- 2.1 To inform Members of the Council's Annual Report, which summarises how we work as an authority, what we do and our financial performance.
- 2.2 The report has been specifically written and designed to be both appealing and understandable to the public, our partners and to businesses in the District.

3.0 <u>Detail</u>

- 3.1 The Council's Annual Report follows a set style and presentation of information for our residents and key stakeholders. Each year, revisions to the format and layout are proposed to keep the report both unique and informative.
- 3.2 This Annual Report captures the work that has been done by the Council and in partnership with other organisations over the past year. Throughout the document it can be seen that:
 - The Council has produced a Corporate Plan for 2016/21 with new themes that guide and capture all of the work that the Council does.
 - A clear map has been set out on how the Council will achieve the aims of the Corporate Plan and measure performance.
 - There continues to be a high level of achievement because of the Council's ongoing commitment to partnership working.
 - The Council has a robust approach towards the management of its resources and its performance in 'doing more with less'.

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- It is responsive to the needs and expectations of the community.

- The Council's work is enabling South Derbyshire to keep pace with its status as being one of the fastest-growing Districts in the country, for example by producing a Housing Strategy 2016/21 and building 45 new Council-owned homes across three sites in Linton, Swadlincote and Overseal.
- South Derbyshire is 'open for business', with multi-national firms continuing to invest in the area and major events like the inaugural Swadlincote Festival of International Food and Crafts pulling in thousands of visitors and promoting inward investment.
- 3.3 The Annual Report has again been managed, developed and designed by the Policy and Communications Team. All photographs used in the report have been taken in South Derbyshire.
- 3.4 It is important for the Council to continue to inform the community, businesses and partners of the work that has been completed and the plans for the future. This provides another vehicle to explain and receive feedback on our stated vision of *'making South Derbyshire a better place to live, work and visit'.*

4.0 Financial Implications

4.1 The Annual Report has been produced in-house by the Policy and Communications Team and is accommodated within the current budget.

5.0 Corporate Implications

5.1 This Annual Report reports on and is built around the themes of the Corporate Plan 2016/21 – People, Place, Progress and Outcomes. It also reports our financial performance for 2015/16 to the people of South Derbyshire.

6.0 <u>Community Implications</u>

South Derbyshire continues to be one of the fastest-growing districts in the UK, the population having increased by 15 per cent since 2001. By 2028, around 111,900 people are expected to call it home.

The area, which lies at the heart of The National Forest, is visited by more than two million tourists a year thanks to attractions like Rosliston Forestry Centre, Calke Abbey, Mercia Marina and Sharpe's Pottery Museum, while its 3,500 business enterprises – up from 3,100 in 2013 – have helped to create record numbers of people in work.

Figures such as these are a great source of pride to this Council, which in 2014 celebrated the 40th anniversary of its formation.

That anniversary was an opportunity to pause briefly and reflect on South Derbyshire's transformation from a clay and mining area to a thriving manufacturing, construction and retail economy. Since the Millennium the Council has focused on reinventing itself as a forward-looking "open for business" authority equipped to deliver success well into the future.

The Council's Corporate Plan 2016-21 sets out the way we intend to develop and further improve services over the next five years. The document makes clear our vision and values for South Derbyshire, based on People, Place, Progress and Outcomes.


These are challenging times for local authorities. We need to continue to make budget savings in order for the minimum level of General Reserves to be sustained. We are well prepared and are already achieving good progress in many areas of service delivery.

In the past year Green Flag Awards have been granted to Swadlincote's Eureka Park and Church Gresley's Maurice Lea Memorial Park – the official mark of a quality green space.

Work has progressed quickly on dozens of new council homes for the District at sites in Linton, Swadlincote and Overseal, while record numbers of Council tenants were found to be satisfied with the service they are receiving from the authority.

Our Building Control team received a prestigious national award for their work on the Boardwalk at Mercia Marina in Willington. Plans to create a 'cycling legacy' in South Derbyshire will make the District one of the most attractive places to travel on two wheels.

Multinational companies such as Nestlé and Toyota continue to reinvest in an area that prides itself on its reputation as a place to do business. It was a year in which the future of foundations specialist Roger Bullivant Limited (RB), which employs more than 400

people in the District, was secured
with the announcement that the firm
was moving from its Drakelow base to
industrial facilities in Hearthcote Road,
Swadlincote, while the growth of steel
lintel manufacturer Keystone Lintels has
been impressive.

South Derbyshire Business Advice Service continues to offer free expert advice and support to those considering a start-up venture or those already selfemployed. Working with our partners to keep crime and anti-social behaviour to a minimum has cemented South Derbyshire's reputation as one of the safest places to live in the county.

Exciting new events like the Swadlincote Festival of International Food and Crafts have drawn in thousands of visitors to the town, while the 'can do' spirit of its people was recognised by Sainsbury's, which announced a £1 million investment to reduce food waste under its Waste less, Save more initiative.

The Council's Corporate Plan 2016-21 is our pledge to the people of South Derbyshire that we will not rest on our laurels.

Our commitment to make this District a better place to live, work and visit remains as strong as ever.

The Corporate Plan 2016-21



The Corporate Plan sets out the way in which South Derbyshire District Council intends to develop and further improve its services between 2016 and 2021.

It was approved following extensive consultation into South Derbyshire's needs, categorising them under three central themes: People, Place and Progress.

By focusing on and monitoring performance against the Council's responsibilities under each theme it hopes to achieve Outcomes of financial health, governance, customer focus, equality and diversity, environmental standards, a skilled workforce and democracy.

The Corporate Plan is central to our work as a Council – it sets out our values and vision for South Derbyshire and defines our priorities for delivering high-quality services.

Attending Council meetings

All the Council's committees report back to Full Council meetings where their work can be considered by every Elected Member.

If you would like to come to see a committee or the Full Council in action, you can find a full calendar of meetings, as well as agendas and the minutes which record what was decided, by visiting the Council and Democracy section of our website at www.south-derbys.gov.uk.

Most of the meetings of the Council and its committees are open to the public. Occasionally some final agenda items are "exempt", which means that they can be discussed when only Councillors are present.

Items are exempt due to specific legal and contractual reasons or where individuals are identified.

The Finance and Management Committee ensures that all Council services are organised and funded effectively and efficiently.

The Environmental and Development Services Committee, alongside the Housing and Community Services Committee, sets out and monitors the work of Council staff to ensure the best possible services for the people of South Derbyshire.

The Council's Licensing and Appeals Committee handles licensing for entertainment, alcohol and

private hire drivers as well as any appeals on employment issues by Council staff.

In 2015-16 the Overview and Scrutiny Committee assisted the Finance and Management Committee to develop the Council's budget proposals, held a series of public meetings to discuss local Section 106 health-based planning contributions and set up a task group to consider the future cemetery needs of South Derbyshire.

The Planning Committee considers applications in relation to planning policy, the representations received from members of the public, consultation responses and the recommendations of the planning officer.

Tenant participation encourages individuals to make a real contribution to the decisions that affect their homes and communities. A Directory of Tenants details those interested in contributing to service delivery reviews. Participants are contacted when opportunities for involvement arise. There are currently 11 local tenants' area representatives, with plans to increase that number to 20 in the next two years.

Publications such as Housing Services' Annual Report, our tenants' magazine Housing News and our suite of leaflets ensure people are kept well informed.

Having your say at Area Forums

At these local meetings, local people can raise local issues. You can get involved in the decision-making process, find out more about Council services, express any concerns you might have as well as put forward your own ideas to add to your sense of community.

The meetings, held up to four times a year, cover the Etwall, Linton, Melbourne, Newhall, Repton and Swadlincote areas. Each starts with a Safer Neighbourhood meeting at 6.15pm, where community safety issues are discussed with Derbyshire Police Officers and Police Community Support Officers.

Through the commitment of people who attended these meetings, 14 local Safer Neighbourhood Projects were funded in 2015-16, including CCTV schemes, lighting and youth activities. High-visibility items such as snap bands and smiley stickers were purchased and given out to primary school pupils, while three 'Your Choice' events at secondary schools saw guest speakers provide thought-provoking and inspirational talks to the students.

There is a second meeting, beginning at 7.30pm, which is dedicated to District and County Council matters. Senior and specialist staff take part in the meetings, which are usually



attended by District, County and Parish Councillors.

Every year at the Area Forums, local residents are involved in deliberations about the rate at which Council Tax should be set.

People, Place, Progress

In researching our Corporate Plan 2016-21, it became clear that the things important to the District and its success are its People, Places and Progress, with the latter focused on economic development.

Underpinning every one of our activities are Outcomes including customer service, financial efficiency and environmental responsibility. These are included in the Corporate Plan to demonstrate their importance and to enable measures and projects to be set against them. The activities listed beneath each heading could often easily sit under another, reflecting our belief that viewing individual services in isolation will fail to deliver the high quality and integrated approach the District needs to succeed.

Here is a snapshot of what has been achieved in 2015-16 under our new themes:

People - Keeping residents healthy, happy and safe

Get Active in the Forest's **dementia walks**, **held at Rosliston Forestry Centre** and designed specifically for those living with the condition and their carers, were extended following a successful pilot.

Free tennis sessions aimed at the over-50s were introduced at Church Gresley's Maurice Lea Memorial Park in a bid to increase physical activity in a fun and informal way.

Record numbers of Council tenants (93 per cent) were found to be satisfied with the service they are receiving from the authority through the Survey of Tenants and Residents (STAR).

A Church Gresley man became the first person in South Derbyshire to be successfully prosecuted under new legislation allowing authorities to **regulate** the trade of scrap metal.

Sporting stars, dedicated volunteers and a raft of other inspirational individuals were officially recognised for their achievements in the **District's annual sports awards**. The Junior Sportsperson of the Year gong was won jointly by footballer, cricketer and skier Lara Shaw and table tennis star Helena Dicken.

Two long-serving football coaches – Bob Errington and Dave Jacobs – were presented with plaques by Council Chairman Cllr Neil Atkin to recognise their **dedication to nurturing young talent** at Repton Casuals Football Club.

Twenty Christmas hampers were made up and delivered to those in need by youngsters involved in Housing Services' Dreamscheme project.

A **Community Food Hub** to bring together people from all walks of life to enjoy a meal together was introduced. Run in partnership with Derbyshire County Council and South Derbyshire CVS, around 30 people regularly attended bi-monthly meal events in the first three months of the scheme.

A new jogging group designed to get people of all ages out and active was launched. Aston Joggers was set up as part of the Jog Derbyshire initiative.

Nine numberplate security operations were held across the District, with more than 300 vehicles secured.

A weekly 5km parkrun – an international scheme encouraging people to get jogging – was introduced at Rosliston Forestry Centre.

An animated **Champions of Recycling video** designed to help reach a new generation of recyclers was launched.

Supermarket Sainsbury's announced a £1 million investment in Swadlincote to reduce food waste under the Waste less, Save more initiative.

The **annual South Derbyshire Day** took place at Derby County FC's iPro Stadium, celebrating the District and the contribution made by its volunteers.

Representatives from across the private, public and voluntary sectors came together to share ideas to make South Derbyshire a **'Dementia Friendly Community,'** under which strategies will be put in place to improve inclusion and quality of life for those living with dementia, their families, friends and carers.

An **Active Adults programme** aimed at those aged 60 and above was introduced at Etwall Leisure Centre.

A **beacon was lit** in Swadlincote's Eureka Park to celebrate the Queen's 90th birthday.

Plans to bring **outdoor table tennis facilities** to South Derbyshire were announced after the Council secured a grant from Tesco's Bags of Help initiative.

DAA Dementia Action Allian A project to **commemorate those who died in World War One** was completed. The Environmental Education Project team, part of the Council, used a £9,800 Heritage Lottery Fund grant to **create history trails throughout the District**.

Green Flag Awards – the mark of a quality green space - were officially bestowed upon Swadlincote's Eureka Park and Church Gresley's Maurice Lea Memorial Park. It was the second year running that both parks had received such recognition.

Ceremonies were held to mark building progress at three South Derbyshire sites which will **provide dozens of new council homes for the District** – the 23-home Coton Croft in Coton Park, Linton; a 10-home development in Pennine Way, Swadlincote; and a 12-home scheme in Lullington Road, Overseal.

A programme of work to ensure that South Derbyshire's **cemeteries are safe for everyone** who visits them continued in Newhall with memorial safety testing at St John's churchyard and Newhall Cemetery.

BBC Radio 2 Folk music award-winner Blair Dunlop gave a performance at Milton Village Hall under the **Live & Local scheme**.

A public consultation was launched on Part 2 of the **South Derbyshire Local Plan**, the document that will guide the number of homes to be built in the District up to 2028. Part 2 of the Local Plan is the section that will allocate sites in the District for developments of fewer than 100 homes. It will also identify areas of green space which are of particular importance to local communities and would be protected from future development, with topics such as retail, heritage and educational facilities also covered.

Housing Services, under the Dreamscheme project, created a '**community allotment**' at the Midway Allotments in Chestnut Avenue, which will be cared for and managed on a voluntary basis to act both as an educational resource and to provide fresh food to those who need it.

The **Council's Housing Strategy** 2016-21, which sets out how future housing needs in the District will be met, was unveiled. The document makes clear priorities such as satisfying the demand for affordable properties, along with details about how the District's most vulnerable residents will be protected. The Wednesday Night Project, designed to engage young people and allow them to express themselves, was launched at Swadlincote's former Market Hall.

A **£50,500 skate park** was installed at Newhall Park.

Plans to create a 'cycling legacy' in South Derbyshire and make the District **one of the most attractive places to travel on two wheels** were unveiled. The vision was ignited by news that the world's top female cyclists were to race through the area on Stage 4 of the Aviva Women's Tour 2016.

A survey asking people to help shape the development of sporting and recreational facilities in South Derbyshire up to 2028 was conducted. The results will help to form the emerging Open Space, Sport and Community Facility Strategy.

Progress - Encouraging inward investment and tourism opportunities



Swadlincote's **award-winning monthly farmers' market** continued to go from strength to strength, offering the finest food from The National Forest and beyond. Its varying themes included British asparagus, strawberries and cream, Halloween treats and National Butchers' Week.

More than **70 walks catering for every age, taste and ability** were enjoyed as part of The National Forest Walking Festival 2015.

Thousands of people flocked to enjoy a mixture of vintage vehicles and family entertainment as part of the annual **Swadlincote Festival of Transport**, which transformed the town centre into a trip down memory lane.

Seventy-five per cent of the 600-plus food retail and catering businesses in South Derbyshire received the **maximum 'five' rating** for hygiene standards from the Council's Environmental Health team. The future of foundations specialist **Roger Bullivant Limited (RB)** was secured with the announcement that the firm was moving from its Drakelow base to **new state-of-the-art facilities** in Hearthcote Road, Swadlincote. The company employs more than 400 people in South Derbyshire.

A free **'Thinking of starting a business?'** session took place in Swadlincote, organised by the South Derbyshire Business Advice Service and aimed at those considering a startup venture or already self-employed.

