Dear sirs or madam,

I object to the Premises Licence Application For the following reasons.
I live near Grangefields Farm and have seen that an application for a Premises Licence is being made to allow music to be played and alcohol to be sold to 1 am.

This is something that I would like to object to in the strongest possible terms. A Business whose principle hours of business continue into the early hours of the morning (1am 7 days a week 365 days a year) is not compatible with this quiet residential area.

It is unrealistic to assume that there will not be a detrimental impact on neighbours given the days and hours of operation particularly on families with school age children.

Anyone attending a Wedding would need to do so by foot or their own vehicle as no public transport passes Grangefields

This in itself will cause significant disturbance.

The area is normally very quiet during the early hours of the morning and in particular any arrivals or departures will cause disturbance.

I am also concerned about the potential for damage to property if customers are allowed to leave in the early hours of the morning having drunk significant quantities of alcohol.

Using Grangefields as a wedding venue is like introducing a night club in a tranquil rural place.

Other wedding venues close at midnight so why does Grangefields need to stay open later?.

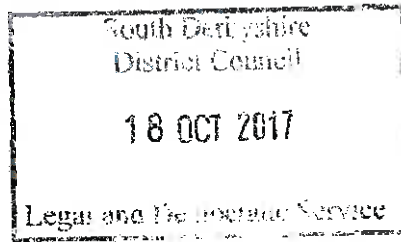
