us that respondents from the District of Erewash separated rubbish for recycling or composting the most out of all the Derbyshire Districts (98%) and respondents from the High Peak District separated rubbish for recycling or composting the least (89%).
- 5. The survey findings told us that young people from aged 16-17 years did the least separating or rubbish for recycling and composting than any other age group (85%). Mature respondents, aged 65-74 years, separated their rubbish for recycling and composting the most (96%) out of all the age groups.
- 6. The three most common materials that respondents said they currently separate for recycling and composting were: Paper (92% of respondents), Glass (88%) and Tins/cans (77%).
- 7. 45% of primary survey respondents said they did not consciously buy recycled goods or goods containing recycled materials, just over a third of respondents (37%) said they did.
- 8. When asked about what respondents currently do to reduce the rubbish they (or their family) produce the most popular responses included:- 64% of respondents who said they give unwanted gifts to charity, 51% said they repaired goods rather than throw them away and 50% did home composting.
- 9. Over three quarters (78%) of respondents had seen or heard either national or local advertising, or promotion about recycling and composting within the last 12 months.

- 10. The three most common types of media that respondents encountered concerning waste were: national newspapers and magazines (45% of respondents); the Derbyshire waste exhibition vehicle (36%); and the local newspapers (34%).
- 11. In light of the information provided to respondents, three quarters of them (75%) said they would separate their rubbish more in the future.
- 12. If facilities were made available, respondents identified which materials they would separate for recycling and composting. The most commonly cited materials were: Plastic bottles (64%); Card/cardboard (58%) and Electrical items (55%). Nearly half of respondents (48%) identified ten materials they would separate for recycling or composting if facilities were made available, demonstrating their willingness to contribute further to recycling and composting more of their rubbish.
- 13. Three quarters (76%) of them said they would prefer to recycle materials at the kerbside.
- 14. 56% of respondents said they would like to know more about what councils are doing, but that they were happy to let them get on with their job, and a third (33%) of respondents said they would like more say in what the local councils do with their rubbish.
- 15. The most commonly cited method for respondents to be more involved or have information was through local council newspapers (20% or respondents), by letter (19%) and by local media (18%). Fewer than 10% of respondents were interested in email, local council websites, local focus groups, exhibitions and leaflets.