A **Business Breakfast** was held at Willington's Mercia Marina, giving companies a chance to broaden their horizons and learn about grants and new business opportunities.

The state-of-the-art **Swadlincote Golf Centre** was officially opened.

The High Sheriff of Derbyshire Oliver Stephenson officially opened Swadlincote's first ever **Antiques, Collectables and Vintage Fair**.

The Swadlincote Townscape Heritage Fund, a project managed by the Council, **secured more than £400,000** from the Heritage Lottery Fund to further improve the town centre.

Swadlincote's first ever **Festival of International Food and Crafts** attracted thousands of people keen to sample paella, kangaroo meat, fine chocolates, continental beers and artisan sausages, as well as a craft market, live music and children's activities.

A free course, delivered on behalf of the D2N2 Growth Hub in partnership with the Council, promised to help businesses produce 'Champagne Marketing on a Lemonade Budget.'

The Council's Building Control team received a **prestigious national award** for its work on **The Boardwalk at Mercia Marina**, which was named best small commercial building at the grand final of the Local Authority Building Control Building Excellence Awards.

The first ever **Swadlincote Spring Wedding Fair** featured 50 local businesses and attracted first-time visitors to the town from as far afield as Blackpool.

Thousands of people turned out for the annual **Swadlincote Christmas lights switch-on**, part of a three-day celebration which included the monthly farmers' market.

Hundreds of people turned up to the **annual Swadlincote Jobs Fair**, where more than 70 exhibitors offered around 1,500 roles and 120 apprenticeships. Youngsters from four South Derbyshire schools were invited to 'have a go' at a series of new skills, with major employers present including Dellner, 3aaa and Northgate Public Services.

Payment machines were introduced at

the Council's Civic Offices in a bid to reduce waiting times for customers. The two paypoints process money securely within 24 hours and accept Council Tax, planning, licensing and housing rental payments and currently complete between 900 and 1,000 transactions per month.

A **specially designed leaflet** was produced to combat the biggest cause of noise complaints in South Derbyshire – barking dogs.

Almost £300,000 was handed out to 22 South **Derbyshire groups and projects** committed to improving people's quality of life under the Community Partnership Scheme, from a scout group and parish councils to a cricket club, churches and village halls.

The Council scooped the **Gold award** – meaning it is going above and beyond the call of duty – in the **RoSPA Occupational Health and Safety Awards 2015**. It was the fifth consecutive year it had been named among the winners, with recognition afforded to the high standards shown across the organisation to keep residents, visitors and staff safe.

Almost 42,000 Housing Electoral Registration Enquiry Forms

were delivered to homes across South Derbyshire to ensure an up-to-date electoral register and to encourage people to register to vote in upcoming elections.

The Council stepped up measures to ensure residents were not incorrectly or fraudulently claiming money by issuing postal reminders with Benefits-related correspondence, as well as using **new software technology** to identify credit data and therefore changes in circumstances. One South Derbyshire resident was handed a suspended jail sentence after admitting wrongly claiming more than £15,400 in Benefits.

Additional income received from business rates and planning fees helped the Council to **achieve a budget surplus** in 2015-16, further strengthening an overall financial position which had been steadily improving in recent years.

The hashtag **#SDwhatson**, indicating 'South Derbyshire what's on', was introduced on social media to help create an instantly searchable directory of upcoming events in the District at the click of a mouse button or touch of a screen.

A Community Governance Review to


establish whether or not a parish council would be created commenced, following the submission of a petition from the Newhall and Stanton Parish Council Campaign Group. The Council and its operational centres achieved the **revised ISO14001 standard for environmental management**, making the authority one of the first organisations internationally to be awarded it and be recognised for adopting enhanced methods of managing environmental impact. The management framework has seen significant energy reduction and cost savings at leisure centre sites, for example.

South Derbyshire Sport focuses on increasing sports participation by young people. More than 1,400 young people attended the 37 Summer Activities sessions held in the District's parks during the summer of 2015.

The National Forest Company

The National Forest Company is a co-sponsor with Rolls-Royce of the Environmental Education Project which works to develop knowledge, respect and understanding of the environment. It also supports events and walking schemes.

The South Derbyshire School Sports Partnership

The partnership is managed by the Council's Sport and Health team. It has had great success with activities for young people including competitions and festivals, school games, leadership and volunteering and Bikeability.

The South Derbyshire Partnership

This partnership of the public, private and voluntary sector promotes South Derbyshire through three groups which focus on community safety, sustainable development and health and wellbeing.

Summary of Accounts

Our Income

Our total income for 2015-2016 was £48.1 million compared to £49.8 million in 2014-2015.

This came from grants, housing rents, Council Tax, fees and interest.

In 2015-2016, our element of the Council Tax remained the same as 2014-2015. This gave a Band D Council Tax of £150.25, significantly less than the national average of £168 for shire district councils. The figure for housing rents pays for local authority housing.

Our Expenditure

Our revenue account shows the costs of running our services. In 2015-2016, we spent a total of £44.6 million on delivering services. This was 2% less than the £45.7 million we spent on services in 2014-2015. The decrease was mainly due to some budget reductions, together with expenditure on housing benefits. Our revenue also shows the costs of delivering our priorities and the amount left to be financed from local and national tax income.

What We Spent on Services



What We Spent on Land and Property

Our **capital account** sets out the money we spend on buying and improving our land and property so we can offer first-class public facilities. In 2015-2016, we spent £11.8 million on our land and property assets. We financed this through £1.8 million of grants and contributions and £10 million from capital receipts and reserves.

At the end of the financial year we draw up a balance sheet that shows how much our land and buildings are worth, what we owe others, what others owe us and how much cash we have. Our net worth is £46.4 million.

The Director of Finance and Corporate Services' Statement

The Council was able to achieve a budget surplus in 2015-2016, mainly due to additional income being received from business rates and planning fees. This has further strengthened the Council's overall financial position, which had been steadily improving in recent years.

Due to anticipated reductions in core funding it's likely that the Council will need to address budget deficits from 2018-2019, but it is considered that the authority is in a good position to meet this challenge.

The Council's external auditors Ernst & Young were appointed to review our 2015-2016 accounts. We received an unqualified audit opinion and Full Council approved these accounts on September 22, 2016. A full copy of the audited statement of accounts is available on our website at:

- 3.1 Members will be aware all agendas are distributed via electronic means aside from Council summonses.
- 3.2 The Local Government (Electronic Communications) (England) Order 2015 enables the use of electronic communications to send summonses to Elected Members. This confirms that electronic communications have the same legal status in terms of giving notice of a meeting as hard copy summonses. The Order modifies provisions in Schedule 12 to the Local Government Act 1972.
- 3.3 The Order gives Members flexibility as to how they receive summonses. Members will only receive summonses electronically where they consent to it being transmitted by this method and may withdraw their individual consent at any time, at which point the traditional methods of notification will once again apply to that/those Member(s).

4.1 All meeting agendas/summonses will be sent to Members electronically.

1. <u>Recommendations</u>

- 1.1 That Members adopt the resolution detailed in paragraph 3.4 of this report so as to allow street trading in the area detailed to come into effect from 1st November 2016.
- 1.2 That Members approve the Street Trading Policy to come into effect from 1st November 2016.
- 1.3 That the proposed fees for street trading are approved.

2. <u>Purpose of Report</u>

2.1 To provide Members with the necessary information to be able to give full consideration to the recommendations contained in this report.

3. <u>Detail</u>

- 3.1 Under Schedule 4 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982, a Council has the power to adopt the Schedule enabling them to control street trading in their District. This Council adopted Schedule 4 in April 1991 and designated streets in Swadlincote as consent streets therefore any person trading in these streets would require a consent from the Council.
- 3.2 In light of the recent changes to Swadlincote Town Centre, it is proposed to pass a resolution to increase the number of designated consent streets to include all streets within the boundary of the Town Centre as detailed on the map attached as **Appendix 1**.
- 3.3 On 2nd June 2016, Environment and Developmental Services Committee approved the publication of a notice of the Council's intention to increase the number of streets designated as consent streets for street trading purposes.
- 3.4 The notice was published in the Burton Mail and Derby Telegraph on 26th July 2016. Copies of the notice were also served on the Chief Officer of Police, the

Highways Agency and the Council's Property Services Department. The notice states that the Council intends to adopt the following resolution:

"That pursuant to Section 3 and Schedule 4 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982, South Derbyshire District Council, under this resolution, hereby designates the following streets plus all streets contained within the boundary of the below listed streets as consent streets for the purposes of street trading:

Civic Way, walkway to Toulmin Drive leading to Rowley Court to back of Belmont Street Industrial Estate to Belmont Street to Civic Way to back of Church Street to Hill Street to Sir Herbert Wragg Way to Coppice Side to back of Pipeworks Retail Park to back of Rink Road to Alexandra Road to back of West Street to Heathcote Road to back of Sainsburys to William Nadin Way to Darklands Lane to Darklands Road."

- 3.5 Anyone wishing to make representations in relation to the proposed resolution had to make such representations within 28 days of the date of the notice. No representations were received in relation to the draft resolution.
- 3.6 On adoption of the resolution, notices shall be published in the Burton Mail and Derby Telegraph for two consecutive weeks notifying the public that the resolution to adopt street trading has been passed.

Street Trading Policy

- 3.7 To assist applicants and existing licence holders in applying for a street trading consent and Members in determining applications, a Street Trading Policy has been produced.
- 3.8 Officers conducted an initial 8 weeks consultation exercise on the draft Policy with all interested parties and members of the public via the Council's website. Representations were received from the Economic Development Department and the Community and Leisure Department with regards to protection of the market, fees and special event licences.
- 3.9 After discussion with both Departments, the draft Policy was amended and a further consultation exercise was carried out over a 4 week period on the draft Policy with all interested parties and members of the public via the Council's website. No responses were received in relation to this consultation. The proposed Policy is attached as **Appendix 2**.

Fees

3.10 Under the legislation, the Council may charge such fees as they consider reasonable for the grant or renewal of a street trading consent. The current fee of £34 does not reflect the actual cost to the Council of issuing a street trading consent therefore the fees have been reviewed and the following fees are proposed:

Grant/renewal of consent:	Application fee - £206
	Consent fee - £166
Special events consent:	£179

In compliance with the Provision of Services Regulations 2009, the cost of the consent has been split between Page 20 ica 100 fee and a consent fee. The


application fee is payable on application and is non-refundable if the application is refused. The consent fee is payable if the application is granted prior to the issuing of the licence. The special events consent fee has not been split as this fee does not include any management or enforcement of the consent as the consent is for one off special events.

4. Financial Implications

4.1 There are no financial implications to the Council.

5. <u>Corporate Implications</u>

5.1 These proposals will provide a clear framework for anyone wishing to start their own business which will contribute directly to the corporate vision to make South Derbyshire a better place to live, work, and visit, and to the theme of sustainable growth and opportunity.





Issue 1: November 2016

1. Introduction

- 1.1 Under Schedule 4 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 ("the Act"), a Council has the power to adopt the Schedule enabling them to control street trading within their District. Once this Schedule has been adopted, a Council may choose to designate any street within its areas as a prohibited, licence or consent street.
- 1.2 South Derbyshire District Council adopted Schedule 4 in April 1991. The Council choose to designate the streets within the street trading area as consent streets.

2. Purpose of the Policy

- 2.1 This Policy sets out the Council's framework for the management of street trading in the District. Through the street trading scheme, the Council aims to regulate the location and number of street traders. The scheme also aims to prevent the obstruction of the streets of Swadlincote by street trading activities. In doing so, the Council recognises the importance of licensed businesses to the local economy and the character of the area whilst trying to ensure that the activities do not cause nuisance or annoyance to the people in the area.
- 2.2 This Council will have regard to this Policy when determining street trading applications. Each application or enforcement measure will be considered on its own merits. Where it is necessary for the Council to depart substantially from this Policy, clear and compelling reasons will be given for doing so.
- 2.3 This Policy will also assist applicants and existing permit holders with the application process and advising how applications will be determined.
- 2.4 The Council undertakes to avoid duplication with other statutory provisions and our commitment to work in partnership with other relevant enforcement agencies.

3. Consultation

- 3.1 In determining this Policy, the Council has consulted with the following people and bodies:
 - Derbyshire Constabulary;
 - Derbyshire Fire and Rescue Service;
 - Derbyshire County Council Highways;
 - All current consent holders;
 - Members of the public.
- 3.2 The following departments within the Council have also been consulted:
 - Economic Development;
 - Community and Planning;
 - Environmental Health;
 - Legal and Democratic Services.
- 3.3 The views of all appropriate bodies and organisations have been considered and taken into account.

4. Review of the Policy

4.1 This Policy will be reviewed every 3 years. At the time of review, the Council will consult with the list of people detailed above. In addition to the 3 yearly review, the Council will continue to evaluate the Policy and may update it at any time. Any minor changes to the Policy have been delegated to the Legal and Democratic Services Manager.

5. Legislation and Current Provision

- 5.1 In 1991, the Council resolved that Schedule 4 to the Act should apply to the following streets in Swadlincote Town Centre:
 - Whole of Midland Road;
 - Church Street;
 - Civic Way;
 - Belmont Street;
 - Grove Street;
 - High Street;
 - Hill Street;
 - Market Street;
 - Alexandra Road southwards to its inter-section with Hastings Road and West Street – westwards to its junction with Civic Way.
- 5.2 The Council resolved to designate the above streets as 'consent streets' therefore any person trading in these streets would require a consent from the Council.
- 5.3 In light of the recent changes to Swadlincote Town Centre, it is resolved to increase the streets designated as consent streets to include all streets within the boundary of the Town Centre as detailed on the map attached at Appendix 1 of this Policy and as detailed below:

Civic Way, walkway to Toulmin Drive leading to Rowley Court to back of Belmont Street Industrial Estate to Belmont Street to Civic Way to back of Church Street to Hill Street to Sir Herbert Wragg Way to Coppice Side to back of Pipeworks Retail Park to back of Rink Road to Alexandra Road to back of West Street to Heathcote Road to back of Sainsburys to William Nadin Way to Darklands Lane to Darklands Road.

- 5.4 Any street trading that takes place in any of the areas within the boundary as marked on the map will require a street trading consent from the Council. Please note that in addition to a street trading consent, other permissions may be required from the Council in order to trade in the town centre.
- 5.5 Street trading is defined as 'the selling or exposing or offering for sale of any article (including a living thing) in a street.' The following are not street trading for the purposes of this Policy:
 - (a) Trading as a pedlar under the authority of a pedlar's certificate granted under the Pedlars Act 1971;
 - (b) Any trade in a market or fair, the right to hold which was acquired by virtue of a grant (including a presumed grant) or acquired or established by virtue of an enactment or order;
 - (c) Trading as a news vendor;
 - (d) Trading at or adjoining a shop business as part of the business of the shop;

- (e) Offering or selling things as a roundsman. A roundsman does not include ice cream sellers or mobile catering vehicles.
- 5.6 A street is defined as 'any road, footway, beach or other area to which the public have access without payment and a service area as defined in section 329 of the Highways Act 1980.

6. Delegation of Functions

- 6.1 Applications for a consent will be determined by Officers unless representations have been received against the application or there are concerns in relation to the applicant.
- 6.2 In these circumstances, the application will be considered by the Licensing and Appeals Sub-Committee. The applicant will be provided with the opportunity to present oral and/or written evidence to Members for consideration.

7. General Principles

- 7.1 No consent will be issued for market days except for consents already in place at the time the Policy comes into force. Market days are Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Any consent granted will state the times and days that a licence holder is permitted to trade.
- 7.2 Trade of general products would normally be expected to be a part of the market.
- 7.3 A consent will be held by the Cultural Services Department on behalf of South Derbyshire District Council to cover events arranged for or on behalf of the Council.

8. Applications for the Grant of a Street Trading Consent

- 8.1 An application for a consent must be made on the Council's application form which can be found on the Council's website. The relevant fee and supporting documentation detailed on the application form must be submitted with the application form. Applications can also be submitted online via the Council's website.
- 8.2 On receipt of the application, the Licensing Department will send a copy of the application form via email to the following consultees:
 - Derbyshire Constabulary;
 - Derbyshire County Council Highways;
 - Environmental Health;
 - Economic Development Department;
 - Cultural Services Department;
 - Current holder of the market contract;
 - Ward Councillors.
- 8.3 There will be a 28 day representation period for any representations to be received in relation to the application.
- 8.4 If no representations are received, the application will be granted as applied for subject to the standard conditions.

- 8.5 If any representation is received in relation to an application for consent, the application will be referred to the Licensing and Appeals Sub-Committee for determination. The Council will endeavour to hold the Licensing and Appeals Sub-Committee within 28 days of the end of the representation period.
- 8.6 Each application will be decided on its own merits. Members will determine the application based on all the information received in support of the application and representation(s).
- 8.7 In considering an application, the Council will have regard to the following matters:
 - Number, nature and type of traders already in the area;
 - Public safety;
 - Public order;
 - Avoidance of public nuisance;
 - Size and appearance of the stall or vehicle;
 - Needs of the area;
 - Impact on market and town centre retailers;
 - Impact on any planned events;
 - Suitability of the applicant;
 - Environmental credentials.
- 8.8 Following the determination of the application, the applicant and people making representations will be notified of the decision and the reasons in writing within 5 working days of the date of the hearing.
- 8.9 There is no statutory right of appeal against the refusal to issue a consent.
- 8.10 Until an application has been determined, it is an offence to trade without a consent.

9. Applications to Renew a Street Trading Consent

- 9.1 Consents are issued for a period of up to one year.
- 9.2 Applications to renew a consent must be submitted at least 6 weeks before the expiry of the current consent. Once the renewal application has been received, the Council may consult further to determine if the consent holder is a cause for concern or has been subject to any complaints.
- 9.3 If a renewal application is not made before the expiry of the current consent, a new application will be required. The effect of this will be that no street trading will be permitted until the new application has been determined.
- 9.4 If a renewal application has been received prior to the expiry of the current consent, the consent holder will be able to continue to trade whilst the application is being determined.
- 9.5 In relation to the determination of the renewal application, if there have been no justifiable complaints, enforcement issues or no change in circumstances in the town centre affecting the trader and the fee has been paid, the consent will be renewed.

10. Transfer of a Street Trading Consent

- 10.1 A street trading consent cannot be transferred or sold to another person except that the consent may be transferred to a member of the consent holder's immediate family in the event of the consent holder's death or incapacity.
- 10.2 The sub-letting of a pitch is prohibited.

11. Variation of a Street Trading Consent

- 11.1 Any variation to the details of the consent holder must be notified to the Council in writing. The Council will issue an amended consent on payment of the relevant fee. The original consent must be returned to the Council.
- 11.2 Any variation to the range of goods for sale, days and/or hours of trading must be notified to the Council in writing. The Council will consider the request taking into consideration the request and the number of existing traders and retailers already offering the proposed goods for sale. Payment of the relevant fee is required. The original consent must be returned to the Council.

12. Revocation of a Street Trading Consent

- 12.1 If there are any concerns about the consent holder through justified complaints or evidence of breach of conditions, the Licensing Department may refer the consent holder to the Licensing and Appeals Sub-Committee for consideration.
- 12.2 The consent holder will be provided with the opportunity to present oral and/or written evidence to Members for consideration.
- 12.3 There is no right of appeal against the decision to revoke a street trading consent.
- 12.4 Where a consent is revoked, there will be no refund of the application fee.

13. Markets

13.1 Swadlincote Market as a Chartered Market is outside the scope of the street trading regime.

14. Special Event Consent

- 14.1 In order to remove the requirement for each individual trader to obtain their own consent, the Council will issue a Special Event Consent that facilitates multi-user street trading for community events.
- 14.2 The application form for a Special Event Consent must be accompanied by permission in principle from the Cultural Services Department.
- 14.3 The consent will be issued for the duration of the specified event only and will be to a named individual. Where the application is made by an organisation, they must nominate a named individual who will be responsible for managing the use of the consent.
- 14.4 The consent holder will be responsible for ensuring compliance with the conditions attached to the consent at all times whilst the consent is being used to facilitate street trading.

- 14.5 The consent holder will be required to keep records of all traders that use the Special Event Consent including the date, trading location, name and company name, address, vehicle registration, contact telephone numbers and items for sale.
- 14.6 Special Event Consents provide exclusive control over trading in the designated area. Individuals are still able to apply direct to the Council for a consent. Licence holders of an annual consent will not be able to trade during a special event unless written permission has been granted from the Council.

15. Fees

- 15.1 Fees will be set and reviewed annually on a full cost recovery basis. Details of the current fees can be found on the Council's website.
- 15.2 The initial application fee for the grant of a consent is payable on application. Arrangements can be put in place to enable the renewal fee to be paid quarterly in advance.
- 15.2 Where trading ceases during the term of a consent, written notice must be provided to the Council. The consent must be returned with the notification. Any refund due will issued on a pro rata basis for the number of whole months remaining on the consent.

16. Conditions

- 16.1 On the grant of a consent, the standard conditions will apply to the consent. The standard conditions are not exhaustive and other conditions may be attached to individual consents where appropriate. A copy of the standard conditions can be found at Appendix 2 of this Policy.
- 16.2 Street trading can only be carried out from the stall or vehicle authorised on the consent. Any changes to or replacement of the stall or vehicle must be approved by the Council.

17. Compliance and Enforcement

- 17.1 Each consent holder must comply with the standard conditions at all times. To ensure compliance with the conditions, the Licensing Officer may visit traders during the term of the licence.
- 17.2 The Council is committed to enforcing the provisions contained within the relevant legislation and to work in partnership with all enforcement agencies to provide consistent enforcement on licensing issues.
- 17.3 Where unlicensed street trading takes place or conditions attached to a consent are breached, the Council will gather evidence and take the necessary enforcement action in line with the Environmental Health and Licensing Enforcement Policy.
- 17.4 Consent holders selling hot food and/or beverages between 11pm and 5am must be authorised by way of a premises licence under the Licensing Act 2003.



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Appendix 2

Conditions attached to a Street Trading Consent

- 1. Street trading can only be carried out from the stall or vehicle authorised under the consent. Any changes to or replacement of the stall or vehicle must be approved by the Licensing Authority.
- 2. The consent holder shall not be the cause of any nuisance, obstruction or annoyance to any other user of the highway, the occupier of any land or building or the Council. Consent holders shall have special regard to and must take positive action to prevent excessive noise.
- 3. The consent holder shall ensure refuse originating from their trade is disposed of by a licensed waste carrier and shall leave the site clear of refuse at the completion of trading. No water or waste material shall be discharged on to the highway or any adjacent property.
- 4. The consent holder shall ensure that the area in the vicinity of the stall or vehicle is kept clear of all refuse at all times.
- 5. The consent holder's stall or vehicle shall be kept in a clean, safe and well maintained condition and be of a presentable appearance.
- 6. The street trading consent bearing the name of the consent holder shall be prominently displayed on the stall or vehicle so that that it is clearly visible to members of the public during trading hours.
- 7. The consent holder's vehicle shall be maintained in a roadworthy condition with continuous insurance, tax and MOT certificate.
- 8. Adequate fire-fighting equipment shall be provided in the stall or vehicle at all times.
- 9. Where gas cylinders are used, an annual gas safety certificate is required to ensure the safety of all gas cooking and heating equipment.
- 10. All stalls or vehicles selling hot food or drinks are required to carry a first aid kit.
- 11. All staff involved in the preparation of food shall hold a current Level 2 Food Safety Certificate.
- 12. A street trading consent cannot be transferred or sold to another person except that the consent may be transferred to a member of the consent holder's immediate family in the event of the consent holder's death or incapacity.
- 13. Sub-letting of pitches is prohibited.
- 14. The consent holder must be the principal operator and have day to day control of the stall or vehicle. The consent holder may employ any other person to assist in the operating of the stall or vehicle and shall notify the Licensing Authority of the name and address of that person.

- 15. The consent holder shall have and maintain an insurance policy against public liability and third party risks. The insurance certificate should be produced to the Authorised Officer on request.
- 16. The consent holder shall at all times obey all tariff regulations in force in the consent area.

1.0 <u>Recommendations</u>

1.1 To accept the Local Government Ombudsman's Annual Review Letter 2016.

2.0 Purpose of Report

- 2.1 This report will provide Members with a summary of complaints made to the Local Government Ombudsman ("LGO") against this Authority during the year 2015/16.
- 2.2 It will also bring Members up to date on developments in the LGO service.

3.0 Detail

- 3.1 On 21st July 2016, the Council received the Annual Review Letter for the period 2015/16 and a summary of statistics on complaints.
- 3.2 The Ombudsman's Office made decisions on 9 complaints about the Council in 2015/16. Of these complaints, advice was given in 1 case, 4 were closed after initial enquiries, 2 were referred back for local resolution, 1 complaint was incomplete/invalid, and 1 complaint was not upheld.
- 3.3 The LGO does not provide detailed information about the statistics and, therefore, in order to provide some background information for Members, the Council's LGO Link Officer has produced a table of complaint decisions, which is attached at Annexe 'A'. This provides a breakdown of the type of complaints received and a summary of the decisions.

LGO Developments

Ombudsman Reform

3.4 The government has announced the intention to produce draft legislation for the creation of a single ombudsman for public services in England. The Local Government Ombudsman supports this, as it will provide the public with a clearer route to redress in an increasing of a single of the public service delivery.

3.5 The LGO says it will continue to support government in the realisation of the public service ombudsman and is advising on the importance of maintaining its 40+ years' experience of working with local government and its understanding of the unique accountability structures.

3.6 This year's Annual Review will be the last to be written by Dr Martin, whose seven year term of office comes to an end in January 2017.

Manual for Councils

3.7 In June 2016, the LGO published a Manual for Councils. The manual is intended to provide detailed information about the LGO service, how it works and the processes followed when considering and investigating complaints. 4.0 Financial Implications

4.1 None directly arising from this report.

5.0 <u>Corporate Implications</u>

5.1 A good complaints system is an opportunity for the Council to show that it cares about providing a good service, and that it genuinely values feedback on whether there are any problems which need attention. It is, therefore, imperative that we get feedback, not only through our own complaints system, but also from the Ombudsman, and that this information is widely distributed to show that this Authority takes complaints seriously and deals with them sympathetically.

6.0 <u>Community Implications</u>

6.1 One of the roles of the Local Government Ombudsman is to investigate complaints about Councils from members of the public. Its aim is to get Councils to put things right if they have gone wrong and if this has affected members of the public directly.

7.0 Conclusion

7.1 The Annual Review Letter and the publishing of complaint decisions on the LGO website are useful additions to other information held by the Council, highlighting how people experience or perceive its services. They should also be seen as an opportunity to continue to improve the services offered by the Council.

1.0 <u>Recommendations</u>

- 1.1 That Members note the results of the Draft Proposals consultation.
- 1.2 That Members agree to the publication of the results of the Draft Proposals consultation.
- 1.3 That Members consider and determine the outcome(s) of the Community Governance Review for Newhall and Stanton (the Review).
- 1.4 That Members approve the publication of the Final Proposals.
- 1.5 That Members delegate authority to Officers to make the necessary Community Governance Reorganisation Order, if required, to implement the final recommendations from the Review.

2.0 <u>Purpose of Report</u>

- 2.1 To report the outcome of the Draft Proposals consultation which took place in Newhall and Stanton on the proposal to form a Newhall and Stanton Parish Council (under the provisions of Part 4 of the Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act 2007).
- 2.2 To determine the next action(s) for the Review.

3.0 <u>Detail</u>

3.1 The Review was instigated following the submission of a valid petition from the Newhall and Stanton Parish Council Campaign Group, **Appendix 1**, requesting that a Parish Council be constituted for the area of Newhall and Stanton. As this area does not already exist as a parish, the petition is treated to also include a request for

a parish to be constituted.

- 3.2 The initial consultation period was held from 1st February 2016 to 13th March 2016. Letters detailing the consultation and containing the Terms of Reference document, **Appendix 2**, were issued to all addresses within Newhall and Stanton (a total of 3,681 addresses), together with Ward Members, Derbyshire County Councillors for the area and neighbouring areas, the Member of Parliament, Derbyshire County Council, neighbouring Parish Council's and community representative groups.
- 3.3 A total of 374 responses were received, of which 12 were discounted as received after the consultation end date of 13th March 2016. A summary of the remaining 362 responses were as shown below.

*Two representations were received expressing neither support nor opposition to the Proposal.

- 3.4 Having taken into account all consultation responses made during the first stage of consultation and having regard to the need to ensure that Community Governance within the area reflects the identities and interests of the community, is effective and convenient, the draft recommendation of officers was: 'To accept the majority representation from the people of Newhall and Stanton that a Parish Council be constituted for the area of Newhall and Stanton.'
- 3.5 As agreed by Council on 19th May 2016, the Draft Proposals, **Appendix 3**, were published on 23rd May 2016. Letters detailing the consultation and containing the Draft Proposals document were issued to all addresses within Newhall and Stanton, and to all other interested parties as detailed at 3.2 above. This consultation period commenced on 23rd May 2016 and ended on 3rd July 2016. A copy of the letter which accompanied the Draft Proposals is attached as **Appendix 4**.
- 3.6 Representations were received, totalling 43, of which 21 were discounted as received after the consultation end date of 3rd July 2016. A summary of the remaining 22 responses are shown below. Details relating to these responses are attached as **Appendix 5a**.

3.7 Members commissioned a survey of Newhall and Stanton residents during this second consultation period, with a total of 937 responses received, of which 35 were discounted as received after the consultation end date of 3rd July 2016. A summary of the remaining responses are shown below. Details relating to these responses are attached as **Appendix 5b**.

*Four representations were received expressing neither support nor opposition to the Proposal.

There were found to be eight duplicate entries across the two lists, seven in favour, one against. In the interests of ensuring only one vote per individual is counted, these have been deducted from the above figures, resulting in a revised total of 894.

- 3.8 In addition, a submission from the Newhall and Stanton Parish Council Campaign Group has been received; a copy of which was enclosed with the Summons and is attached as **Appendix 6**.
- 3.9 In accordance with the Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act 2007, the Council is responsible for undertaking any review within its electoral area. All decisions will be made by Full Council prior to any Reorganisation of Community Governance Order being made.
- 3.10 In considering its final decision on the matter, Council has a number of options to consider, namely:
 - To take no action.
 - To agree to the creation of a Newhall and Stanton Parish Council.
 - To take other alternative action. See Communities and Local Government Guidance Notes paragraphs 140 to 146, attached as **Appendix 7**.

With regard to the first option, if taken, then no further action would be required other than to publicise this outcome, with reasons given, in the form of a Final Proposal.

If the second option were taken, with reasons given, then further determinations would be required as part of the Council's Final Proposals:

- Agree the boundaries of the parish council area.
- Confirm the name of the parish council.
- Confirm the 'style' of council, e.g. Parish Council.
- Determine when the change will take effect, e.g. from 1st April 2017.
- Determine the election timetable and the initial term of office.
- Determine any interim arrangements between 1st April and the first elections.
- Determine the number of parish councillors to be elected.
- Confirm the warding arrangements for the parish council.

The District Council would subsequently publish a Reorganisation Order.

3.11 A timetable detailing the actions required within the permitted twelve month period is contained within the Terms of Reference document.

4.0 Financial Implications

4.1 There are no direct financial implications from this report, but the two consultation exercises incurred administrative and postage costs for the Council.

5.0 <u>Corporate Implications</u>

5.1 There are none relating to this report.

6.0 <u>Community Implications</u>

6.1 The Review and subsequent recommendations will determine the local governance arrangements for the Newhall and Stanton ward.

The area of the following proposed Parish Council, in pursuance of the rights conferred upon us by the above act of Parliament, herby requests South Derbyshire District Council to undertake a Community Governance Review.

This is to constitute a Local Parish Council for the Ward of Newhall and Stanton. 

COMMUNITY GOVERNANCE REVIEW OF NEWHALL AND STANTON TERMS OF REFERENCE

Introduction

On 21st January 2016, South Derbyshire District Council ("the Council") approved these Terms of Reference created for the purposes of undertaking a Community Governance Review covering the unparished area of Newhall and Stanton.

A Community Governance Review ("the Review") is a legal process whereby the Council can review and make changes to local governance arrangements within the whole or part of its District.

These arrangements will be determined following consultation with local people and will aim to bring about improved community engagement, better local democracy and result in more effective and convenient delivery of local services.

Legislation and Guidance

In undertaking the Review and implementing any outcome, the Council will be guided by the following legislation and guidance:-

- Part 4 of the Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act 2007, as amended;
- The relevant parts of the Local Government Act 1972;
- The Local Government (Parishes and Parish Councils) (England) Regulations 2008;
- The Local Government Finance (New Parishes) (England) Regulations 2008; and
- The Guidance on Community Governance Reviews issued jointly by the Department for Communities and Local Government and the Local Government Boundary Commission for England (March 2010) ("the Guidance").

Aim of the Review

In carrying out the Review, the Council aims to ensure that decisions affecting community governance within the Newhall and Stanton area are reflective of the identities and interests of the community and are both effective and convenient.

Other important considerations are the impact on community cohesion, the size, population and boundaries of the area and what (if any) arrangements have already been made or could be made for the purposes of community representation or community engagement.

Who is undertaking the Review?

The Council is responsible for undertaking any review within its electoral area.

All interested persons and bodies have the opportunity to submit representations throughout the process for consideration by Full Council (a meeting of all 36 South Derbyshire District Councillors) before any decisions are made.

Why is the Council undertaking the Review?

The Review has been instigated following the submission of a valid petition from the Newhall and Stanton Parish Council Campaign Group requesting that a Parish Council be constituted for the area of Newhall and Stanton. As this area does not already exist as a parish, the petition is treated to also include a request for a parish to be constituted.

How will the Council undertake the Review?

Specifically, the Council will consider the following:-

- Whether or not a parish be constituted for the area under review and if so the name and style of the parish;
- Whether or not, as a result of the Review, the area of any existing neighbouring parish needs to be retained, merged, altered or abolished;
- Whether or not any parish should have a Parish Council or any alternative and, if so, determine the electoral arrangements, i.e, the ordinary year of election, the size, the number of Councillors to be elected, the division of the parish into wards and the parish boundaries;
- Whether or not any grouping provision should be made; and
- Whether or not any other local community governance arrangements should be made.

Why constitute a Parish?

The Council recognises that all communities have individual local issues and any decisions made will reflect those issues and be in the best interests of Newhall and Stanton.

Government guidance states that the advantage of constituting an area as a parish is that parishes reflect distinctive and recognisable communities of interest with their own sense of identity. It further states that this identity and community lends strength and legitimacy to the parish structure, creates a common interest in local affairs, encourages participation in elections, leads to representative and accountable government, engenders visionary leadership and generates a strong, inclusive community with a sense a civic values, responsibility and pride.

What does a Parish Council do?

Parish Councils are the most local form of government. They collect money from council tax payers (via the District Council) known as a 'precept' and this is used to invest in the area to improve services or facilities. Parish Councils can take different forms, but are usually made up of local people who stand for election as a Parish Councillor to represent their area. They can be the voice of the local community and work with other tiers of government and external organisations to co-ordinate and deliver services and work to improve the quality of life in the area.

Alternative styles

Parishes may have alternative styles to 'Parish'. The alternative styles are 'community', 'neighbourhood' or 'village'. In addition, it should be noted that the style 'town' is still available to a parish. However, for as long as the parish has an 'alternative style', it will not also be able to have the status of a 'town' and vice versa. The use in these terms of reference to parish does not preclude one of the alternative styles being adopted.

This will allow the Council a degree of flexibility in the interests of ensuring that it manages the review process efficiently. Consultation

The Council has a duty under the Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act 2007 to consult with the local government electors in the area under review and any other interested person or body. Throughout the process all representations will be taken into account before decisions are made.

The Council will:-

- Publish a release in the local press informing residents of the Review and inviting responses;
- Publish information on the Council's website;
- Consult with the residents of the Newhall and Stanton area;
- Consult with the South Derbyshire District Councillors for the Newhall and Stanton area and the neighbouring areas;
- Consult with the Derbyshire County Councillors for the Newhall and Stanton area and the neighbouring areas;
- Consult with the Member of Parliament for the District;
- Consult with Derbyshire County Council;
- Consult with any neighbouring Parish Councils and community representative groups; and
- Consult with any other person or body which appears to the District Council to have an interest in the Review.

The initial consultation period will end on 13th March 2016. Any representations must be received by that date or they may not be considered when the options are prepared for Full Council.

There will then be a further period of time for people to comment on the draft decision before the final decision is made.

The Council recognises that the development of strong, sustainable communities depends on residents' active participation in decision making and making a positive contribution to improving the place where they live. The Council is therefore committed to engaging effectively with the communities it serves and to enabling local people to participate meaningfully in decisions that affect their lives, where all people feel able to take an active part in influencing service delivery.

The Council welcomes all representations from any persons or bodies with a local interest who may wish to comment or make proposals on any aspect of the matters under review.

COMMUNITY GOVERNANCE REVIEW OF NEWHALL AND STANTON

DRAFT PROPOSALS

A Parish Council is established for the Newhall and Stanton area of the District.

Parish Council's play an important role in terms of community empowerment at the local level and 80% of respondents to the initial consultation indicated that they supported the establishment of a parish council in the area.

Parish councils are set apart from other forms of community governance as they are a democratically elected tier of local government with directly elected representatives, independent of other council tiers and budgets, and possess specific powers for which they are democratically accountable.

The Council has no evidence to suggest that the establishment of a parish council would be detrimental to a cohesive community in which people of different backgrounds get on well together and share a sense of place.

The area of the proposed parish be as per the boundaries shown on the attached plan which accords with the boundaries of the Newhall and Stanton Polling District.

The boundaries accord with those of the polling district of Newhall and Stanton and are therefore considered to be appropriate and easily identifiable.

The Parish Council be named 'Newhall and Stanton Parish Council'.

The Government encourages avoidance of composite names other than in exceptional circumstances where the demands of history, local connections or the preservation of local ties make a pressing case for the retention of distinctive traditional names. However, the Council feels that the name of the parish council should take into account the distinctive areas well known as Newhall and Stanton and the use of just one of those would not accurately reflect the entire proposed area of the parish council.

The Parish Council should use the 'style' of 'Parish' Council, as opposed to the alternative styles of 'Village', 'Neighbourhood' or 'Community' Council.

Page 60 of 236

Existing Parish Councils in the District use the 'style' of 'parish council'. The alternative styles of 'village', 'neighbourhood' or 'community' council were introduced in the Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act 2007 and are therefore relatively new. It is felt that using one of these alternative styles in the establishment of a new parish council at this time would potentially lead to confusion of the status of the new council, which should be avoided.

None of the respondents to the initial consultation suggested an alternative style, but in any event, the 'style' of the parish council could easily be changed by any parish council established in the future, if they felt it necessary.

Subject to the establishment of a Parish Council taking effect from 1st April 2017 and the first elections being held in May 2017, the first terms of office of elected Parish Councillors be for the term of two years with the next elections being held in May 2019 and every four years thereafter.

The Council proposes to reduce the initial terms of office of councillors of a new parish council in order that subsequent elections would take place at the same time as that of other such council's in the District.


The number of Parish Councillors to be elected to the Parish Council be set in the range 9 to 16.

The average number of councillors on each parish council within the District is nine.

The Council has noted that the number of parish councillors for each parish council shall not be less than five. The Council does not feel that the number of parish councillors should be more than 10 as it is important that the parish council does not have regular vacancies and in the interests of democracy, elections are contested.

The Parish Council should not be split into separate wards.

The Council does not consider that the size of the proposed parish council necessitates splitting the parish into wards or that the single election of councillors for the parish council would be impracticable or inconvenient. Nor does the Council consider that any areas of the parish council should be separately represented on the Council.

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However she could not say at this stage if any associated costs would be recharged... back to the newly formed Parish Council at a later date. The Clerk explained that it was all too early in the process for her to be able to answer the questions.

The Clerk was asked if new Councillors would require training and who would deliver the training. The Clerk advised that in the first instance the Parish Council should subscribe to The Derbyshire Association of Local Councils. They are an organisation that advise Parish Councils through there Clerk on law and legislation, they help with any issues or problems encountered and they also deliver all Councillor and Clerk training as required.

The Clerk was asked who the Clerk for the new Parish Council would be. The Clerk replied that she thought SDDC would initially interview for this position and they would decide on a Clerk. However as she had not been in this position before she could not really answer this question. She explained that we would know more about the process in due course from SDDC.

The Clerk reported that all equipment purchased for the group for example the laptop, printer etc, would be passed over to the Parish Council. The Clerk had already set the computer up and had already added all the required draft documents for example the Standing Orders, Financial Regs etc. that a Parish Council would be required to adopt at their first meeting.

B Walton said that what upset him was that Newhall was shown as the 32nd most deprived area in the country. He asked, what SDDC were doing about this. People read to help themselves up to a point. It was reported that our 3 local Ward Members did not support our campaign and did but not listen to what residents want or need. id beneficts not listen to what residents want or need. what evidence ? here

The Chair gave the committee the following information from a Needs Assessment (b' Report that was completed by Dr Penny Mell. This report was accurate as of January 2000 as follows:

Newhall so to speak grew out of Coal Mining and Clay, its people were very friendly and helpful. Things started to decline in the late seventies. Then the pits closed, causing poverty, people's lives dramatically changed. There was mass unemployment, 14 shops closed and got boarded up. Miners had been in the pits like their fathers before them, since they were 15 years of age, most had no other skills, a basic Secondary Modern Education, and their ambition had been to work in the pits like their fathers before them. What could they do without skills to seek other employment in an age of technology. There was long term unemployment, which lead to stress and ill health. Not belonging brought on a feeling of despair. Low income lead to poor diet, lack of exercise and obesity which all resulted in apathy. At that time 18% of people in Newhall lived on or below the bread line. 9.9% were benefit dependent. Crime increased, drug abuse, vandalism, burglary and car theft. At that time people were afraid and confused. At that time the William Allitt School produced results that were on par with the National

5. Minute Number 51/15 - Outcome of the Open Day

The Chair gave her report as follows:

- The Chair thanked all the committee members and the Clerk for attending the Open Day and for playing their part.
- She reported that the Open Day went really well and a marvelous day was had by all.
- She reported that out of all the residents that had attended the Open Day only 2 refrained from signing the petition.
- She thanked the 2 committee members that spent the day serving drinks and refreshments.
- She was very pleased by the amount of residents that attended the Open Day and thanked everyone who had and was supporting our campaign.
- She explained that the group should hold a further Open day along with starting to door knock for signatures.
- She reported that a lot of residents were unaware of the Open Day as they did not receive the mailshot advertising the event.

The Clerk reported that this matter had been reported as a complaint to Royal Mail and an investigation had taken place, however Royal Mail were insistent that they did deliver all of the mailshots to the whole village. The Clerk reported that this could not be the case as some residents received 2 mailshots and some received nothing at all.

The Clerk was asked how people could become Parish Councillors. The Clerk replied that when we manage to achieve signatures of 10% or more of the electorate, the petition will be forwarded to South Derbyshire District Council where it will trigger a Governance Review. Depending on the outcome of this review a referendum may need to be held. If a referendum is held (although this may not be required by South Derbyshire District Council) and the majority of the votes are in favour of the formation of a Newhall & Stanton Parish Council, a Clerk will be appointed by South Derbyshire District Council and elections will then take place for Parish Councillors to represent the Village, again this will be completed by South Derbyshire District Council. However the Campaign Group will continue with their campaign right through to the Parish Council elections to keep the momentum going.

A member of the committee explained that he had made his thoughts clear at the last Trustees Meeting for The Old Post Centre in relation to the notice that they had put around the building in relation to the Campaign Group.

Committee Members gave their report as follows:

• J Appleby had obtained 63 signatures by <u>showing residents the original leaflet</u> and <u>explaining what formed Parish Councils obtain by the way of the Parish</u> <u>Precept.</u> He explained that having a leaflet was not critical to obtaining signatures as most people were happy to sign the petition once they realised that Newhall and Stanton was <u>only 1 of 4 areas that did not have a Parish Council</u> and did not

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Parish Councils are often referred to as a Local Council, which is a type of Local Authority. Like The District and County Council, a Parish Council is involved in providing and delivering services and facilities for the benefit of its own local residents. A Parish Council has the same statutory powers as a Town Council, Community Council or Village Council, which it may choose to exercise.

The Government is encouraging Parish Councils along with Town Councils, Village Councils and Community Councils to play a greater part in providing services and supporting their own communities.

Many Parish Councils get involved in a wide range of activities and services to make their local area and community a better place to live. A Parish Council is also a key partner in assessing the needs of its own community and providing the services to meet those needs.

South Derbyshire District Council and Derbyshire County Council would have a statutory obligation to meet and consult with a Newhall & Stanton Parish Council if successful, giving residents a direct say in how their Council Taxes are spent. Residents living in areas with no Parish Council, Town Council, Community Council or Village Council have less say about what happens within their own community the District or the County.

SO HOW WOULD HAVING A NEWHALL & STANTON PARISH COUNCIL BENEFIT OUR COMMUNITY? When a Newhall & Stanton Parish Council is established:

- It would be independent of the District and County Council and it will be able to makes its own choices and decisions on how a proportion of the council tax is spent for the benefit and good of its own community being Newhall & Stanton.
- It would prevent Newhall & Stanton from being swallowed up by Swadlincote to only get the crumbs and bad press.
- It will Keep Newhall & Stanton's own identity and status as a Parish in its own right with a sense of togetherness.
- It could give grants to local charities and organisations for example the Scout & Guides or the Old Post for things like: Village Fetes, Firework Displays or Music Festivals.
- A Parish Council for Newhall & Stanton would give the lost voice back to the community of Newhall & Stanton where it matters.
- It could draw up a Parish Plan and Neighbourhood Plan.
- It could employ a Lengthsman (litter picker) to keep our village clean and tidy.
- It could maintain our local definitive footpaths by strimming and mowing where required, sign posting and waymarking as needed.
- It could help to set up and support local youth projects.
- It could install defibrillators for use by the community if required for example at the Old Post Centre or Village Hall.

- It could help make Newhall & Stanton a better place to live and more attractive by providing and installing for example, planters, hanging baskets, more litter bins, dog bins and for safety during the cold weather grit bins.
- It could be involved with Crime Reduction and Traffic Calming Measures for the Parish.
- It could maintain public open space like the local park to a better standard.
- It could obtain funding and grants for new play equipment and sports facilities.
- And much more. Your ideas would be very welcome.

HOW WILL A NEWHALL AND STANTON PARISH COUNCIL BE FUNDED AND WHAT WILL IT COST ME AS A RESIDENT?

The Newhall & Stanton Parish Council Campaign Group has been given financial support of £10,000.00 funding by the National Association of Local Councils (NALC) from the New Council Programme 2014/2015.

We also have the full support and backing of the Derbyshire Association of Local Councils (DALC)

The Newhall & Stanton Parish Council Campaign Group has been formed so that we can talk to local residents about if they would like a Newhall & Stanton Parish Council and what would you as a resident like the Parish Council to do for you.

A Parish Council has to budget for the expenses it will incur each year. One source of income is from the Precept levied on residents in its area, which is collected through the Council Tax.

Grants and funding from the District Council and other sources may also be received for certain projects depending on what the Parish Council wants to achieve.

There will be an extra cost to residents of Newhall & Stanton but this is estimated to be less than the cost of a bar of chocolate per week. Costs for the proposed precept are still being looked at and more information on the actual cost will be available soon.

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

STEP 1

The Newhall & Stanton Parish Council Campaign Group will be holding a number of Public Meetings and Public Open days over the coming months Starting in January 2015.

Disclaime

Newhall & Stanton Parish Council Campaign Group is a group that has been set up to champion a campaign with a view to creating a local Newhall & Stanton Parish Council within South Derbyshire. Newhall & Stanton Parish Council Campaign Group is NOT connected to any Political Group, Party or Individual. As a group we are free from influence, persuasion, bias, control or determination from any Political Group, Party or Individual. represent local communities in a way that other bodies, however worthy, cannot since such organisations do not have representatives directly elected to those bodies.

- **138.** The 2006 white paper recommended that local communities should be able to take more responsibilities for local issues affecting their area. Key to this approach is community empowerment, and the ability of various existing organisations themselves to see through specific projects to tackle local issues. Structures such as local residents' associations, community or neighbourhood forums and area committees have an important role to play in local community governance.
- **139.** At the neighbourhood level, there are various initiatives in existence, which through being representative and accountable can effectively empower local people. They have varying degrees of power and influence, and commensurate levels of transparency and accountability.

Area committees

140. Area committees are part of the structure of some principal councils (e.g. district, unitary and London borough), where they choose to have them. Area committees are a key initiative for enabling local government to fulfil community governance roles and also to deliver government policy on issues affecting social inclusion in local communities. Principal councils also provide resources for area committees, and their councillors are commonly integral to their constitution. Area committees can cover large areas and exist to advise or make decisions on specific responsibilities that can include parks, off-street parking, public toilets, street cleaning, abandoned vehicles and planning applications amongst others. Also, more widely, they contribute to shaping council services and improving local service provision.

Neighbourhood management

141. Neighbourhood management programmes are similarly set up by principal councils and may be led by one of a number of bodies. The expansion of neighbourhood management was promoted in the 2006 White Paper as a tool to enable local authorities to deliver more responsive services through their empowerment of citizens and communities. Their purpose is to create the opportunity for residents to work with local agencies, usually facilitated by a neighbourhood manager, to improve services at the neighbourhood level. 142. Neighbourhood management arrangements aim to improve 'quality of life' through implementation of (rather than advising or making decisions on) better management of local environment, increasing community safety, improving housing stock, working with young people, and encouraging employment opportunities, supported strategically by relevant stakeholders and Local Strategic Partnerships. They tend to cover smaller populations than area committees. The 2006 white paper recommends that take up of neighbourhood management should be encouraged and that Government should work with local authorities pioneering the approach, to raise the profile of achievements and promote adoption elsewhere.

Tenant management organisations

143. The 2006 white paper makes a series of proposals that facilitate the empowerment of residents through tenant management organisations (TMOs). Tenant management organisations are established by the local housing authority; they usually function on urban housing estates and can take responsibility for housing services (such as collecting rents and service charges and organising repairs and maintenance) from the local housing authority under the Housing (Right to Manage) (England) Regulations 2008. The 2006 white paper promoted the role of TMOs and recommended simplifying and extending their scope; enabling them to take on additional services and undertake further representation of residents within neighbourhoods. A TMO is an independent legal body and usually elects a tenant-led management committee to the organisation; they can also enter into a legal management agreement with landlords.

Area/community forums

144. Area or community forums (including civic forums) can be set up by the principal council, or created by local residents to act as a mechanism to give communities a say on principal council matters or local issues. Sometimes forums are set up to comment on a specific project or initiative that will impact upon the local area, and so may be time-limited. They increase participation and consultation, aiming to influence decision making, rather than having powers to implement services. They vary in size, purpose and impact, but membership usually consists of people working or living in a specific area. Some forums also include ward councillors, and representatives from the council and relevant stakeholders can attend meetings.

Residents' and tenants' associations

145. Residents' and tenants' associations enable local people to participate in local issues affecting their neighbourhood or housing estate, including the upkeep of the local environment, crime, sometimes dealing with anti-social behaviour matters, or on some estates, housing management. They can be set up by any group of people living in the same area and can choose who members will be; how they will be represented and what they want to achieve. In the case of tenants' and residents' associations on estates, they may be established with direct support from the principal council, as a mechanism for communicating with the tenants and residents on its estates. To engage effectively with other organisations, residents' and tenants' associations must be able to show that they are accountable and represent the views of the whole community, rather than narrow self interests of just a few local people.

Community associations

146. Community associations offer a particular and widespread democratic model for local residents and local community-based organisations in a defined neighbourhood to work together for the benefit of that neighbourhood. They can use a model constitution registered with the Charity Commission. The principal council may also be represented on the association's committee. They usually manage a community centre as a base for their activities. Membership is open to everyone resident in the area.

The Vice-Chairman addressed the Committee as local Ward Member for Etwall, summarising the planning history to date and accepting that it was a finely balanced matter, also referring to the height of the development, its bulky nature and the potential impact on the amenity of the neighbours.

Councillor Dr Pearson expressed sympathy for the neighbours, but queried what grounds there could be for refusal. Councillor Watson concluded that it was a difficult position, that existing buildings already obscured the view of neighbours and that the applicant had addressed the issues raised by the Inspector on appeal. Councillor Harrison queried ecological concerns, given the single brick construction of existing buildings. The Principal Area Planning Officer confirmed that building regulations would apply in this instance, also stating that the property was being dug in to lower its overall height and that rooflights would be above normal eyesight levels.

Mr Edward Thompson (objector) and Mr Boudewijn Tuinenburg (applicant) attended the Meeting and addressed Members on this application.

The Planning Services Manager referred to the Village Design Statement, as raised by Mr Thompson, stating that whilst the Statement was useful, it did not constitute supplementary planning guidance. He stated that the existing house is complimentary, but that many modern extensions already existed in its immediate environment, that the Committee could embrace this modern building in a largely screened, non-prominent location. The Planning Services Manager added that it was a judgement call as to whether planning decisions re-inforced a perception of only always accepting an historic style, as opposed to taking on modern interpretations in the right places.

Councillor Stanton addressed the Committee as local Ward Member for Repton, expressing concerns on behalf of residents and the Parish Council, referring to the conservation area provisions for the area and the acceptable nature of the current dwelling, it being a matter of taste between old and new.

Councillor Ford stated that he had been at the Repton Parish Council meeting when this application had been discussed and that opposition was not unanimous amongst Parish Councillors. The Councillor expressed his support for this challenging proposal.

The Vice-Chairman referred to this as a matter of judgement and taste, querying the purpose of the Village Design Statement. The Planning Services Manager confirmed that Statement was published by the village, not the District Council and not adopted for use in determining applications. He added that in terms of conservation, it does not mean that all buildings have to be retained or added to in same style, that it was acceptable to move conservation on sensitively in the context of the area.

Councillor Southerd expressed his support for advancement, if conducted sensitively, for the removal of buildings of lesser quality in favour of an ultramodern property in a screened location. Councillor Mrs Hall added her support for the proposal, believing that it will positively enhance Repton.

It was reported that members of the Committee had visited the site earlier in the day.

Mrs Anne Heathcote (objector) and Mr Matt King (applicant's agent) attended the Meeting and addressed Members on this application.

Councillor Watson addressed the Committee as local Ward Member for Aston on Trent, expressing his view that the proposed alterations and extension were unsympathetic, not in character and not compatible with the existing building in either appearance or materials, in summary an attempt to marry old with new that was not acceptable in this instance.

Councillor Ford expressed his view that alternative architecture can preserve and enhance older, small buildings with modern materials and appearance, the proposed expansion allowing occupation on a greater scale.

The Planning Services Manager confirmed that the original plans, involving like materials, had been turned away on professional advice in favour of a more modern extension which, it was felt, did not detract from the original building.

Councillor Shepherd made reference to the local street-scene, accepting that since the premises had become residential, plans for its extension were inevitable, but that the materials, appearance and contrast outlined in the proposals were not acceptable.

The Planning Services Manager stated that as many heritage aspects in planning were difficult issues for the Inspector, a refusal may be supported, although if the Committee were minded to refuse the application, it would be difficult to advise the applicant on a different approach.

Other Members queried the advice of the former conservation officer and the weight given to it, the prominence of the building within the village and the potential visual impact of the proposed extension, the materials and whether a pre-hearing could be arranged to discuss materials. The Planning Services Manager responded to the points raised and, in relation to the last point, emphasised that a pre-hearing would not be possible as it could be deemed as pre-determination of the matter.

Councillor Watson proposed that the application be refused, but this was not supported by the Committee. Councillor Ford proposed that the matter be deferred, enabling further negotiations on design.

Councillor Mrs Coe addressed the Committee as local Ward Member for Woodville, commenting on concerns voiced at parish council and residents association meetings, also noting the proposed site's location outside the village boundary and the provisions of the Local Plan, its character and the level of local development.

Councillor Taylor addressed the Committee as another local Ward Member for Woodville, referred to the previous decision to grant permission and that it was reasonable to maintain that decision, given the expenses incurred by the developer, also stating that the proposals fitted with the village.

Councillor Harrison, whilst noting that the proposals were no longer policy compliant, post Local Plan Part One adoption, queried if any precedent would be made if permission was granted. This theme was supported by Councillor Ford who did not wish to see the Plan undermined in any way, also stating that the Local Plan Part Two may not extend the village boundaries sufficiently to accommodate this area. The Principal Area Planning Officer stated that each application was considered on its own merit, so this decision could not be generally held to set any precedent, but that another option would be to consider this as an exception site, as it met those criteria. Councillor Dr Pearson queried the number of other similar cases that this decision might influence, to which the Planning Services Manager confirmed that this case was the only one.

Councillor Mrs Farrington addressed the Committee as the other local Ward Member for Woodville, emphasising the need for housing in the area, albeit she would have preferred to see some bungalow provision.

The Vice-Chairman suggested, as the proposal was not policy compliant, that the application be deferred for it to be resubmitted as an exception site, seconded by Councillor Ford. The Planning Services Manager emphasised that despite any sympathy for the developer regarding the delays, the Local Plan Part One was now in place in law and any decision needed to be made in accordance with policy.

Councillor Richards expressed his view that, as matters had been delayed by issues beyond the developer's control, the previous decision should be honoured.

The Vice-Chairman stated that the Committee had a duty to comply with policy and proposed that a revised application be sought as an exception site. This proposal was not supported by Committee.

Councillor Taylor addressed the Committee as local Ward Member for Woodville, querying noise, sustainability and drainage issues at the site, matters responded to by the Area Planning Officer. Councillor Taylor went on to cite the increased development in the area and its impact on the roads and local infrastructure; the history of the site, the site's industrial nature, the future of the Bretby Art Pottery building, the potential impact on local businesses and future residents, as well as social housing issues. Councillor Mrs Farrington addressed the Committee as another local Ward Member for Woodville, querying the Highways Authority's failure to raise any objections and her view that the developer should still be obliged to make a Section 106 contribution.

Councillor Watson welcomed the opportunity to regenerate a dormant site, particularly with affordable homes, speculating that the industrial units currently surrounding the site may not necessarily remain commercial. He agreed that the access was not ideal, but that this applied to all current householders in the vicinity. Equally, whilst the noise issues were noted, the housing market evidenced the fact that house buyers would accept this and still purchase properties in such environments. The Councillor did however query the refuse bin storage provision. The Area Planning Officer confirmed that the plans had been amended to accommodate bin access from the rear of the properties.

Councillor Harrison noted that the report referred to the access road being private, querying its adoption status and concerns over approving an unadopted road. The Area Planning Officer confirmed that the road would not be adopted, but that it be capable of supporting refuse vehicles accessing the site, that it would remain the responsibility of the housing association, not the individual property occupiers. Councillor Richards also queried the maintenance of street lighting, to which the Principal Area Planning Officer stated that the long-term road / lighting maintenance could be made subject to condition.

Councillor Richards felt the noise at the site was unacceptable and was unable to support social housing allocation to this location. The Vice-Chairman commented that the scheme had much to recommend it and although it vastly improved on the current condition of the site, noise levels were a concern. It was noted that properties on the opposite side of the road were much closer to the road, but the Vice-Chairman queried the future maintenance of the proposed acoustic fencing. The Area Planning Officer stated that Condition 22 dealt with this matter, but that it could be further enhanced. Councillor Ford queried whether an enhanced planting scheme could be applied to the front of the development to assist with the noise issues; the Area Planning Officer confirming that there was some scope for landscaping.

Councillor Dr Pearson raised his concerns regarding the ground contamination issues at the site, emphasising that the proposed capping scheme may not be sufficient. The Principal Area Planning Officer referred to the relevant Condition and confirmed that the proposed scheme was compliant with requirements. Councillor Mrs Farrington expressed her belief that, given the previous use of the site, future health issues may be anticipated.

Councillor Taylor referred to the potential impact on businesses, in terms of their noise generation and its effect on the residential development. The Principal Area Planning Officer referred to expert opinion that stated the noise levels were deemed acceptable. A vote was taken, but the officer's recommendation was not supported. However, no grounds could be determined.

The Planning Services Manager reminded the Committee of the requirement to provide grounds for refusal, that these had to be reasonable and that they may be subject to challenge and cost applications. The available grounds were read from the Planning Policy document and whilst grounds could be cited, there was no evidence to support them at this time.

Members also raised issues regarding land contamination and the conflict relating to the 2006 noise report as determined at appeal,

Councillor Richards questioned the right to quiet enjoyment and the Planning Services Manager confirmed that another noise report could be commissioned, at a cost, to provide a further objective assessment.

A vote was taken on the proposal to defer the application.

RESOLVED:-

That the application be deferred pending the execution of a further noise report.

Councillor Richards questioned whether alternative squash courts could be made available since the conversion of Grove Hall squash courts into the Apex Climbing Centre. The Director of Community and Planning Services commented on the low levels of use of squash courts but reassured Members that if climbing lacks popularity then it is possible to convert back to squash courts.

Councillor Wheeler outlined his view that whilst the matter was more complex than initially thought, he had some sympathy with leaseholders seemingly having to pay more for insurance and suggested deferral of the matter to gain further information and consider other options. Councillor Rhind supported the deferral proposal, but highlighted the fact that the leaseholders enter into the leasehold agreements aware of the insurance position, wary of any other costs that may result from changes in the lease documentation.

Councillor Wilkins queried the insurance position in various scenarios, which the Chief Executive clarified. Councillor Mrs Coyle also supported the deferral proposal, citing a need to look at how the premiums can be reduced or justified. The Chief Executive explained that subject to certain actions being carried out, the Council can make charges in excess of the market norm. Councillor Richards queried the less expensive insurances in the context of communal areas, access routes, etc. Councillor Smith referenced the information on such matters provided by the Association of British Insurers, suggesting that this be considered as part of the further research.

Members deferred the matter to a future Committee for further investigation of the options available.

The Councillor also expressed some concern regarding criticism of the process. The Principal Area Planning Officer addressed the criticisms raised in the correspondence referred to.

Councillor Watson stated that given the time taken to implement the Local Plan, this did not constitute a suitable Part Two site and supported the recommendation. Councillor Southerd expressed the view that whilst it was unfortunate for the developers on this occasion, the policy guidance was clear and should be adhered to, also supporting the recommendation.

That planning permission be refused as set out in the report of the Director of Community & Planning Services.

PL/58 OUTLINE APPLICATION (ALL MATTERS EXCEPT FOR ACCESS TO BE RESERVED) FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF UP TO 72 DWELLINGS TOGETHER WITH ASSOCIATED ACCESS, OPEN SPACE, LANDSCAPING, INFRASTRUCTURE AND FACILITATING WORKS INCLUDING DEMOLITION ON LAND AT SK3119 0360, SK3019 9268 AND 61 COURT STREET, WOODVILLE, SWADLINCOTE

It was reported that members of the Committee had visited the site earlier in the day.

The Principal Area Planning Officer confirmed the final dwellings number as 72 and as a result, the revised Section 106 figures and conditions.

Mr Graham Fergus (applicant's agent) attended the Meeting and addressed Members on this application.

Councillor Tilley addressed the Committee as local Ward Member for Swadlincote, raising concerns relating to access, not only during the construction period, but also afterwards. The Councillor also made reference to the long awaited Regeneration Route, commenting that its construction was no nearer. Councillor Coe, another Ward Member for Swadlincote, expressed his view that the additional traffic generated by the site could be manageable. Councillor Mrs Farrington, Ward Member for Woodville, stated that work on the Regeneration Route had been pending for too long, that traffic in the area was already congested for long periods each day. The Planning Services Manager confirmed that whilst work on the Regeneration Route was ongoing at the County Council, it could not be confirmed when matters would progress in terms of commencement.

Councillor Taylor, another Ward Member for Woodville, also addressed the Committee, outlining his concerns regarding access, congestion, the impact on the community, the topography of the site, school places, parking restrictions and the continuing delays with the Regeneration Route. Councillor Wheeler relayed his knowledge of where the Regeneration Route project, in that the land assembly had been completed, that an application was pending and that, in terms of funding, it was currently third on the list of Nottinghamshire / Derbyshire projects.

Councillor Southerd also referred to traffic issues, especially around the Clock Island, but also raised the issue of the apparent under-utilisation of the open space at the site and access to the site as a whole.

The Planning Services Manager, having quoted from the County Council report, which conceded that whilst there were congestion issues in the area, they would be mitigated by the proposed Regeneration Route, queried what might happen if, applications having been approved, the Route was not then built. The Planning Services Manager proposed that clarification be sought from the County Council.

Councillor Dr Pearson queried the position relating to the Local Plan five year supply, as the site did not feature in either Part One or the draft Part Two. Councillor Watson felt the application made good use of an empty, wasted site to benefit the housing supply, that the slope was manageable, that more could be achieved with the open space via funding, but noted that the choice of trees on the adjacent forestry plot avoid overly tall trees in order to avoid excessive shading. The Principal Area Planning Officer stated that the scheme was in line with the Development Plan, that it constituted a windfall site within existing settlement confines, important for managing housing supply.

Councillor Murray raised concerns regarding pollution in the area, especially the fumes resulting from the congestion, the potential for health issues and that the local health and education provision was already at capacity. In light of the views expressed, the Planning Services Manager suggested that the application be deferred on the grounds of formally establishing the Derbyshire County Council Highways position.

RESOLVED:-

That the application be deferred pending receipt of further information from the Highway Authority, in terms of the fall-back position in the event that the Regeneration Route becomes subject to serious delay.

The Planning Services Manager also added that the Council were also disappointed at the loss of land for employment use, but that, given the unsuccessful attempts to sell the land over many years, this intended usage cannot be sought indefinitely. Councillor Watson viewed this as an opportunity to make use of a brown field site via a responsible developer. Councillor Mrs Farrington queried whether more funding could be directed towards health provision, but the Principal Area Planning Officer stated that no further funding was available for health care that would ensure compliance with the CIL Regulations 2010.

The Director of Finance and Corporate Services presented the report and summarised the responses to the consultation that Councillor Billings had coordinated with Members. The Director summarised that the iPads, primarily set up to read Committee papers, were being used by Members mainly for this function. Over the last three years, Members had suggested optimising iPad usage by incorporating the ability to access Microsoft Outlook, specifically, email and calendar as well as synchronising mobile devices with network desktops to avoid duplication of work. Since this report had been published, the Director had liaised with the IT department and was advised that in order to facilitate the enhancement requests made by Members, there would be additional costs incurred.

A discussion ensued regarding the cost and longevity of upgrading the current iPads with additional software and whether replacement would be more cost effective and futureproof. Members suggested investigating alternative mobile devices in order to incorporate the improvements recommended in the consultation.

Councillor Mrs Patten commended the reliability of the tablet supplied by Derbyshire County Council and offered to provide the Director of Finance and Corporate Services with the model specification.

Councillor Bambrick questioned whether Labour Group members had been consulted during this process. Councillor Billings confirmed he had liaised initially with Councillor Dr Pearson who had advised that Councillor Tilley was the Information Technology (IT) Champion for the Labour Group. Councillor Dr Pearson advised that the Group's responses would likely have been similar to those mentioned already.

The Director of Finance and Corporate Services confirmed that the IT replacement budget could fund new iPads, but these costs would need to be reviewed alongside assessment of purchasing mobile devices that are futureproof. The Director advised that in order for Members to make a more informed decision, an update of costs and alternative mobile devices would be provided at a future Committee.

Members considered the feedback from the consultation on current iPad provision and reviewed the suggested areas for improvement.

OS/15 DERBYSHIRE COMMUNITY HEALTH PROVISION – Verbal Presentation

Mark Roberts, General Manager of Derbyshire Community Health Services presented an overview of the Community Nursing Service in the Swadlincote and surrounding area to Members. Members were informed that the Community Nursing teams in Swadlincote are located at Swadlincote Health Centre with three District Nurses (DN) leading three sub-teams of Community Staff Nurses and Health Care Assistants that cover two surgeries each.

It was outlined that the Community Nursing provision runs until 6.15pm daily and that outside of these hours, an evening and night service is provided by Derbyshire Health United. Detailed information was provided on the numbers of nurses providing health care during the week and weekends and the additional support provided by South Derbyshire Single Point of Access (SPA) team for crisis intervention and End of Life (EoL) care was also noted. Members were informed that the SPA service works closely with District Nurses and liaises with East Midlands Ambulance Service in order to facilitate care.

A discussion concerning the continuity and level of care in the home followed where Members provided examples of specific incidents. Mark explained that details of any complaint should be sent to the Patient Advice and Liaison Service (PALS) and each case would be investigated.

Councillor Dunn raised concern regarding the awards presented for EoL care, in that the wording seemed inappropriate. Members agreed that good work deserves recognition, but suggested the awards could be rephrased and given for excellent care, not EoL care.

Members discussed the recent talks to combine health and social care and the positive and negative implications of this. Members joined the Chairman in thanking Mark Roberts for the informative presentation.

EA/3 Chair's announcements

Councillor Mrs Lisa Brown presented statistics from the recent European Referendum in the first Area Forum to be held "post-Brexit". There had been an enormous turnout of 76.8%, the biggest in South Derbyshire's history and higher than the national average. A total of 22,479 people in South Derbyshire voted to remain in the EU, while 34,216 voted to leave,

roughly a 60-40% split. It had been an overwhelming vote for out in South Derbyshire. Councillor Mrs Brown said she was quite concerned regarding EU funding being spent in South Derbyshire on projects such as Digital Derbyshire. Substantial grants were received. While SDDC did not have any EU funding, DCC did. Measures would have to be sought to safeguard initiatives such as Digital Derbyshire.

Part One of the Local Plan had been adopted by SDDC dealing with major housing sites in the district. Part Two was currently being consulted upon.

EA/4 <u>To note the minutes of the meeting held on January 13th, 2016 (copy attached)</u>

The minutes of the previous meeting were agreed as a true record.

EA/5 **Report back on issues raised at the last meeting**

Mike Haynes (SDDC Director of Housing and Environmental Services) had been requested to attend the meeting to explain what could be recycled by the council. He reported that every resident received a calendar for collection specific for the area in which they lived. Posted with it was a leaflet stating what could be put in each of the council's bins. It was not possible to cover every single product that was made but what was possible to put in the bins. What could not go in the blue or brown bins went by default into the black bin. Any further questions could be answered by SDDC's Waste and Recycling Team. New residents in the district were sent information about the services and how to look after wheelie bins as well as the role of the Clean Team. In all, six sides of A4 paper was issued to new residents.

In South Derbyshire, there was no charge for composting bins. Black and brown bins were collected by SDDC, while the blue bin was collected by a council contractor (Ward's) before the waste was moved to recycling firm Palm Ltd on Teesside for recycling.

A resident said the leaflet provided had often been recycled by residents. He produced an example of the sheet he had produced for people in Etwall which showed what went where in the various bins. He said he felt the issue was one of communication. He asked why the rules had changed on black plastic trays, something he claimed other authorities went into detail on. He asked if it was to do with recycling machines which relied on light being unable to process it. Mr Haynes said the situation was confusing in the UK, with different authorities having different rules. Some used the private sector to recycle and some kept it in house. He explained that black plastic was a contaminating material at recycling plants. Some contractors removed it and some didn't. Palm, SDDC's contractor, did not recycle black plastic. This should have been publicised to residents, but Mr Haynes' predecessor did not do this.

Mr Haynes liked the poster produced by the resident and said he would take it back to his directorate to see what could be done with it. He agreed that the situation was confusing. South Derbyshire as a district did well to hit its targets. The bottom had fallen out of the plastic market due to the low cost of oil making it cheaper to make new plastic than recycle it. Councillor Mrs Brown asked if Brexit would make a difference to the market. Mr Haynes said that was unclear with discussions still to take place on withdrawal from the EU. Nothing would change in the next two years as the UK would still be a member.

A resident added that the whole discussion was about the symptom and that it would be better to fix the problem at source by using fewer black plastic items. He asked how pressure could be brought on the supermarkets. Mr Haynes replied that it was down to the individual to make consumer choices that would affect the supermarkets. For example, he bought loose oranges and not the ones sold in plastic netting. As a council, there was not a lot that SDDC could do. Councillor Mrs Julie Patten reported that she had written to South Derbyshire MP Heather Wheeler to take up the point with Government, which she had. Some lobbying of the supermarkets had taken place and Councillor Mrs Patten suggested writing to the MP to see what progress had been made.

A member of the public said that people were starting to reuse plastic bags but that it had resulted in the closure of plastic bag manufacturer in Preston, Lancashire. Mr Haynes replied that it was a sad result of a noble campaign.

Councillor Mrs Brown reported that SDDC had launched a food waste initiative. Mr Haynes added that the council had won the Sainsbury's £1m Waste Less Save More campaign.

Councillor Mrs Brown asked where the waste from brown bins went. Mr Haynes replied that it went to a county council location in Burton. SDDC's figures on composting were good thanks to the council not charging for brown bins.

A resident asked what could be done with Tetra packaging. Mr Haynes replied that they went in black bins.

A member of the public asked when his wheelie bin would be replaced as it had been delivered in 1999 with a lifespan of 10 years. Mr Haynes said he did not know why the bins had been given a 10-year lifespan. If one was damaged, it would be replaced, he said. However, the bins were holding up quite well and it tended to be the hinges that broke. There was no intention to replace the bins en bloc. A resident said there was no facility at the Egginton Lane tip to dispose of brown bin waste. Residents had to travel to Burton to dispose of their garden waste.

ACTION: Mike Haynes to find out where in the district residents can dispose of compost waste if they have more than will fit in their brown bin

Mr Haynes said that the council provided a service to move heavy bins for vulnerable people.

EA/6 **Public questions on issues raised by residents**

A member of the public reported that she and her husband had been unable to vote in the referendum and wanted to complain about the elections team at SDDC. They had informed the council two months prior to the referendum of their need for a postal ballot before June 7. Despite being clear on the date, their ballot paper arrived after they went away on holiday and they were unable to complete and return it. Councillor Mrs Brown apologised on behalf of the council.

ACTION: Tom Sloan to report residents' issue to Electoral Services

A resident asked about two outstanding planning applications. They claimed that Bloor Homes had started working on their site in Etwall before planning permission had been granted. He thanked Councillor Mrs Brown for voting against the development and said surely it was now an enforcement issue. Councillor Mrs Brown, the vice-chair of SDDC's Planning Committee, said it was still a live planning application and so she couldn't comment on it. However, there was a liaison group being set up and she hoped the developer would act in a neighbourly fashion. A resident said that Bloor Homes was delivering containers for site offices in Willington Road. Councillor David Muller said he hoped the liaison group would be set up fairly quickly. Enforcement officers had been out to the site three times, he added.

Councillor Sean Bambrick informed the meeting that Part One of the South Derbyshire Local Plan had been adopted. Part Two was now being consulted upon.

Thriving Communities

Rob Lowe, who worked in the Chief Executive's Policy Unit at DCC, introduced himself to the meeting and explained how the Thriving Communities programme aimed to provide more flexible work at a community level, and to narrow gaps between providers and the communities they served. It would last three years and Newhall had been the community selected in South Derbyshire for the programme. It would allow DCC to better understand how services impacted upon local people. Evidence would be gathered and time spent with local people to better understand the "lived experience" in Newhall. That would allow services to be better tailored to people's needs. Around 12 families would be involved in a Day in the Life, where researchers would spend a day seeing what they did, earning the family £100 in gift vouchers. Councillor John Wilkins asked that if gaps were found in district services would the information be passed on? Mr Lowe replied that the project was about improving the community.

NA/4 The minutes of the meeting held on February 3, 2016

The minutes were approved as a true and correct record. A member of the public queried whether under NA/27 the minutes should have read "SDDC would have to find savings of \pounds 1.5m a year <u>by</u> 2018-19" and not "<u>in</u> 2018-19". Kevin Stackhouse said <u>from</u> would have been a better description.

NA/5 Report back on issues raised at the last meeting

Rusty signs in St John's Drive and Tideswell Green

An additional report back from Jayne Arnold (SDDC Street Scene Officer) was added to that provided by Steve Sheppard (SDDC Street Scene Manager). She reported that the nameplates in the two locations were in a good, readable condition. However, the uprights were rusty so she had arranged for them to be sanded and painted. An uprooted nameplate in Tennyson Avenue had been reported so she investigated and found them to all be in good condition. A resident added that the street signs were periodically uprooted and were in a rusty state.

ACTION: Tom Sloan to report signs in Tennyson Avenue to the Street Scene team

NA/6 **Public questions on issues raised by residents**

A resident raised the issue of new homes built at the top of Wellwood Road, Midway, stating traffic levels and the amount of cars double parked in the area made it unacceptable. They asked if more spaces could be stipulated for a development? Councillor Bambrick replied that the application would have been dealt with under current planning regulations. A member of the public reported that on Sunday, July 3, the new memorial would open at Newhall Park. The event would be attended by South Derbyshire MP Heather Wheeler, district councillors and the Lord Lieutenant of Derbyshire. Wreathes would be laid to those who lost their lives from the area. The resident also reported that Newhall Skate Park was in full operation and had proven a success, providing a great example of a community coming together. Councillor Bambrick said officers involved should be thanked for the work they put in.

A resident asked where £2.3m of Derbyshire County Council money allocated to members' projects in deprived areas was going to go. Councillor Bambrick replied that he and his fellow members wanted ideas from the community, such as "Super Kitchens" and projects which would bring people together. Councillor Paul Dunn added that the money - £7,000 in his case - would go towards initiatives that would bring people together, especially those who were isolated. However, anything set up would have to become self-funding in time. That was why volunteers were being sought to help run the projects. A resident said they could not believe that in 2016 there were soup kitchens and food banks in operation. Another member of the public asked if people would stay away from such projects because of pride. A resident said there was an opportunity to show people how to cook properly rather than just get the cheapest items from the supermarket.

A resident reported that on the footpath at the corner of Bretby Road and Rose Tree Lane tactile tiles had been run over and damaged. Councillor Bambrick added that he believed delivery lorries were responsible for running over the kerb and damaging the path.

RA/3 Chairman's announcements

Councillor Michael Stanton announced that Part One of the South Derbyshire Local Plan had been adopted. Part Two, dealing with smaller developments, was now being consulted upon.

RA/4 The minutes of the meeting held on October 13, 2015

Councillor David Shepherd proposed the minutes and Councillor Mrs Linda Chilton seconded them.

RA/5 Report back on issues raised at the last meeting

Bretby Lane, Bretby – drainage issues (issue from forum on 13.10.15)

Paul Jameson (DCC Area Forum Liaison Officer) reported that positive noises were being made by Severn Trent Water and company could soon be in a position to disconnect their drain from DCC's sewer. He wished he had something more concrete to present to the area forum, but the ball was firmly in Severn Trent's court. A resident said they had seen one email from the company suggesting that the drainage on Moat Bank only served 10 properties. They hoped that DCC was pursuing the issue avidly.

Askew Grove, Repton – pothole reporting process

A resident had complained about a lack of pothole repairs at the location back in January. The AFLO had reported the situation to the pothole centre and remedial works had taken place. However, the same resident again asked about the repairs as the road was still in a poor state. Mr Jameson answered that the road had been identified for carriageway patching and was seeking confirmation whether funds to do this were available in the current financial year's programme.

Stenson Road, Stenson Fields – request for crossing

Residents and councillors had been calling for a crossing in the area, with DCC waiting for the nearby development to be finished before making a decision. Mr Jameson said the county council had always maintained the stance that it would look at the area again. A concern that vehicle numbers were only measured during the day and not at peak times had been passed on to the highways team.

Milton Road, Repton – street lighting

A suggestion for additional street lighting in Milton Road near to the new development had been suggested. Mr Jameson reported that the lighting had been installed.

Petition for lighting outside Bladon House School

DCC's Cabinet Member for Highways, Transport & Infrastructure was given a report and the petition on May 10, 2016. Councillor Mrs Chilton confirmed the petition had been rejected but added that the case could be reopened if further reasons could be put forward. She was personally very disappointed it had failed but hoped further information from a signatory could help in a new bid. Mr Jameson added that if a significant issue was brought forward that was not included the original petition, DCC would investigate further and respond appropriately.

ACTION: Paul Jameson to be copied into email from Councillor Mrs Linda Chilton containing new justification for lighting

Findern Parish Council: VAS query

A query had been raised with DCC regarding Findern Parish Council using funds to pay for a speed-activated sign (VAS) in the village. Mr Jameson reported that there had been no injury collisions in Heath Lane, where the sign was mooted, in the previous three years. Therefore, the area did not meet the criteria for a VAS. A resident asked that if the parish council was paying, surely they could have the sign? Mr Jameson said any signage on the highway had to be justified and DCC could not be seen to be operating a system of bias towards parish councils in affluent areas while poorer areas may not have been able to afford such signage. A member of the public said there was such a sign in Cockshut Lane, Melbourne. Mr Jameson confirmed it had been fitted before the current legislation was passed. He added that mobile VAS were believed to be more effective. Councillor Shepherd said that some of the places with VAS would not have had them now if the new 2012 criteria were applied.

RA/6 **Public questions on issues raised by residents**

A resident asked if advance minutes could be supplied for SDDC's annual Flood Liaison meeting. They said that minutes had only been given with the agenda for the next year's meeting.

ACTION: SDDC to produce Flood Liaison minutes more rapidly following the meeting

A member of the public complained about overgrown verges in Newton Lane and Bretby Lane. What had been a two-lane road was now akin to a tunnel and was getting dangerous. He feared that it could cause an accident. Councillor Stanton added that in his area it seemed that verges had grown excessively quickly. Mr Jameson said that two cuts a year were approved by DCC to ensure road safety. Mike Haynes (Director of Housing and Environmental Services) confirmed that SDDC was up to date with all of its cuts. Growing weather had been excellent with lots of sun and rain. There had been no frost in the winter to kill certain plants off, so this year's growth was a continuation of last year's. His team has worked hard to keep on top of the situation.

A resident suggested the bus service through the villages of Findern, Willington and Repton be altered to reflect changing times. He suggested the Villager service from Trent Barton terminate at the Royal Derby Hospital, from where there was a regular bus service into the centre of the city. This would save time and allow a more thorough service to the villages. He asked if someone at SDDC could suggest this. Mr Haynes said it was probably a DCC issue. Mr Jameson said that if the Villager was a fully commercially-run service then it was down to the operator. DCC had a Public Transport Unit which talked to operators and it might be able to highlight the issue.

ACTION: Paul Jameson to flag up possible Villager route change through Public Transport Unit

Councillor Andrew MacPherson raised the issue of the speed limit between Repton and Willington, where drivers "put their toe down". He said it would make sense to keep the limit to 30mph between the villages, and not the National Speed Limit, as it currently was. Mr Jameson replied that DCC had to meet criteria, with the limit respecting the location. They were based on the level of development in the area. It was stipulated that on the edge of a builtup area the limit should be 40mph while in more rural environments it should be 60mph or potentially 50mph if there were certain hazards, such as a series of sharp bends. Drivers generally drove to the conditions and if they saw a limit which was inappropriate they would not keep to it and that brought the limit into disrepute. It then gave the police an enforcement issue.

A resident reported that the Willington Power Station site had been sold by RWE Npower. The new owners had written to the people of the village to say they would meet them in due course to discuss their plans for the site. Councillor MacPherson said he had had a meeting with the new owners, who own two other power stations. They had bought the site with a view to securing overseas investment to build a gas-fired power station. A resident asked if there was anything to stop the new owners applying for a change of use. Mr Haynes replied that technically they could, but whether they would be granted permission was a different matter. Councillor Shepherd added that with Part One of SDDC's local plan adopted, he thought the district would be protected from such developments.

A member of the public said that in Newton Solney there was some common land at the bottom of Trent Lane with signs up which said overnight stays was not allowed. Newton Solney Parish Council had received a Freedom of Information request asking which bylaw precluded overnight stays and wondered how to answer. Mr Haynes recommended they refer it to SDDC Legal and Democratic Services Manager Ardip Kaur. A resident asked why the speed limit was 60mph between Stenson and Stenson Fields when it was 40mph between Melbourne and Stanton by Bridge.

ACTION: Paul Jameson to investigate why the speed limits were different

A member of the public theorised that the speed limit in Stenson village was unenforceable due to a lack of repeater signs. Mr Jameson refuted this and insisted the 30mph limit was entirely legal and enforceable. Repeater signs are permitted in rural 30mph speed limits where there is no street lighting.

RA/7 County Council issues

Councillor Shepherd reported that a meeting had taken place with the builder of the new development in Stenson Road. Assurances had been given that it would be completed by the end of the year. DCC had said it would look at criteria for a pedestrian crossing once the development was completed. Councillor Shepherd also looked to reinforce the campaign which had taken place to lower the speed limit now that properties fronted the road and street lighting was in place. Mr Jameson answered that the response from DCC would remain the same – the road met the criteria for a 40mph limit and a crossing would be considered when the development was completed.

RA/8 District Council issues

Councillor Shepherd said he had received complaints regarding footballs being kicked against an electrical substation in Eggesford Road, Stenson Fields. It was a problem for residents. A resident said that landscaping the area would be more effective a solution than putting up a 'no ball games' sign.

ACTION: Zoe Sewter (SDDC Open Space and Facility Development Manager) to be asked for a report on the playing fields

Councillor Gordon Rhind announced that Part One of the Local Plan had been adopted. Part Two was now under consultation.

SA/4 THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON FEBRUARY 2, 2016

The minutes were agreed as a true and correct record of the previous meeting.

SA/5 REPORT BACK ON ISSUES RAISED AT THE LAST MEETING

No Cycling signs

A resident had asked when 'no cycling' signs were taken down from Swadlincote High Street. Paul Jameson (Area Forum Liaison Officer) reported that the signs in place were legally enforceable. There were no signs specifically for cyclists, but there was a no entry sign which a cyclist should not pass. DCC was unsure what signs had existed in the area. The resident replied that there used to be signs at the west end of High Street, by Birds, outside Peacocks and near to the Santander Bank. Currently, he said, few if any cyclists dismounted at the no entry signs. Another member of the public added that far more concerning was motorised vehicles coming through the area. Councillor Gordon Rhind said the issue had recently been discussed at a DCC meeting. Mr Jameson added that only the police could enforce drivers going past no entry signs. He would flag the issue up with police himself.

Resurfacing of Moira Road, Woodville

Mr Jameson reported that surface dressing would be carried out in the 2016-17 capital programme. A resident replied that it had been done and asked if the yellow lines along the road could be replaced. Mr Jameson said they would be repainted. The resident also added that the surface of a footpath from Moira Road into Tunnel Close was in a poor state and needed repairing.

ACTION: Paul Jameson to provide a report into state of footpath at Tunnel Close

Pedestrian Activity at St George's Primary School (from November, 2015)

DCC had been asked to extend the guard rail outside the school two meetings previously. Mr Jameson reported that unfortunately the pavement was not wide enough to allow such work.

Flooding in Occupation Lane, Woodville

Mr Jameson confirmed that some drain improvements would take place. A letter had been sent to Leicestershire County Council urging them to carry out preventative work on their side of the border. The letter had been sent in May and a response was still awaited. A resident added that there had been 18in of water lying in the road a few days previously.

Noise monitoring at Woodville Road scrap yard

Stuart Batchelor (SDDC Director of Community and Planning Services) confirmed that the Environment Agency was the responsible authority for the Donald Ward site. SDDC's Environmental Health Manager was happy to carry out further noise testing if residents got in touch.

Moira Road recycling

A resident had asked if waste collections could be made away from school entry times. SDDC had confirmed that contractors had been asked to visit at an alternative time.

Scrap metal pile heights at Woodville Road scrap yard

The Environment Agency had been asked for clarity on how high scrap metal could be piled at the yard. A resident stated that only that day five workers at a scrap metal yard in Birmingham had been killed by falling debris. Mr Batchelor reiterated that it was an Environment Agency matter.

Broomy Farm Section 106 funding

Mr Batchelor confirmed that the funding was for community use and could not just be spent in a specific area. The money had been split into two separate projects. A resident asked how enforceable the Section 106 funding was. Mr Batchelor replied that it was a legal agreement to pay after the sale of so many houses.

SA/6 PUBLIC QUESTIONS ON ISSUES RAISED BY RESIDENTS

A resident asked if Section 106 funding could be sought for cemeteries. Mr Batchelor replied that cemeteries did not score that highly for funding, with developers not keen on providing space for burial as it had no commercial value for them. SDDC was seeking space within the urban core for burials.

A member of the public reported that vegetation from Coppice Side / Morrisons Island to the petrol station near Morrisons was overgrown. Trees had reached 20ft in height and bushes 10ft. DCC had promised, they said, to keep everything to 3ft in height. The growth meant that in Coppice Side oncoming traffic was obscured.

ACTION: Paul Jameson to provide a report back on the growth

A resident complained about the state of the Delph, which they said had deteriorated "since day one". They claimed the road had been poorly resurfaced. They also complained about the quality of resurfacing in Civic Way. Councillor Rhind said that when Civic Way was done, it was one of the hottest days of the year and the new surface had churned up in the heat.

ACTION: Stuart Batchelor to provide a report back on the state of the surface in the Delph

A member of the public asked who prioritised works on the roads. Mr Jameson replied that DCC Highways Maintenance officers reviewed the condition of the county's roads. It could appear that a road in good condition had been repaired, but often there could be structural issues underneath the top surface. A total of £23m would be spent on surface dressing and patching over a three-year period to prolong the life of roads by 10 to 15 years.

A resident asked what had happened to the 'jet patcher'. Mr Jameson replied that DCC did not own the machines but hired them out periodically.

A member of the public asked how the £6.20 rebate from the previous year's Council Tax bill would be paid. Councillor Rhind replied that it was deducted from this year's bill.

A resident complained about vegetation growing in Chapel Street, Woodville, outside rented properties. It was knee-high along much of the street and was growing out of the kerb as well. Two council workers had previously been to cut it back.

ACTION: Stuart Batchelor to report state of Chapel Street to appropriate SDDC department

A member of the public asked if cabinets for bicycles at Green Bank Leisure Centre had been paid for by SDDC. Mr Batchelor replied that they were part of the £1m redevelopment of the leisure centre. The aim was to encourage people to commute by bicycle, reducing the number of cars on the road. Long-term, the lockers would recoup the initial outlay in terms of increased usage of bicycles and a reduction in car usage. Mr Batchelor also thanked the community for turning out for the Women's Tour of Britain cycle race which passed through the area in June.

A resident asked what the situation was regarding the adoption of Castleton Park by DCC. Mr Jameson said he had met with Councillor Trevor Southerd at the beginning of the year and it seemed to be fairly close back then.

ACTION: Paul Jameson to contact DCC Clerk of Works to ascertain adoption situation

A resident asked if Excelsior Drive, Victory Close and Reliant Close had been adopted.

ACTION: Paul Jameson to report back on whether the three streets had been adopted

A member of the public asked where recent large planning applications sat in relation to Part One of the Local Plan. Mr Batchelor replied that major developments not in the plan would be rejected – but the developer could then appeal to the Government Planning Inspector, who could potentially overturn SDDC's decision. The resident asked what would happen if a development was proposed on a site not in Part Two of the plan. Councillor Rhind replied that until Part Two was adopted it was hard to reject an application. It would be easier once the plan was in place.

A resident complained that in Local Plan documentation, Woodville did not have its own page and was included with Swadlincote. Mr Batchelor replied that there would be no advantage or disadvantage in how the maps had been presented.

SA/8 DISTRICT COUNCIL ISSUES

Mr Batchelor reported that a £1m refurbishment of the Grove Hall – with $\pm 500,000$ from Sport England and $\pm 500,000$ from SDDC reserves – was completed and had opened. The climbing facilities were unique in the Midlands. It was hoped the centre would end up hosting 200-300 climbers a day instead of the limited number of squash players who used the old facilities, bringing a lot more people into the town.

Election of chair

In the absence of Councillor John Harrison (Chair) and Councillor Peter Watson (Vice-Chair), Frank McArdle asked for nominations for Chair from the floor. Councillor Neil Atkin nominated Councillor Jim Hewlett.

MA/03 Chairman's announcements

Councillor Hewlett announced that Local Plan Part One had been adopted by SDDC and Part Two was currently being consulted upon.

MA/04 The minutes of the meeting held on January 26th, 2016

The minutes were proposed by Councillor Mrs Linda Chilton, seconded by Wendy Earp and approved.

MA/05 Report back on issues raised at the last meeting

Swarkestone Causeway Enforcement Project

Paul Jameson (AFLO) provided a report back on the project, stating that DCC was considering providing vehicle-activated signs (VAS) on main routes approaching the causeway. DCC had been obliged to review the project in light of police being unable to carry out enforcement. By the time of the next Melbourne Area Forum in the autumn, DCC would hopefully be in a position to provide clear proposals.

Councillor Rob Davison reported that he had spoken to Neill Bennett in DCC's Transportation Team and been told that the next step was a tendering exercise to see how much the signs would cost. A sum of $\pounds 48,000$ had been set aside for it. However, what the public needed to know was that these signs did not help with prosecutions and were merely a deterrent to HGVs using the route.

Mr Jameson provided the latest enforcement figures for the causeway since the previous meeting in January. Five drivers had been prosecuted for breaking the weight limit, paying a total of £1,400 in fines and £725 in costs. Another driver was due to appear in court for sentencing on July 14th and one further case was being investigated. Mr Jameson noted that several of the prosecutions were aided by photographic evidence provided by residents. Councillor Hewlett asked if a photograph and a statement from a resident were enough to bring a prosecution and Mr Jameson confirmed that they were.

Double yellow lines outside Melbourne Senior Citizens' Centre

Councillor Mrs Chilton had been tasked to raise the question with DCC but reported that the county council was no longer taking such measures.

Poor state of road in Thulston

Councillor Davison reported that he had notified DCC about the roads in Thulston in general terms. A large pothole opposite the Harrington Arms had been fixed very quickly. Mr Jameson added that patching works were due to take place shortly in Ambaston Lane, Thulston.

Sandstone kerb stones at the Bay Tree, Melbourne

Councillor Hewlett said the issue centred around the replacement of a sandstone kerb with one made from granite which could withstand the weight of a truck. Sandstone kerb stones had repeatedly broken but been replaced like for like because of the constraints of Conservation Area policies. Councillor Hewlett reported that SDDC was currently without a Conservation Officer so a decision on the kerb would have to wait until someone was in position.

MA/06 **Public questions on issues raised by residents**

A resident complained about weeds being at least 5ft high on the 'old A6' before they were cut on the morning of the meeting. Weeds had also grown so high they had obscured the bus stop opposite the end of Thulston Lane. Before the recent cut, they had not been done at all in 2016, the resident claimed.

A member of the public reported a similar situation in Melbourne, saying the cuts got later and later each year.

Councillor Atkin reported complaints from around the Aston Ward in 2016 and linked accidents in Chell Lane to a lack of visibility from long grass on the verges. He questioned whether two cuts a year in rural areas was enough.

Mr Jameson confirmed that verge cutting was a DCC issue, with SDDC acting as agents. It was undertaken for safety reasons to ensure adequate visibility splays. The wet weather had worked against the county council this year, something several residents dismissed as an excuse.

A member of the public raised concerns about the state of a footpath running from Shardlow to Thulston which she claimed was overgrown with nettles and other weeds. It had also subsided in places. Another resident added that along a country lane between Shardlow and Ambaston, gullies for drainage had overgrown, presenting a hazard to pedestrians, cyclists and motorists.

Mr McArdle said he shared residents' concerns, living in a rural area himself. He did, however, believe the weather had been exceptional this year. He would seek some clarity on the situation regarding the number of cuts per year and report back to parish councils.

ACTION: Frank McArdle to raise issue with relevant SDDC department and seek clarity on the council's responsibilities

A resident said that road signs in the area were increasingly obscured by hedgerows and other vegetation and asked whose responsibility it was to clear them. Mr Jameson asked where and said if a sign was covered, a resident should ring DCC's call centre on 01629 533190 and the job would be assigned to a rapid response team. Currently, the team was limited by the bird nesting season.

A resident asked if there had been a rise in fly-tipping. They claimed there had been two loads of asbestos dumped in Barrow, one in the middle of the village and the other in Swarkestone Road. There was also the issue of continual dumping of furniture in Lowes Lane. Mr McArdle replied that SDDC was using every piece of technology it had available to combat the illegal dumping of waste. CCTV was being used and successful prosecutions brought as a result, some of which had attracted national publicity. However, the problem would never be eradicated as there would always be someone willing to take a risk to avoid paying to dump waste officially.

MA/07 County Council issues

Councillor Mrs Chilton said recent rainfall was a concern for Swarkestone Causeway, with the potential it had to damage what was an ancient monument. She would continue to beat the drum for the causeway, whose smooth operation was key for inward investment into South Derbyshire.

MA/08 District Council issues

Mr McArdle updated the meeting on the Community Governance Review taking place in Stenson Fields, Barrow and the unparished areas of Twyford and Stenson, where a range of options on redrawing parish boundaries was being considered. Letters containing a sizeable document were on their way out to every household in the areas affected. It contained numerous alternatives but Mr McArdle and his officers at SDDC could not make any recommendations to residents, it was for the public to have its say. The views of residents were needed by September, whereupon a second phase of the consultation would take place on the draft proposals. What had been decided would come into existence on April 1, 2017. A meeting would be held in the early part of September at a neutral venue - probably in Willington – to discuss the issue further. A resident thanked Mr McArdle for clarifying the review while Councillor Mrs Chilton agreed it was a complex issue which had been succinctly summarised. Councillor Davison asked how the public could make sense of such a complex document. He also warned that Twyford and Stenson was at great risk because if the new estate being built there was not absorbed into Stenson Fields, there would be no one to represent the new residents. That would result in Twyford and Stenson being governed by a semi-urban area. Mr McArdle replied that the review was being conducted according to law. He asked for patience and reiterated the importance of people's responses to help his members reach the right decision. Councillor Davison asked if an FAQs sheet could be produced and Mr McArdle replied that it was impossible due to the constraints of the law.

Councillor Hewlett reported that an area of yellow hatchings in the car park behind the Lamb Inn, in Melbourne – where there used to be recycling bins – was now safe for parking. Motorists had previously been ticketed for parking there.

Councillor Hewlett added that the official opening of 45 new council houses, the first to be built in South Derbyshire since 1992, had taken place. A second phase would involve 11 more homes behind Swadlincote Fire Station which were currently being refurbished. There were also eight flats in Alexandra Road, Swadlincote, being considered for refurbishment.

Councillor Pat Murray updated the meeting on the status of Part Two of the South Derbyshire Local Plan, which was being consulted upon ahead of a hearing with a Government Planning Inspector.

LA/4 THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON JANUARY 27, 2016

LA/5 REPORT BACK ON ISSUES RAISED AT THE LAST MEETING

Derbyshire County Council issues

Sunken manhole covers

The area affected had been repaired by DCC.

South Derbyshire District Council issues

Empty house in Stanley Close, Netherseal

A resident asked if there was anything further SDDC could add to what was contained in the report back, which stated that SDDC's Private Sector Housing Team was working towards a solution with all parties entangled in probate. The resident said the property was a blight on the area and wanted assurances SDDC was doing everything in its power to end the situation. Frank McArdle (SDDC Chief Executive) replied that there was nothing to add and that Environmental Health Manager Matt Holford was a dedicated officer who would not let the issue go.

ACTION: Matt Holford to update the next Area Forum on the situation in Stanley Close, Netherseal

LA/6 **PUBLIC QUESTIONS ON ISSUES RAISED BY RESIDENTS**

A member of the public raised the issue of a lack of 7.5 tonne signage entering Walton from the county border with Staffordshire. Paul Jameson (DCC Area Forum Liaison Officer) said he was aware of a potential issue in Staffordshire. There should have been one sign on the Staffordshire side of the rail bridge (in Station Lane) and there was an obligation to place a sign at the start of an area weight restriction. DCC's weight restriction team was following up on the issue. Mr Jameson asked for photographs of the offending vehicles and for any vehicles flouting the weight limit to be reported to DCC.

A resident asked who owned the footpath from Walton to Catton along the river bank.

ACTION: Paul Jameson to report back on whether it is a designated public footpath

A member of the public reported that signage at Rosliston Road South near Stapenhill had been removed when a development started on the Staffordshire side of the border. A temporary give way sign was still in place.

Councillor Mrs Beth Hall thanked DCC for improving the "appalling" state of the roads in the Seales. However, there were still many minor roads badly affected by potholes. Roads were in a poor state outside Netherseal Post Office, in Main Street, and at Burton Road, Coton in the Elms, near the junction of Elmslea Avenue. DCC had previously sent an inspector around the county to review the roads – was that still the case? Mr Jameson confirmed it was. Councillor Mrs Hall also asked where the cats eyes from the A444 had gone. Mr Jameson replied that they were removed for surface dressing and would be replaced in due course.

A resident asked whether a county council was liable for damage to a vehicle caused by a pothole which had been reported but not repaired within 48 hours. Mr Jameson replied that each case would be dealt with on its merits. There was an audit trail of complaints, but the timescale of repair depended on the class of the road involved.

A member of the public complained about loose stone chippings left on pavements along the A444, weeks after surface dressing had taken place. They asked whether DCC would clear the debris. Mr Jameson replied that it was not a clean process and it relied on vehicles bedding the chippings into the road. After 24 hours and then after seven days, a sweeper attended the scene to collect any loose chippings.

A resident reported 10mph signs left lying on the Green in Coton in the Elms. Mr Jameson replied that they would be collected.

An Overseal resident complained about the level of provocation from an applicant for planning permission in Burton Road, with works allegedly started without permission. Mr McArdle replied that he was unable to comment on a live planning application. He suggested the resident contact an enforcement officer at SDDC.

A member of the public asked if there had been any progress with the Walton bypass and new river crossing. Councillor Bob Wheeler said he had been told in January that work would start in April. SDDC was keen for the project to proceed and there was a limit to what could be built at Drakelow until the Walton bypass was completed. Mr McArdle said that there was absolutely nothing more his local members or officers could have done regarding the Walton bypass. The project was now in the hands of other bodies and there was nothing more SDDC could do except face the public, meeting after meeting, and answer the same questions in the same way. Councillor Wheeler added that DCC was of a different opinion to Drakelow Developments in terms of the paperwork being completed for the bypass. A resident asked if the 30mph limit in Walton could be extended out towards Drakelow on Main Street. They claimed the drop to 30mph was too close to the built-up area of the village. Mr Jameson replied that he knew the area well and after a review it had not been considered suitable for a change of speed limit. There were national guidelines on limits and a 30mph limit should not be too far outside of a built-up area, with sporadic developments not counting. There was also a warning in place on the approach to the 30mph limit.

LA/7 COUNTY COUNCIL ISSUES

LA/8 DISTRICT COUNCIL ISSUES

Mr McArdle reported that the National Forest had reached the 25-year mark. Eight million trees had been planted in that time and there were substantial plans to take the project forward in the next 10 years. The National Forest had reinforced a tremendous pace of change in South Derbyshire. Plans for the future were exciting for the forest. It already employed 4,300 people directly and indirectly and its success was thanks to the whole community of the district.

Mr McArdle informed the meeting of Community Governance Reviews under way in two areas of South Derbyshire – one in Newhall and Stanton and one in Barrow on Trent, Stenson Fields and the unparished areas of Twyford and Stenson.
